LET US BE THANKFUL, LORD

What does April mean to you? A four-day weekend, the chance to get away from it all? An opportunity to visit or receive visitors? By contrast, a busier time than usual because you work in industries that rely on tourism or entertainment. in agriculture and horticulture, you may well be really busy with new lambs and calves and growth in the fields. It could be an exciting month, with a new tax year (I jest). Or perhaps it could be an extra special time for you with preparations for a wedding? Your excitement may be about the new life within yourself or simply in your garden. Or that, this April, signifies the true beginning of spring with the hope of better weather. After all, the meteorological version of the beginning of spring last month produced the highest precipitation and the lowest temperatures of the year so far!

Easter does fall within April this year although Easter Day can fall in the latter days of March. You may well question why Easter is a variable Feast while Christmas is not so. Indeed, over the years there have been efforts made to regularise it. One of those I like to quote is about an Act of Parliament that has never come into force. And has the unenviable distinction of having the longest period of time that one has lacked enforcement. It is the Easter Act 1928 which depended on all the mainstream Christian Churches agreeing upon a date. No such agreement has ever been reached during the ninety-five years since the Act received Royal Assent. Hardly surprising given that the Churches have been debating (I'm using diplomatic language) the issue since the middle ages.

Easter is inextricably linked to the Jewish Feast of Passover. This is a spring festival which celebrates the ending of the slavery of the Israelites in Egypt. And commemorates the fact that God spared the Children of Israel from the death that He visited upon the Egyptians. The Angel of Death *Passed Over* the houses of the Israelites. For Christians, this link with the Passover is made in two specific ways. Firstly, Jesus with His disciples celebrated the Passover with the traditional Passover meal before His betrayal; the Last Supper. Secondly, that Christ rose from the dead on the third day after His Crucifixion. By His Resurrection He was freed from the tomb and in so doing freed us from the slavery of sin. In similitude to the ending of the slavery of the Israelites. A true cause for celebration.

However, to quote from the Collect for the Third Sunday of Lent – Almighty God whose most dear Son went not up to joy but first He suffered pain and entered not into Glory before He was Crucified. In the light of which we commemorate Good Friday. How can it be Good Friday? After all, we are remembering one of the most awful and humiliating forms of execution ever devised by mankind. Exposed to the elements and public scorn on a hillside outside the walls of Jerusalem. An execution reserved for common criminals who were not Roman citizens. The word good has been incorrectly assumed to have derived from God Friday. In fact, the word good attributes to the day a

sense of piety and holiness. In my view, it is a day when we have the opportunity to truly revere Jesus Christ's Sacrifice of Himself.

The Church's Season of Easter carries on for about seven weeks until Pentecost (Whit Sunday). Beyond the confines of the Church we return to work, to our studies or leisure time activities. I know from my own experience that it is difficult, sometimes practically impossible, to think about the events of Easter.

Of the Crucifixion and of the Resurrection. Indeed, it is very easy to dismiss them as fiction or fantasy. Or at any rate so remote from daily life or any current experiences that you cannot relate to them. If either of the latter two cases apply to you, then I can empathise with your point of view because those are ones that I adopted in my late teens and twenties. I found myself in the position of having to make up my mind about whether or not I believed in a God?

What inspired me to think of this matter was a deep feeling that I needed to give thanks. Thanks for life itself, for family and other relationships, for health and fitness, a good job and (in spite of the cold war) a sense of security. I had a lot for which to be thankful. But to whom or what? Was it just how things worked out in my favour? I spent a lot of time thinking about this. Hoping that I was not just obsessing about it and that these thoughts were not interfering with the very things which I was having that feeling of thankfulness. I also knew all these good things were essentially quite fragile and needed to be maintained!

Eventually I did come to the conclusion that I did have a firm belief in a Creator. And that *the* Creator was Almighty God. Incidentally, to me, God is *Almighty*. If you believe in Him being Almighty, then those things about which we naturally doubt become possible. That includes the events of Easter. Let us, then, allow ourselves some time to ponder about things beyond our immediate environment and concerns. To form a relationship with God that transcends those that we normally experience. One in which we may join in joyfully saying *let us be thankful, Lord. Tony Mills*

COUNTRYSIDE NOTES - SOIL

We rarely give much thought to the earth beneath our feet and yet all life

depends on it. It's either made up from stone or organic matter and generally categorised into six types: chalky, clay, loamy, peaty, sandy, or silty, all of which can be found pretty much within the Group Four area. Beneath is a base layer of chalk. The colour varies greatly. Organic peaty soil in the Fens is very nearly black, chalky soil is light coloured, clay can be red or yellow and in Devon soil is red as a result of iron chemicals. Soil is tested for its pH levels on a scale of 0-14 which measures soil acidity or alkalinity the results of which can be checked against a colour chart. A pH of 7.0 is considered neutral. Acidic soils such as peat have a pH value below 7.0 and chalk is alkaline and above. Soil is packed full of organisms most of which are invisible to the eye. A balance of bacteria, protozoa, nematodes, fungi and algae along with organic matter is required to create healthy and productive soil. Mycorrhizal fungi play a huge part in plant health by increasing the uptake of water and nutrients. Soil is also home to many invertebrates and insect species in their larval stages which in turn provide food for wildlife. Many species of birds feed their newly hatched chicks on these. Earthworms play an invaluable part in improving soil quality through eating organic matter and producing compost which enriches the soil. Their underground activities spread nutrients around as well as helping with aeration and drainage, helping fields to absorb water which acts as a buffer against waterlogging and flooding.

In the last seventy years these organisms have been depleted by modern farming methods. Previously most lowland farms used to have a mix of livestock and arable. Pigs and cattle kept in barns for the winter produced straw -based manure which was spread on the land before it was ploughed. A good level of organic matter creates a healthy ecosystem of living organisms but these providers of old fashioned 'muck' have disappeared from most farms.

It now seems that at last farmers are becoming much more aware of how important it is to care for the soil and have reduced deep ploughing. This winter it's good to see that muck spreading is back and so many acres of turnips have been grown as winter feed for sheep which add fertility to the soil by scattering their droppings across the fields.


Growing green crops, such as mustard or buckwheat, to plough in is a natural way of replenishing and stabilising the soil and is being used more widely. Arable farmers use a system of rotating crops, some such as legumes put nitrogen back into the soil. Crop rotation is a well-recognised tool of management and has been practised for hundreds of years. Not only does it help preserve the structure and fertility of the soil but also helps prevent a build -up of pests and diseases. *Jill Mason*

NEWS RELEASE from the Borough Council Help is at hand if you ask.

We all know that Christmas and New Year was a time for celebration but for people struggling with everyday living costs it can feel like an extra demand on a budget that already doesn't go far enough and we appreciate that the stress this causes for many people is overwhelming and they tend to live life from day-to-day or even moment-to-moment and this has the effect of storing up bigger problems for later. People often respond to money problems in one of two ways. They either avoid the problem altogether because they don't know how to get out of it or panic and go for a short-term solution like giving up their home or going to a money-lender – both of which usually make things worse in the long term.

But it doesn't have to be like that and the council's main message is: talk to us before doing anything else – we can help.

We can check that you are getting all the financial benefits you are entitled to. If you're in debt we have services that will help you get back on track. If you find yourself in crisis we may be able to arrange help with food and rent costs. If you're struggling with your mental health we can put you in touch with people who can help with that too.

We understand that it can be really difficult to think beyond today's problems but if you can just take that first step of talking to us, it could be the most important conversation you have this year.

Get money advice, don't go to money lenders, we know that going to a money lender means fast access to cash without having to fill out forms we know it can be a really tempting choice. But these people prey on desperation, charging huge amounts of interest and sometimes threatening or usin violence to make you pay.

There ARE alternatives. If you get proper money advice they can help you maximise your income, making sure you are getting all the benefits you are entitled to and other help, such as discretionary support payments. They may be able to help you consolidate some of your debt or help you make payment agreements that you can manage. The council pays for a money advice service that's specially to help with this and free to use – visit moneyadvicehub.org.uk or call 01553 970004.

Hang on to your home? Rent is usually a household's biggest cost and recently we have had a lot of phone calls from people who have given up their tenancies because they think they can't afford it. They intend to go on the housing register to get an affordable home. What many people don't realise is that in many cases Government rules see this as making yourself 'intentionally homeless', which means that the council can't do much to help. Even if we can help, it could be a long wait as very few affordable homes are available and there are around 1,400 people on the housing register in this borough alone. Over the past three months only 19 homes with 3 or more bedrooms have become available – that's about 6 each month. For most people the best plan is to work out a way of staying in your current home. We can help with this.

Even if staying where you are isn't right for you, the most important thing you can do is talk to us before making any big decisions as this is when we can give you the most help.

West Norfolk Aviation Society March 2023

Andy Moore's talk last September portraying wartime events at RAF Bexwell was such a success that he was invited back to present part 2 of the Bexwell story: a catalogue of events, mementos and first-hand accounts which he has researched over a period of four decades. He began with a brief résumé of part 1 which is available on our website:

Although many references were made to the diversity of wartime technology (much of which is available on the internet), Andy's contribution this time had the human touch: his own personal accounts of individuals who made such a difference to the war effort. The air force itself at Bexwell had a multinational flavour with input from many European countries: Australia, New Zealand, India and even Sierra Leone in Africa; it also boasts 3 posthumously awarded Victoria Crosses. The Irish and the Welsh built the runways with help from the local women who also provided much of the accommodation. (Aren't we blessed as a nation that our racial tolerance should have been rewarded by so much support?). The effort stretched across the whole spectrum of social class, from the humblest labourer to royalty. Andy cited an instance when the King and Queen visited the Bexwell Hall mess and their schedule was inconvenienced by a WAF who was unable to convey a royal flight plan by telephone because she had broken her teeth; apparently women's voices are better suited to relaying information by wire.

One particular character who has become a friend of Andy's since 2017 is the 102 year old Flt/Lt Colin Bell who often drives up from Kent to visit his young friend. Douglas Bader, Guy Gibson and Bomber Harris are famous names synonymous with WW2 heroism and glory; Colin Bell should be among them. http://www.militaryspeakers.co.uk/speakers/colin-bell-dfc/

Andy learnt from Colin that motivation and moral boosting among the young pilots was an ambivalent process: on the one hand moderate drinking, good food and chasing women was available and encouraged. NORFOLK FREEMASONS VISIT THE MAGPIECENTRE

The Magpie Centre, home of West Norfolk Riding for the Disabled Association, was recently awarded a £10,0000 grant from the Masonic Charitable Foundation, (MCF) and welcomed a group of Norfolk Freemasons on a fact-finding visit.

Mr Stephen Allen, Head of Norfolk Freemasons; Mr Robin Shaw, Provincial MCF representative and Mr Michael Spalding, Norfolk Freemasons' Provincial Communications Officer, visited the Centre, at Wallington Hall, South Runcton and met Mrs Bee Ford, West Norfolk RDA Chairwoman, plus several trustees and volunteers.

After tea and cakes, they spoke to Mr Aynsley Calvert and Ms Michelle Alflatt, two of the Magpie Centre's adult riders, and heard from them the difference that riding had made to their lives.

Mr Allen then presented them with rosettes, awarded by RDA National Office, for their participation in the RDA Dressage Championships, which were held 'virtually', owing to the pandemic.

RDA riders are grouped according to their levels of disability, and Ms Alflatt gained 6th place in Grade 1 (for the most disabled riders), while Mr Calvert placed in Grade 7 (Intellectual Disability).

The presentation took place in the Sensory Garden, opened by HRH the Princess Royal in July 2021, and the visitors met WNRDA Trustees Mrs Jan Calvert, whose idea it was, and Mr Andy Beeston, who, with his team of volunteers, undertook the construction work.

The wheelchair-friendly garden forms an excellent venue for the Centre's Tea With a Pony initiative, whereby older people, those with mobility issues, dementia, or who just like to socialise, can meet for tea and cakes and stroke some of the Centre's gentle ponies. This programme runs from April to October. To book, call the Magpie Centre Office on 01553 810202.

Trustee Mr Gerry McKenna was also on hand to outline the work of Equine Assisted Learning Therapy (EALT), a non-mounted activity which helps people with mental health issues to develop confidence, self-esteem and communication skills.

Highlight of the day was meeting RDA rider Isaac Everitt, aged 6, riding

Ginger.

Isaac's mother, Ms Jennifer Reeves, explained that Isaac, who is on the autistic spectrum and has Global Developmental Delay, had progressed rapidly since starting to ride in September 2022.

'I've noticed a huge improvement in Isaac's listening, communication and speaking skills since he started riding at the Centre,' she said.

At present the Centre has 12 equines, ranging from mounts suitable for tiny children, up to Irish Draft horse Ava, who carries the bigger riders. However, we are on the lookout for more horses, from 15.2 hh to 16.2 hh, for riding and/or carriage driving lessons.

We deliver 72 riding lessons per week, split 50/50 between child and adult riders, plus 19 carriage driving lessons, but there are currently 16 applicants on the waiting list.

Our next major fundraising event is a Quiz and Hog Roast, (with vegetarian option), plus a huge range of salads and desserts, to be held Saturday April 22 at Stowbridge Village Hall, Downham Road, Stowbridge, PE34 3PW. BARTON BENDISH NEWS APRIL

Whither the Hot Hub?

"When we break bread and give it to each other, fear vanishes and God becomes very close." Henri J.M. Nouwen

By the time you are reading this the Winter months will have passed, late snows notwithstanding, and the funding for warm spaces will be at an end. We still have £600 approx. of the county's generous grant yet to spend but we have three more afternoons of the Hot Hub and a Fish and Chip Evening scheduled for March.

I will be asked for an evaluation of the project but it very much depends on what we choose to measure. The Fish and Chip Evenings have attracted upwards of forty of our neighbours to eat together in the Village Hall. The afternoons have ranged between twelve and twenty three people, depending on the weather, other activities and personal circumstances. There have been a number of regulars and some of those have made it clear how much they look forward to the sessions. In the first place the scheme was designed to provide a warm space for those struggling with heating bills but increasingly I think that it has been more to do with combatting isolation and loneliness. In my opinion you can't begin to quantify what should be done to combat loneliness or to encourage everyone to feel a sense of belonging.

There are those who feel that it has been a waste of taxpayers' money but I believe that the Government's attempt to encourage social cohesion, after the terrible fragmentation brought on by the years of Covid, was very brave. Was it worthwhile?

I believe it was. If only a few people have felt the benefits of meeting regularly and have felt listened to, that is justification enough. Whether it continues or not will not be up to me of course. It would require the community to want it, some extra funding and some more volunteers. I am enormously grateful to Liz, Graham Read and Maureen Buck for making the sessions possible. Others have helped out too but I believe that there are many possibilities in the future with more funding and goodwill. Many older people, including me, are increasingly targeted by scammers and need to be educated in how to defend ourselves from this scourge. We are more and more driven towards technology. Older people need help with computing skills or even with using mobile phones better. Without these skills we risk being disenfranchised. Might it be possible to use drop in sessions to provide help as well as a cup of tea, a cake and a listening ear?

Whatever happens in the future, I have to say that these afternoons have been a real joy to me and a real indication of what might be possible.

Wednesday Walkers - March 2023

Beachamwell is fortunate in having 24 public rights of way for parishioners to explore. All these paths, where the public can legally walk, are numbered and recorded on the Definitive Map which is held by the Norfolk County Council. They are also shown on the Ordnance Survey map for the area.

The 1st March, 2023 found the Wednesday Walkers covering parts of footpaths numbered 6, 14, 15, 17 and 21 and bridleways numbered 9, 11 and 16.

These rights of way took us along the field edge to Sawpole Plantation, and to the Chapel on the Shingham Road. Then we walked along what is fondly known locally as 'Shingham Bypass, and on to the Warren. Here the skies darkened throwing light to make the lines of plantation trees stand out in sharp relief from the surrounding landscape – very beautiful! As we turned towards Larch Wood, the dark sky let loose its rain and wind, making us thankful for gloves, hoods and water-proof boots.



From Larchwood we passed through the arboretum where daffs were beginning to flower, and down the track to Shingham. West Norfolk residents need photo ID to vote at elections in May

For the first time, residents in King's Lynn and West Norfolk will need to show photographic ID to vote at this year's local elections. Residents are being urged

to make sure they are ready to vote in May by checking they have an accepted form of ID.

Accepted forms of ID include a UK, European Economic Area (EEA) or Commonwealth passport; a UK or EEA drivers' licence; and some concessionary travel passes, such as an older person's bus pass or an Oyster 60+ card. Voters will be able to use expired ID if they are still recognisable from the photo.

Anyone who does not have one of the accepted forms of ID will be able to apply for free ID online at www.gov.uk/apply-for-photo-id-voter-authority-certificate or by completing a paper form.

The full list of accepted ID is available on the Electoral Commission's website, along with more information about the new requirement and details of how to apply for the free ID, at www.electoralcommission.org.uk/i-am-a/voter/voter-id

Lorraine Gore, Returning Officer at the Borough Council of King's Lynn & West Norfolk, said:

"With borough elections taking place on 4 May 2023, it is important that those who want to vote make sure they have an accepted form of ID. It may seem early but checking now means you will be ready to vote in May.

"Residents who do not have one of the accepted forms of ID can apply for free ID either online or by completing a paper application form and sending this to the electoral services team at the borough council. If you need any help with applying for the free ID or want to request an application form, contact the electoral services team by calling 01553 616773 or e-mailing elections@west-norfolk.gov.uk"

Anyone who wants to have their say in the elections this May must also be registered to vote. It only takes five minutes to register online at www.gov.uk/ register-to-vote. Voters wishing to apply to their council for free ID should first make sure they are registered to vote. The requirement to show photo ID at the polling station, is a new requirement, introduced by the UK Government's Elections Act which was passed last year and comes into effect for the first time this May.

Including in the contract are four cuts four times a year to the verges that are in the central places of the village around the A134. The Clerk is awaiting confirmation from Highways on timings

of these cuts. The Parish Council arranges a contract to cut grass within the St Margaret's Churchyard; Pond Area; Play Area; Playing Field and Cemetery.

Wereham Pond - Ducks (Written on 8th March 2023)

- o The Parish Council found a deceased duck on the Wereham Pond grass today 8th March. It was necessary for the Parish Council to report the deceased duck to DEFRA due to avian flu circulating amongst wild birds at this time.
- o The duck has been taken away for DEFRA to test for avian flu. Should it be Avian flu the Parish Council will take the lead from DEFRA on the matter from that point.
- o In the meantime, please report any deceased birds found at the pond to the Parish Clerk by phone 07795006811 straight away (not Facebook or email), and they will officially report to DEFRA under the open report that the Parish Council now has.
- o As posted in the last few weeks and signs placed at the pond, please do not feed the ducks at the pond. With no feeding it will encourage them to disperse rather than travel to the pond and group together at the pond, encouraging grouping together by feeding puts them at risk of getting and spreading avian flu
- o Please ensure that if you see deceased wild birds at the pond not to touch them or move them and keep pets away. Please share this information with friends and neighbours who are not on Facebook.
- o And to note that the Parish Council are not advising you that there is avian flu at the pond, but there might be and this is all precautionary.






