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FROM BISHOP DAVID



Have you ever been to Long Melford in Suffolk? If you do, look out for this remarkable panel of stained glass, which shows Christ on the Cross; but not just any cross, because here the Cross of Good Friday is also the Lily of Easter Day.

During the present vacancy, I have been privileged to lead worship in many of your churches. I've enjoyed it, and you've been kind enough to say that you have as well. It's been your life that's struck me. But I can quite understand why a sense of loss and unsureness was there as well, as you worried about what pattern church life would now take. A touch of Lent, you could say, was in the air.

So what has our Easter faith to say to us at times like this: times which we face not just in church but in every aspect of our lives? When I marked the beginning of

Lent at Shouldham and Beachamwell I presented the churches with a small pot of bulbs. There was nothing to see when they were planted except bare earth, formed from the debris of life now extinct. But out of it have grown (I hope!) some beautiful flowers.

Our Easter flowers are a sign that even when deathliness is in the air, God's love has not finished with us. If we can keep our *roots* in the self-giving life of God that we see in Christ, and let the sap of grace flow up into our *shoots*, then Spring and Easter *will* come to our spirits and bear good *fruits*. And though our new form may not be at all like our old one – think caterpillars and butterflies now – it will be full of grace and truth.

*The word 'tenebrae' is Latin for shadows. The purpose of the Tenebrae service is to recreate the emotional aspects of the passion story, so this is not

supposed to be a happy service, because the occasion is not happy. If your expectation of Christian worship is that it should always be happy and exhilarating, you won't appreciate this service until the second time you attend it.

The service was originally designed for Good Friday, but it can be used for Maundy Thursday as well. Both services have long scripture narratives, which for this service are divided into seven, each one assigned to a different reader.

It starts out with the church dimly lit. There are as many candles as there are readings. The readers go up one at a time, read their assigned selections, and extinguish one of the candles, until only the Christ candle remains. Then someone reads the first part of Psalm 22, which Jesus quoted on the cross. Then the Christ candle is put out, leaving the congregation in near total darkness—and near total devastation. At this point, the service ends. There is no benediction and the people leave in silence. (The lights are turned up but remain dim so that people can see their way out.)

The purpose of the service is to recreate the betrayal, abandonment, and agony of the events, and it is left unfinished, because the story isn't over until Easter Day.

COUNTRYSIDE NOTES APRIL 2017 SEEDS

An exceptionally mild February has made everything put on a spurt of growth. Our garden has been a picture with spring bulbs and a large patch of naturalised crocuses. The only downside is all the 'unwanteds' have been growing apace as well. It is incredible how nature has devised different methods of distributing seeds. Many of our trees, such as oak, beech and walnuts bear fruits that are attractive to jays and squirrels. They not only eat them but also store them for winter by burying them in the ground. They never find all of what they've buried and hey presto a new tree has been planted some distance from its parent! Other trees and shrubs rely on birds to scatter their seeds but by a more devious method. Hawthorn, yew, mountain ash, spindle, cherry, as well as several others, are popular with blackbirds, redwings etc for food. However the stones or pips inside prove indigestible and pass through the birds. These are then deposited wherever they happen to be at the time, each with its own dressing of fertilizer. Another clever method used by trees, such as sycamore and ash, to distribute their seed is to have 'wings' on them. These are called 'keys' and can be carried quite a distance by the wind. Last autumn we had an amazing amount on our sycamore tree which are now growing like cress in the borders and lawn! Fir cones open up to scatter their seeds. Some species of conifers, such as the Lodge Pole Pine in North America, need excessively high temperatures for this to happen and benefit greatly when forest fires trigger this mechanism. In 1988 there were devastating fires over thousands of acres in Yellowstone National Park and within a few years a natural forest was regenerating among the gaunt, charred remains of the original trees.

Goldfinches relish the fluffy seed heads of groundsel, dandelions and thistles but they don't eat them all. Individually they are so light they float away in the gentlest of breezes to spread themselves elsewhere. Then there are the sneaky plants whose reproduction technique is to cadge a lift in order to disperse themselves. Perhaps the best known is cleavers, more familiarly known as 'goose grass' or 'sweethearts'. The tiny green balls of their seeds seem to be able to cling to almost everything. A much larger plant that also has this unpleasant habit is the burdock. If you have a long haired dog which has ever got too close to a burdock you will know exactly how hard it is to remove the burrs. Of course there are a few lazy plants that just rely on producing thousands of seeds which simply fall to the ground. Their reproduction is guaranteed purely by the sheer quantity they produce. 'Busy Lizzies' have a brilliant method. When lightly touched their ripe seed pods burst open with an audible 'pop' and fire out the contents. How clever is that?

I fear I have become somewhat disengaged from the Smallholding during the latter end of winter, being rather more concerned, with others, of keeping myself going. However I have been aware of good numbers of fieldfares and blackbirds using up leftover apples in the orchard and the coloured crab-apples elsewhere. The recent spring-like weather has encouraged a walk round and a little light pruning. Looking at the leafless trees I am reminded of a poem entitled 'Lent' which emphasises the importance of the 'space between the branches'; in this case blackthorn which is indeed a very Lenten tree (shrub), through which it is possible to see the stars. With fruit trees the spaces allow light and air in and through the tree allowing a sturdy framework of bud-bearing wood to develop.

Apart from bird behaviour there other signs that winter is on its way out, (although the weather forecasters have other ideas), snowdrops and early dwarf daffodils and aconites of course, and over the roadside hedge near each gate the pollarded willows are glowing red, orange, green according to their species; Salix Britsensis or Salix VItelina. Perhaps there is a Salix expert 'out there' who is able to identify !?

Still over the hedge, the verges are crushed by ever larger vehicles, the grips are already full of water having been cut too late and a juggernaut was observed being driven down Murkett's lane; surprisingly it is no longer there!

Yesterday a sleek nuthatch visited the feeding station and every morning when there is early sun a cock blackbird surveys his territory from the top Eastern corner of the solar panels. How easy it is to become distracted from the holding! The distraction continues; there seems to be some dispute over the territorial vantage point above the panels; this morning one cock blackbird was chased off by another, eventually to be replaced by a French partridge who was clearly interested in activities both sides of the wall.

We leave the prunings under the trees to see if there is any rabbit activity - so far no sign; the effectiveness of the 'rabbit proof fence', or the two virulent diseases, or both'?

As horrid as the two diseases are it is the avian 'flu that is causing us more anxiety. The order to keep free-range flocks under cover, of course makes sense but is much more difficult to do than the order suggests. Adam's Chinese geese, on Country File had a roomy shed with simple feeding arrangements for an alternative. Our few geese and ducks are enclosed at night, going in of their own volition at dusk, but dependent on an outside water supply during the day. The hens, who are known for their quality eggs are, with the longer brighter days coming into full lay, yes, in time for Easter, need their cycle of light to keep egg- laying rhythms going. It is sad to think that our most attractive avian winter visitors may be bring this ruinous disease with them.

I am well behind with the soft fruit which are already in precocious bud. At the week-end a friend did noble work in beginning the re-ordering of the primacane

raspberries with the dual purpose of healthy spacing and a semi-permanent use of land thus reducing annual digging of over large vegetable beds. This is where the large raised bed comes into its own; easily manageable short-term veg(!?). Organic Way, the journal of Organic Growing, has publicised some scientific study into the consumption of plenty of fruit and veg and you will remain healthy AND **Happy too!** So that's why we do it!

NEWS FROM OUR FRIENDS IN THE NORTHERN HALF OF THE BENEFICE

Fincham St. Martins – Latest News.

The last of the £27,000 Listed Places of Worship Roof Repair Grant has now been claimed and the Chancel roof no longer leaks - so after many years of having to put up with being dripped on the Choir will now be able to stay dry. The repairs were extensive and were carried out to a high standard by Pikestaff Limited of Sporle. There was a bit of a hiatus in the works due to a national shortage of the required roofing materials but we got there in the end. A debt of gratitude is owed to Mr Stewart Waterston, formerly of Fincham, who made the original grant application with Rev. Barbara Burton, and relentlessly pursued its eventual full release to the PCC.

This month the trees on the western boundary of the Churchyard are due to be dead-wooded. This is being done as a matter of urgency as falling branches could potentially make a mess of adjoining properties if we get any more storms. We also want to avoid branches falling onto users of the adjacent footpath, and of course onto gravestones. Again in the Churchyard, we are close to reaching an agreement with the Community Payback team to take on some of the tidying up of overgrown hedges and pathways. If this goes well then it may be a useful source of "free" labour for other Churches in the group - so watch this space.

At the time of writing, the Fincham and Barton Bendish Group of Parishes are already six months into our *interregnum*, so whatever the outcome of the proposed Deanery Plan, let us hope that we will soon be in a position to start advertising for a new Priest soon. In the meantime we are grateful for the help of the retired clergy who are covering services in Fincham Church, and across the group.

Our regular Wednesday coffee mornings are due to resume in April, now that the worst of the winter weather is hopefully behind us.

All Saints' Shouldham = Deanery Synod – The Fincham & Feltwell Deanery Synod met in Stoke Ferry primary school on the evening of Monday, 13th March, where the main item of business was the reorganisation of parishes in this locality. As described in the last edition, this would entail Fincham, Marham, Shouldham and Shouldham Thorpe parishes being allied to the Stow Bardolph and Watlington Groups – all currently without a full-time priest. Our PCC was strongly opposed to this plan; (a) because the patterns of worship in the parishes beyond the A10 are rather different from our own; and (b) because we have worked hard over several years to form sound working relationships with Boughton, Barton Bendish, etc. This will now be wiped out at an administrative stroke, as well as fewer services to be covered by the next incumbent – **if** we ever get an applicant.

Led by the Archdeacon, Ven. Hugh McCurdy, (the scheme's main proponent), the whole process was little more than a fiasco. Observers like myself (BH) were segregated by a wide gangway at the rear of the hall and only the elected Synod representatives were permitted to speak. Unsurprisingly, the members voted 2 to 1in favour of the new plan; but we are grateful to Pam Wakeling, Reverends Robin Blackall, Joan Horan and Judith Grundy who all voiced strong opinions against the mooted scheme. In addition, our thanks to William O'Brien of Fincham who had prepared a wellreasoned paper defending our cause. If this Synod represents a form of socalled democratic working within the Anglican church, it was a mockery - a total stitch-up. Consultative meetings have been held across our parishes over the past four months and wasted a vast amount of time and effort. What will happen in the long run remains to be seen, but the opening lines of Psalm 127 spring to mind: Except the Lord build the house, their labour is but lost that build it..... Huh: some house, some synod! Ann and Brian Hullah

The eight parishes have built a community between us over the years and now it is to be torn apart because of the financial cost to the diocese of the appointment of a new parish priest.Our thanks to Pam Wakeling, the Rev Brian Redgers and. Rev Robin Blackall and all the other residents of the eight villages who have worked so hard for the group. It is to be hoped that final date for the changeover will not be for some time. Free home assessments on offer

Older, disabled or vulnerable residents of West Norfolk are being encouraged to book an appointment for a free home assessment from Careline Community Services.

The assessments, which are carried out by a team of qualified staff, will help residents, who may be living with a disability or dementia, or who are simply older and less mobile, to identify concerns in their property which may be affecting their day-to-day life.

The assessor, trained by the Disabled Living Foundation, will inspect the home to see whether measures could be introduced that would reduce the possibility of slips, trips and falls and generally make it easier for people to live safely and independently in their own homes.

Measures that could be considered include installation of a Careline personal alarm, improved lighting arrangements, heating checks, draught proofing, smoke detectors and easy-to-use taps along with recommendations for other adaptations that may reduce any potential risk to the resident. Practical solutions for those living with dementia are also available, this includes signage or colour differentiation for those who suffer with memory loss and are visually impaired.

The assessors will also be able to advise whether any grant funding is available for any works required.

Swaffham Museum

Swaffham Museum reopened in February after a busy six weeks. Behind the scenes work included **two new exhibitions**, **a new activity** for adults and children 'Do you know how to use a 1930's typewriter?', **additional dressing-up options** and **a new museum trail**.

The first new exhibition 'Philo's diary' has extracts from a diary written in 1850 by James Philo (1810-1877) who worked as a boot and shoemaker from his home at 8 London Street – approximately where Blaine's shop is today. He revisited the diary in 1873 and he describes the changes in Swaffham over the 19th Century. Besides his own personal sentiments, there are references to Education, Emigration, Local Government, Unions and Entertainment in Swaffham.

Our second exhibition is a display of paintings from our store. This is mostly paintings from the Carter family – Samuel John (father to Howard Carter), and Harry Carter who is well respected for his village signs. There are some copies of Harry's original designs. There are also some works from the graphic designer, Max Mueller. Max was a graphic artist and printer in Liepzig before becoming an unwilling conscript in the German army during WW11. He surrendered to the American army and eventually came to live as a prisoner of war in the camp at Cockley Cley. After his release he remained within the locality working for a funeral director before setting up his own printing press.

30th Anniversary of Swaffham Museum

This year is the 30th Anniversary of the Opening of Swaffham Museum. It was opened on March 14 by Dick Joice, well known and respected presenter of regional television and of the 'Bygones' programme. The Museum started with two rooms in the Town Hall, and there were over 1000 artefacts which had been collected during the previous 10 years. Mrs Merle Boddy was a prime mover in the establishment of the Museum. We will celebrate our 30 years in September on one of the Heritage Open Days.

He relinquished his tenancy not long afterwards.

BOUGHTON VILLAGE NEWS

Church News: The Deanery Synod met on Monday March 11th to discuss the Deanery Plan for reorganisation, as 20 out of the 32 parishes in the Deanery are currently in interregnum ie with no parish priest. The new plan appears to be driven purely by financial considerations and ignores the pastoral effects of breaking up a group which has worked together for many years In spite of protestations from the majority of our eight parishes and from several clergy, not all directly affected by it, the Barton Bendish and Fincham benefice is being split apart, with our four parishes joining the 'group centred around Methwold and our friends in Fincham, the Shouldhams and Marham being made to join a group which will stretch from Marham, to Watlington, Nordelp and Stow Bardolph. There is a bitter taste in how the plan was passed, by a majority of 27 to 14, ignoring pastoral issues and riding roughshod over genuine feelings and this was exacerbated by the way the meeting was organised. No one, not even the Archdeacon, was able to tell me when this will all come about, so for the moment nothing will change. Breakfast Church was well attended on March 12th and it was lovely to see seven very small children there and a number of new faces. It's always an enjoyable event, very informal and welcoming. It's not particularly 'preachy' or 'in your face' and everyone is welcomed, even if you only come for the company. All we ask is that you let someone know in advance, either Frank and Sandy, or me, so that enough food can be provided. Saturday 15th April-the day before Easter Sunday. We will again be hosting a service of vigil and the first Communion of Easter.at 8 pm. The choir will be present, hymns and readings; there will be fire to symbolise the light of the world, candles, and if you have a small bell to ring, please bring it along. It's a lovely service and all are welcome. See page 4 for details of other Easter services.

But, there is no need to dwell on the negative. The walks here are tremendous and our knowledge of wildlife expands all the time – not that we knew much when we arrived. The sound of birdsong is all pervasive and flowers and blossom are appearing everywhere.We are discovering all kinds of interesting and unique places nearby. Some were known to us already, like the Nar Valley Way, Castle Acre and Bawsey Ruin, but there seems to be an endless supply of hidden gems too. Particularly wonderful is the Church of St Mary at Houghton on the Hill, with its staggering Saxon murals. The building contains some Roman brick and, like many buildings in the county, is ancient beyond measure. Amazing that it was only rediscovered twenty years ago.We were warned that, as city dwellers, we would be unhappy and bored within months. We are still waiting for that to happen, and are entirely confident that it never will. When you make the right move it's like coming home – and that's what we've

he Passion of Christ, or Easter Week, known in Spain as **Semana Santa** is without doubt the most important celebration in Spain. The festivities begin with the Domingo de Ramos (Palm Sunday) and end with Lunes de Pascua (Easter Monday). It is a celebration of life itself and the whole country comes alive. The Catholic Church in Spain is passionate about Easter celebrations. Almost every town and city in Spain will have their own Easter celebrations and almost every resident will be involved in some way.

In the major cities the processions are of huge proportions, often stretching for miles. Each area, city and town has its own accent on its celebrations. They all differ but in common they all portray life, colour, culture, music and dance, all with a very religious meaning. The way in which many villages and towns celebrate Holy Week is so very different and one such example is Almaden de la Plata near Seville. On Easter Sunday, rag and straw dolls representing famous people are placed at different points in the streets of the village. These are finally torn apart and the pieces thrown into the air.

In Castilblanco de los Arroyos, they place the same kind of dolls in the streets but they are later set on fire. The dolls are known as *juas* or Judas dolls. There are many towns that celebrate with battles between ancient brotherhoods.

In major cities such as Malaga, the processions go on for miles and will last until the early hours of the morning, every night through the Easter week. Children as young as 3 or 4 take part and crowds will swell into hundreds of thousands.

For many Christians, Easter means the end of a long and gruelling 40 days of Lent, giving up your favourite thing, whether it's chocolate or Facebook! In many Spanish regions this is when they traditionally make **La Mona de Pascua** cake – a delicious end to the abstinence and a symbol of Spring! Easter week in Barcelona, known as Semana Santa (Holy Week) would not be complete without making La Mona de Pascua cake. Godparents traditionally give it to their godchildren, hence the word Mona – the Moroccan term meaning gift.

There are two types of La Mona de Pascua cake. The traditional cake takes the form of a gigantic doughnut topped with boiled eggs (the number of eggs depends on the age of the godchild!) Why the eggs? The most dedicated Catholics would go without meat or eggs during Lent, so eggs were saved and used in the cake at Easter.

The more recent version of La Mona de Pascua isn't quite so eggy. As baking techniques improved, bakers started to make chocolate eggs and put a layer of apricot jam inside the cake. Today La Mona de Pascua is decorated with a chocolate glaze, almonds, chocolate

eggs, colourful feathers and cartoon characters. It's so popular that Catalonia's bakeries can expect to sell 600 000 of

this festive speciality by Easter Monday.**Ingredients:**Sponge

4 eggs

150g of sugar

150g of flour

20g of almond flour

5g of yeast

2 beaten egg whites

50g of butter

For the filling

300g of apricot jam

To decorate

250g of dark chocolate

125g of butter

Method:

Beat the eggs and sugar together in a bowl.

Mix the flour and yeast together in a separate bowl.

Gradually pass the mixture of four and yeast through a sieve and add it to the egg and sugar mixture.

Stir constantly while adding the almond flour.

Whisk the egg whites in a separate bowl until they form peaks.

Once they are half whisked, add 50g o sugar, once whisked blend in with the flour and egg mixture.

Turn the final mix out into a greased and flour sprinkled mould.
