

NOTES FROM THE RECTORY

The Easter Story is at the Heart of Christianity

Advice from the Bishops during the Coronavirus Threat

It is our view, in light of the continued increase of Covid-19 cases in the United Kingdom, that it is now necessary to suspend the administration of the chalice as well as physical contact during the sharing of the peace, blessing or "laying on of hands".

We therefore advise that all priests should:-

1. Offer Communion in one kind only to all communicants i.e. the consecrated bread/wafer/host, with the priest alone taking the wine;
2. Suspend handshaking or other direct physical contact during the sharing of the peace;
3. Suspend direct physical contact as part of a blessing or 'laying on of hands'.

RECIPE PAGE

Minestrone Soup with Cheesy Croutons

This is a use it up soup so there is no set recipe adjust as you like. I like to dice to 1/4 inch but make it chunkier if you prefer

Ingredients

2 onions, 2 carrots, 2 sticks of celery

4 - 6 cloves of garlic

1 medium turnip, 1 small swede, 1 fist sized piece of butternut squash

1 x 400gr tin of chopped tomatoes

1 x desert spoon of tomato puree

1 x 400gr tin of beans - whichever you prefer, pinto, chick peas, cannellini, red kidney, butter

750ml of water plus half to one (to taste) bouillon cube to make a stock

Add to taste bayleaf, dried oregano, rosemary, thyme - or simply italian herbs if you have them

A pinch of chilli flakes - optional - to taste

Method

In a large pan gently saute your vegetables in olive oil for a few minutes before adding the rest of the ingredients above and bringing gently to a simmer. Cook gently for 2 - 3 hours.

30 minutes before serving add

1 courgette, 2 handfuls of spinach, 100gr green beans

100gr of spaghetti broken into 50mm lengths

The Croutons

1 bagette, 100ml olive oil, 4 cloves crushed garlic, sea salt, black pepper, a pinch of chilli flakes - optional - to taste


100gr grated parmesan or gran pedano

Cut your bagette into 25mm cubes then in a big bowl with plenty of space mix together all the ingredients well and then add the bread and coat well using your hands

Pop in the oven on a flat, lined, baking tray for 10 - 15 minutes at 400f, 180c fan, gas mark 6

You can cook this soup in a slow cooker which can be handy if you are going out - 3 hours on high or 6-8 hours on low

[Chair of West Norfolk CCG wishes patients healthy futures as he steps down from role](#)

The date of the merger of the NHS Norfolk and Waveney clinical commissioning groups (CCGs) and the formation of the new single CCG is nearly upon us. My last day as Chair of West Norfolk CCG is 31 March. The new CCG's west locality team is up and running under our locality director Howard Martin and I will be chairing the last West Norfolk CCG Governing Body meeting on Thursday, 26 March at the West Norfolk Deaf Association building in Railway Road, King's Lynn, at 9-15am.

I will be sad to say good-bye to West Norfolk CCG. I think it has done an excellent job in focussing on the health issues facing the population, and the problems faced by healthcare providers, in west Norfolk. During its tenure West Norfolk CCG has been able to give local support to healthcare providers and has had a greater understanding of the different needs of people living in the west of the county.

Those lessons and ways of working will now be continued as the new CCG will have a locality focus, with specific teams based in key geographic areas, including the west. This will give each area a voice and a dedicated workforce to ensure they can focus on local issues.

Each locality has a Local Delivery Group (LDG) as part of the work to transform health and care services locally. This group is represented by all the providers of healthcare in the area, including voluntary sector organisations and primary care. It also has patient representation and involves social care providers and in the west, the Borough Council of King's Lynn and West Norfolk, which is responsible for so many local services and initiatives. The West Norfolk LDG is an especially vibrant and energised group in which each organisation wants to help the others to deliver the best care possible so we can continue to drive down health inequalities and new ways of working in west Norfolk.

We have supported the new executive team at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital King's Lynn to deliver improvements following challenging Care Quality Commission (CQC) reports in the last two years. That is bearing fruit as there have been some very noticeable improvements at the Trust which we will hear more about at our next Governing Body meeting.

The novel coronavirus continues to receive much attention in the media.

A national campaign is underway to promote key public health advice and I would encourage you to look out for these messages and follow the guidance, particularly in regard to hand washing. Do call NHS 111 if you are concerned about your health and please don't visit your GP surgery, hospital or pharmacy if you think you might have symptoms of the virus. So I will sign off my final blog and wish you all healthy futures.

COULD YOU HELP A YOUNG PERSON WITH A DISABILITY TO THINK ABOUT THEIR FUTURE?

The CSV Futures Project supports young people with learning disabilities to explore their options as they think about leaving education.

Volunteer Mentors provide one to one support to a young person to help them develop a personal profile of their skills and interests, their likes and dislikes and their future goals. The Mentor can then support the young person to start working towards these; this can include accessing work experience and training opportunities plus the chance to try out volunteering and new social activities.

CSV needs volunteers who can offer a couple of hours of their time each week to mentor the young people as they make choices about their futures, raising aspirations by exploring together the young person's skills, interests and abilities.

COUNTRYSIDE NOTES

What a peculiar winter we've had. Proof, if needed, that the boffins are perhaps right about global warming. I've lived in Barton for nearly twenty years and in that time can remember quite a few periods of snow, ice and sub-zero temperatures, but not in the last few winters. A bit of research on the internet (try www.pascalbonenfant.com British weather 1700-1849) reveals that our weather has always been unpredictable and sometimes extreme. Over time the weather appears to go in cycles. Is that what's happening now? If so why has it happened so suddenly?

Global warming is a combination of factors which have a cumulative effect. Are volcanic eruptions to blame? No, they have both a warming and a cooling impact on the climate. Carbon dioxide, along with many other greenhouse gases, is released into the atmosphere but in relation to other emissions contributes only an insignificant amount of warming. On the other hand, the dust particles shield us from the sun which cools the atmosphere. In total there were 73 eruptions in 2019 with a major one in New Zealand last December.

This winter we had a few frosts prior to Christmas followed by excessive rainfall in January and February along with strong winds. Storms Ciara and Dennis wreaked havoc across the country. Following on from a wet autumn this made life extremely difficult for arable farmers. Crops can survive a short time submerged but if the water can't drain away they then begin to rot. Potato harvest usually ends in November but last year, in some areas, it was far too wet for machinery to get on the land and they were left in the ground. Waterlogged land meant that farmers were unable to get on with preparations to sow the next crops. A lot of barley and wheat is normally drilled in the autumn and this just wasn't possible in many places. As I write this in mid-March the soil has had no chance to dry out and farmers have continued to experience difficulty cultivating the land in order to sow their spring crops. Where beet has been grown cereals usually follow and the next crop of beet is also normally sown in March. The weather needs to change dramatically for this to happen. Norfolk, believe it or not, is supposed to be the driest county in Britain; that is why, combined with the soil types, it's predominately arable. We are fortunate that we don't have acres still submerged in water. March is also the month when farmers put fertiliser on their growing crops but even locally they're likely doing more harm than good trying to drive across saturated fields. Modern farm machinery is so big and heavy. Using tracks instead of wheels lessens the damage but even with these it's still impossible to get on sodden land without causing some damage to the soil structure. Breckland, however, has such light sandy soil it doesn't ever get seriously waterlogged and land work is able to continue regardless.

Beachamwell Parish Council

The Parish Council held a meeting on 2nd March 2020. Below is a summary of some of the matters which were discussed at the meeting:

Footpaths

The Parish Council had received a report of issues with blocked access on Footpath 10, at its junction with Bridleway 9, and missing fingerposts and waymarker posts at the junction of Bridleway 9 and Bridleway 11. The Parish Council contacted the landowner who advised that the blocked footpath had been cleared prior to the meeting, and the post would be reinstated.

Planning

A larger number of residents had attended the meeting to raise concerns about the outline planning application for 5 dwellings to the rear of 1-10 The Street (ref: 3PL/2020/0205/O). The details of the application were considered and the Parish Council agreed to object to the application for the following reasons which are material considerations:

Highways issues – traffic generation, vehicular access, highways safety

Capacity of physical infrastructure in the public drainage system

Not a sustainable development – location of application site is outside a rural settlement with no local services or sustainable transport choices which is contrary to Policies DC2 and CP14 of the Core Strategy and Development Control Policies Development Plan.

Annual Parish Meeting

Prior to the Parish Council Meeting the Annual Parish Meeting took place. This was an opportunity for residents to ask questions or raise concerns about matters affecting the parish. The meeting was chaired by Cllr Tom Sanderson, the Chair of the Parish Council, several questions were raised by residents and answers were provided.

Rainfall

So how wet was February

Following all the reports in the news about February's rainfall, I thought it would be interesting to see how our local rainfall readings compared with previous years.

In February I measured 86.8mm during the month. Usually, the rainfall for this month is quite low – around 40mm. When we started reading the rainfall in 1993, it was for the National River's Authority, before it was swallowed up by the Environment Agency. Looking back in Mark's records, it quickly became clear that this was the wettest February that we have had during that time.

The next highest measure was in February 2010, which was about 1mm less. No other year came anywhere near this. The rainfall levels over the winter of 2009/2010 are very similar to that which we have experienced this year. But there was one big difference. Much of it fell as snow. **Sue Pogmore**

At this meeting the council received a report from our County Councillor, Martin Storey, about the impact to rural communities from the recent bad weather (350 incidents reported to highways and rescue services on the 10th February alone) and the fight against road erosion and pot holes (budgets for pot hole fixing have been increased). We communicated to him our views on the loss of our bus service and he undertook to find out whether a couple of companies we know could support the service had been approached.

Related to this subject, a resident has offered to provide a lift to Hardwick and back on a Monday morning to anyone unable to make their own way there. If you'd like to take up this offer, or you can offer other people lifts, please get in touch with the Parish Clerk on boughtonpc@gmail.com.

As I write this, the Coronavirus (COVID-19) outbreak is starting to take hold in the UK, with cases reported in all regions, including West Norfolk. As we live in a rural community with a larger than average proportion of "at risk" residents, please consider helping out elderly neighbours who may now feel unable to go out for supplies. It may be helpful to start a "buddy system" where neighbours agree to do shopping for others having to self-isolate.

We received an indication that our grant application for our vehicle speed sign has been approved, and we hope to have this purchased and installed in the late Spring or early Summer. This should give us a good amount of data on traffic flow and speed violations.

Finally, our next meeting on 5th May is our Annual Meeting and Annual Parish Meeting, where members of the public are encouraged to attend find out what the council does, and to give their views on what the council should be concentrating on over the next twelve months. Last year, the meeting confirmed speeding through the village as the top priority and we are taking steps in that regard. What would you like to see the council do now?
