# Tell Us Once - deaths

When someone has died there are lots of things that need to be done, at a time when you probably least feel like doing them. One of these is contacting government departments and local council services that need to be told.

Tell Us Once will enable you to notify the Department for Work and Pensions, HM Revenue and Customs, the DVLA and the Identity and Passport Service as well as many local services such as libraries, blue badges, housing and electoral services, to save you contacting them individually.

The Tell Us Once process for death notifications is in two stages.

The first stage is a legal requirement and is carried out immediately after a death registration: the Registrar will enter the deceased's details on the Tell Us Once national database.

The second stage can be completed at home either by telephone or online using the unique reference number given to you at the end of the registration by the Registrar.

Norfolk County Council and our district council partners provide a service to make it easier for you to tell the different government departments and local authority services that need to know about a death that happened in Norfolk.

You can use any of our nine registration offices

(http://www.norfolk.gov.uk/Community and living/Registration services/Registration Offices/index.htm) around the county to register an event that occurred in Norfolk.

# **COUNTRYSIDE NOTES**

One of the drawbacks of an English summer, apart from unpredictable weather, is flies. Apparently there are more than five thousand species in Britain which vary greatly in size. Some are useful, most are not. At least in England we're not plaqued with midges like Scotland or at risk of contracting malaria from mosquitoes although, having said that, it was rife in England's marshes and fens until the late nineteenth century. A few such as hover flies, which look like small wasps and dart about as well as hovering, are beneficial to plants as pollinators while lacewings feed on aphids, mealy bugs and spider mites. Most flies however cause considerable harm. Perhaps the most familiar are house flies which show no inclination to go back outside once indoors. They are the major carriers of disease being attracted to food and faeces, are annoying when they settle on you and appear to be immune to fly spray (but not a swat!). Bluebottles/blowflies are also horrible but at least they oblige by going out the window when you open it. Fruit or vinegar flies also turn up indoors to aggravate us. In winter *cluster flies* seek to hibernate in lofts. It is they that appear from nowhere indoors on a sunny winter's day. Often hibernating with them are minute yellow swarming flies.

Outdoors in summer there are black flies which swarm round our heads and sometimes bite and several species which plague livestock. So called horse flies inflict very painful bites to both animals and humans. The males actually feed on nectar and pollen, it's the females that go for blood - their mouthparts are like miniature knives which they use to slash through skin with a scissor-like motion. Clegs too are painful blood suckers. Greenbottles lay their eggs on a sheep's dirty wool. This is known as 'strike' and the maggots when they hatch out eat their way into the sheep's flesh. Large warble flies are parasitic with a most unpleasant life cycle. They lay their eggs on the forelegs of cattle and deer. When these hatch the larvae migrate through the body of the animal growing larger all the time and emerge through the skin along the back showing as large bumps from which huge maggots pop out. Thankfully warbles were eradicated from the UK in 1990. Less damaging but probably more stressful are autumn flies which plague cattle and horses by gathering round their heads in large numbers. They breed in animal dung as do khaki coloured dung flies which feed on any insects attracted to cowpats.

Another familiar fly is the *Crane fly*, better known as *'Daddy Long Legs'*, a large, flying, long-legged insect which can sometimes be disturbed in their thousands when walking across grassland in late summer. They themselves do not bite

although their larvae, better known as leatherjackets, cause untold damage beneath the ground by eating plant roots. The *carrot fly* and the *frit fly*, which can seriously damage cereals, are other major crop pests along with *aphids*, *thrips* and *greenfly*. *Jill Mason*

The CSV Futures Project supports young people with learning disabilities to explore their options as they think about leaving education.

Volunteer Mentors provide one to one support to a young person to help them develop a personal profile of their skills and interests, their likes and dislikes and their future goals. The Mentor can then support the young person to start working towards these; this can include accessing work experience and training opportunities plus the chance to try out volunteering and new social activities.

CSV needs volunteers who can offer a couple of hours of their time each week to mentor the young people as they make choices about their futures, raising aspirations by exploring together the young person's skills, interests and abilities.

#### Free home assessments on offer

Older, disabled or vulnerable residents of West Norfolk are being encouraged to book an appointment for a free home assessment from Careline Comunity Services.

The assessments, which are carried out by a team of qualified staff, will help residents, who may be living with a disability or dementia, or who are simply older and less mobile, to identify concerns in their property which may be affecting their day-to-day life.

The assessor, trained by the Disabled Living Foundation, will inspect the home to see whether measures could be introduced that would reduce the possibility of slips, trips and falls and generally make it easier for people to live safely and independently in their own homes.

Measures that could be considered include installation of a Careline personal alarm, improved lighting arrangements, heating checks, draught proofing, smoke detectors and easy-to-use taps along with recommendations for other adaptations that may reduce any potential risk to the resident. Practical solutions for those living with dementia are also available, this includes signage or colour differentiation for those who suffer with memory loss and are visually impaired.

The assessors will also be able to advise whether any grant funding is available for any works required.

When you have a medical appointment, if you ring our office on **01553 776971**, we will take some information, and then try to match you with one of our volunteer drivers. We take people to King's Lynn, Norwich and Cambridge area hospitals. Volunteer drivers are paid 45p per mile, so we try to arrange the closest and most appropriate driver. We ring you a few days closer to your appointment, confirming that you still want the transport, and the driver's name is provided.

### REGISTER OF ELECTORS

This year's annual registration exercise will be taking place from August onwards with publication of a revised Register of Electors following on 1<sup>st</sup> December.

The first part of the registration process is the issue of a Household Enquiry Form. This will be pre-printed with the names of anyone currently registered and a reply is needed regardless of whether or not any changes need to be made. Anyone whose name does not appear on the form and is aged 16 or over needs to be added and anyone no longer there deleted. The form will not itself register anyone new to an address; instead they will be sent an individual registration form.

The Electoral Registration Officer would verv much appreciate householders' co-operation in returning the Household Enquiry Form as quickly as possible. A prompt response to any individual registration forms issued would also be helpful. Online registration is now available at www.gov.uk/registertovote and only takes a few minutes. If anything is unclear, householders or individuals can contact:

When the sun comes out we say it is clearing **UP**. When it rains, it wets the earth and often messes things **UP**. When it doesn't rain for awhile, things dry **UP**.

### **Conservation Award**

Farming company Albanwise won this year's prestigious Mills and Reeve Grey Partridge Award in recognition of the species management work carried out across 1,800 hectares at Hill Farm in Barton Bendish.

Albanwise wildlife manager David Chandler said "There were 41 pairs of wild partridges on the estate when I arrived in 2009 even though there had been little game management previously. Within four years, with no artificial fostering or rearing at all, 310 pairs had been counted. From then on we started to change the farming practices and we brought in environmental stewardship – we are doing all we can to help them."

Anthony Blanchfield, environment manager for Albanwise, said "It was a great privilege to win the trophy. The grey partridge is such an iconic bird and is a barometer of the health of our countryside."

The trophy was presented at the Royal Norfolk Show.

This year Ernie Percival has taken it upon himself to keep the churchyard at St Mary's trimmed and what an admirable job he has been making of it. This little, quintessentially English, church, which wouldn't look out of place in one of Thomas Hardy's films, is on the redundant churches list and receives very little attention which is a great pity. ### St Mary's Church

The month of August brings us two important dates in the Christian calendar. On 6<sup>th</sup> of August we celebrate 'The Transfiguration of Our Lord'. This is an event reported in the New Testament describing how Jesus is transfigured and becomes radiant in glory upon the Mount of Tabor. In these accounts, Jesus and three of his apostles, Peter, James and John, go to the mountain to pray. On the mountain, Jesus begins to shine with bright rays of light, then the prophets Moses and Elijah appear next to him and he speaks with them. Jesus is then called "Son" by a voice in the sky, assumed to be God the Father.

The Transfiguration is one of the miracles of Jesus from the Gospels. This miracle is unique in that the miracle happens to Jesus himself.

In Christian teachings, the Transfiguration is a pivotal moment and the setting on the mountain is presented as the point where human nature meets God: the meeting place for the temporal and the eternal, with Jesus himself as the connecting point, acting as the bridge between heaven and earth.

Mount Tabor is located in Lower Galilee in Israel, 11 miles west of the Sea of Galilee. It is shaped almost like a perfect half-sphere, suddenly rising from rather flat surroundings and reaching a height of 575 metres (1,886 feet), thus dominating by a good 450 metres the next town in the plain below.

On August 15<sup>th</sup> The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary is celebrated by Christians all over the world. It marks the day that God assumed the Virgin Mary into heaven following her death, according to popular Christian belief.

If you happen to be on a foreign holiday during this festival you might observe some interesting traditional customs. In Italy it is celebrated by decorating streets with different colours of light and firework displays. People take the statue of the Virgin Mary through beautiful archways of flowers toward a statue of Christ symbolizing his awaiting for her to arrive in Heaven. The Assumption of Mary is also a very popular summer festival in Greece and some of its surrounding islands. This festival is a sign of love and harmony and is respected as a sacred festival.

We hope you can join us for the two monthly services at our church, either to discover more about the Christian belief or simply to enjoy hearing 'the word' and saying a prayer within the tranquil atmosphere of the beautiful ancient building we are lucky to have in our midst.

The monthly 'Tea and Chat' afternoons continue, thanks to the ongoing support of Sonia and Graham who, despite their move remain loyal to the village and our church.



It is with regret that we have to inform you Rev. Gillian Mann is no longer able to administer at our church due to health problems.

We shall miss her enthusiasm and passion with which she prepared services, participated in our village events and undertook the preparation of our church's Development Plan, in response to the 'Ely 2025 Strategy'.

We wish her all the best in her retirement and we shall pray for her recovery.
