Lemon and Courgette Tray Bake

For many people, lockdown presented an opportunity to rediscover a forgotten love of baking. With this in mind, the Norfolk WI produced a monthly flyer with recipes to try. Heather Jeary and Carol Makins produced this in their August 2020 edition. Go to the Norfolk WI website for more.

Ingredients

250g sugar 250g plain flour 235ml vegetable oil 3 eggs 2tsp bicarbonate soda 2tsp lemon zest ½ teaspoon salt 60ml lemon juice 100g chopped walnuts or pecans 200g grated courgette 1 tbsp icing sugar to sieve over for decoration

Method

- 1. Heat oven 180°C / gas 4. Line and grease a traybake tin 24 x 30 cm approx
- 2. Large bowl mix sugar and eggs, then add oil, lemon juice and zest, mix. Add grated courgette.
- 3. in a separate bowl mix flour, bicarbonate of soda, baking powder and salt. Mix into the courgette mixture and stir in the walnuts.
- 4. pour mixture into prepared tin and bake for about 35 40 minutes, until a skewer comes out clean. Cool
- 5. Sieve over the icing sugar once cold and cut cake into squares to serve
 6. Variations: use ½ wholemeal flour, add 1tsp ginger

August 3, 1492 - Christopher Columbus set sail from Palos, Spain, with three ships, *Nina*, *Pinta* and *Santa Maria*. Seeking a westerly route to the Far East, he instead landed on October 12th in the Bahamas, thinking it was an outlying Japanese island.

August 1, 1944 - Anne Frank penned her last entry into her diary. "[I] keep on trying to find a way of becoming what I would like to be, and what I could be, if...there weren't any other people living in the world." Three days later, Anne and her family were arrested and sent to Nazi concentration camps. Anne died at Bergen-Belsen concentration camp on March 15, 1945, at age 15.

August 13, 1961 - The Berlin Wall came into existence after the East German government closed the border between east and west sectors of Berlin with barbed wire to discourage emigration to the West. The barbed wire was replaced by a 12 foot-high concrete wall eventually extending 103 miles (166 km) around the perimeter of West Berlin. The wall included electrified fences, fortifications, and guard posts. It became a notorious symbol of the Cold War. Presidents Kennedy and Reagan made notable appearances at the wall accompanied by speeches denouncing Communism. The wall was finally opened by an East German governmental decree in November 1989 and torn down by the end of 1990.

NEW TABLES FOR THE MAGPIE CENTRE

Official opening of the Sensory Garden at the Magpie Centre, home of West Norfolk Riding for the Disabled Association, is drawing closer, and the garden will be of particular benefit to Tea With a Pony participants, many of whom are living with dementia or sensory impairment.

Tea With a Pony mornings, which will re-commence in September, enable people, many of whom live in care homes, and their carers, to enjoy a social get-together, with tea and cakes, and meet some of our lovely ponies.

Thanks to the work of loyal volunteers, the planting is almost complete, and the flowers and shrubs have taken well, helped greatly by the recent unsettled weather.

However to complete the Sensory Garden project, we need two hardwood tables, around which wheelchair users and their carers can be accommodated. These cost £600 each, so donations with these in mind would be much appreciated.

Also, Magpie Centre Yard Manager, Natalie Dade said: 'Some of our yard equipment is coming to the end of its useful life, so we need to replace it.' Items needed are; grooming kits, manure scoops, brooms, shaving forks and clipper blades.

'Many of our ponies are cobs, with heavy coats,' she explained, 'so they need clipping regularly to keep them cool and comfortable in work. At up to £45 a pair for clipper blades, their maintenance does not come cheap,' she added.

THE MAGPIE CENTRE

Monday July 12 saw an action-packed afternoon at the Magpie Centre, Wallington Hall, home of West Norfolk Riding for the Disabled Association, when Her Royal Highness the Princess Royal, RDA President, arrived to tour the Centre and open the Sensory Garden.

On arrival, Her Royal Highness was greeted by Mr James Bagge, Deputy Lieutenant of Norfolk, Mr John and Mrs Tian Plaxton, owners of Wallington Hall, Mr Peter Tobitt, RDA Norfolk County Chairman and Mr Colin Perriss, West Norfolk RDA Chairman.

After touring the stables, meeting and chatting to groups of staff, riders, volunteers, and some horses, Her Royal Highness watched a riding lesson in the indoor school.

Highlight of the visit was a trip to the Sensory Garden, created to support the Magpie Centre's Tea With a pony initiative. This enables care home residents, people living with dementia and other sensory impairment to socialize over tea and cakes and meet some of the ponies.

While in the Sensory Garden, Her Royal Highness met World War II veteran Mr John Moran, from King's Lynn Residential Home, and his carer, Ms Julie Godfrey, before unveiling a plaque commemorating the official opening.

To celebrate carriage driving, which the Magpie Centre offers in addition to riding, RDA carriage driver Mr Aynsley Calvert, accompanied by Carriage Driving Instructor Ms Jody Voigt gave a display in an adjoin paddock weaving expertly through a course of cones.

Finally a group of students from West Walton School presented Her Royal Highness with a posy, before she departed by car.

Said Mr Perriss: 'We were delighted to welcome Her Royal Highness the Princess Royal to the Magpie Centre to formally open the Sensory Garden which is an integral part of our Tea With a Pony experience. It was a great opportunity for her to meet our dedicated staff, riders, volunteers and supporters, including those who created the Sensory Garden.'

'We are extremely grateful to Her Royal Highness for taking the time to visit us, to learn more about what we do and how the support of so many people and businesses from the local community helped us through the difficult periods of lockdown,' he added.

Free home assessments on offer

Older, disabled or vulnerable residents of West Norfolk are being encouraged to book an appointment for a free home assessment from Careline Community Services.

The assessments, which are carried out by a team of qualified staff, will help residents, who may be living with a disability or dementia, or who are simply older and less mobile, to identify concerns in their property which may be affecting their day-to-day life. The assessor, trained by the Disabled Living Foundation, will inspect the home to see whether measures could be introduced that would reduce the possibility of slips, trips and falls and generally make it easier for people to live safely and independently in their own homes.

Measures that could be considered include installation of a Careline personal alarm, improved lighting arrangements, heating checks, draught proofing, smoke detectors and easy-to-use taps along with recommendations for other adaptations that may reduce any potential risk to the resident. Practical solutions for those living with dementia are also available, this includes signage or colour differentiation for those who suffer with memory loss and are visually impaired.

The assessors will also be able to advise whether

August 26, 1883 - One of the most catastrophic volcanic eruptions in recorded history occurred on the Indonesian island of Krakatoa. Explosions were heard 2,000 miles away. Tidal waves 120 ft. high killed 36,000 persons on nearby islands, while five cubic miles of earth were blasted into the air up to a height of 50 miles.

August 14, 1945 - Following the two Atomic Bomb drops and believing that continuation of the war would only result in further loss of Japanese lives, delegates of Emperor Hirohito accepted Allied surrender terms originally issued at Potsdam on July 26, 1945, with the exception that the Japanese Emperor's sovereignty would be maintained. Japanese Emperor Hirohito, who had never spoken on radio, then recorded an announcement admitting Japan's surrender, without actually using the word. The announcement was broadcast via radio to the Japanese people at noon the next day. The <u>formal surrender ceremony</u> occurred later, on September 2, 1945, on board the USS *Missouri* in Tokyo Bay.

Could you help a young person with a disability to think about their Future?

The CSV Futures Project supports young people with learning disabilities to explore their options as they think about leaving education.

Volunteer Mentors provide one to one support to a young person to help them develop a personal profile of their skills and interests, their likes and dislikes and their future goals. The Mentor can then support the young person to start working towards these; this can include accessing work experience and training opportunities plus the chance to try out volunteering and new social activities.

CSV needs volunteers who can offer a couple of hours of their time each week to mentor the young people as they make choices about their futures, raising aspirations by exploring together the young person's skills, interests and abilities.

We are looking for people ages 16+ - Mentors can come from all walks of life and no experience is needed but patience, the ability to listen and a sense of humour are all useful skills. Mentors receive full training and support and out of pocket expenses are paid.

COUNTRYSIDE NOTES

Our Garden August 2021

Barton's Open Gardens on June 27th was an astounding success and I think our garden was the best it's ever been. Why? Is it because we had a hard winter? Or a dry although frosty April followed by a wet spell then a hot spell? Is it because we then had a couple of weeks when it was cool? Or maybe because I gave the flower borders a dressing of Vitax Q4? It's probably a combination of everything. Anyone who gardens knows that two years are never the same.

Other than aiming to have colour all year round, no planning whatever goes into our flower borders. Any gaps that appear get filled. If I'm given a plant I somehow find a space for it. Through trial and error I've learned which plants will grow happily here and those that won't. Some cheerfully self-seed, although not always where I want them, but if that's where they choose to be then I leave them to get on with it.

Our flower borders are never spectacular but this year looked good because May-time flowers like pyrethrums, which have usually finished by mid-June, hung on. The cool spell of weather helped them and for once the roses against the walls didn't get scorched in the heat or damaged by torrential rain.

We have a large mix of flowers, principally perennials, in the borders. I grew a few annuals from seed in our unheated conservatory but the cold April nights delayed their growth. It would have been rewarding if my antirrhinums, African marigolds and nicotiana had managed to show a bit of colour. The week preceding Open Gardens is always spent with fingers crossed that the clematis, alstroemerias, hollyhocks and begonias will have a few flowers out. Some did, others didn't.

David and I spent the whole time in our back garden and visitors just kept coming nonstop. Lots of people asked questions about our plants and how we grew them. I was equipped with a garden flower book and had marked off those which I knew from experience I'd be asked about. Needless to say more than half a dozen people wanted to know about one which I had no idea what it was! David has now downloaded a really useful app on his phone. Take a picture of the plant and it tells you what it is.

Flower gardens to me though are much more than a display of plants – they are treasured memories. The difficulty I have identifying plants is because over the years the majority have been given to us and are referred to by the donors' names. We have Florrie Clark, Tregus, Masey, Sheila and fuschias that go by the names of Mum, Bill, Caroline and Fred. In fact the last two are originals over

forty years old and have survived five house moves!!

I felt sorry for those who opened their gardens but were tied up with ticket selling and catering and regret there was no time to look round other peoples' gardens.

Open Gardens June 27th

For the last month or so, Barton Bendish has been preparing for Open Gardens Day. Last year we did it virtually on social media. This year's fears about everchanging Covid regulations, natural caution after a year of Lockdown and the unpredictable weather kept us guessing about what kind of numbers to expect.

Just over a week ago volunteers, including some American servicemen, gathered at St Andrew's to weed and tidy up the churchyard, apply gravel to areas around the church, apply beeswax to ancient doors and spring clean. The community library was spruced up and plans made to dispose of the significant surplus of books, DVDs and LPs. We only have so much space for the library, valuable as it is as a community asset. It was heart-warming to see the community coming together for the good of the village.

The day itself couldn't have been better. 536 people visited the village and a number of its gardens. Over £5,700 was raised, making this the most successful Open Gardens ever. There was a clear sense of delight amongst visitors that, having done very little for so long, to be involved in such a lively event was very welcome. After five years I may have thought I knew a lot about Barton but, for me, the highlight of the day was visiting our neighbour's garden on Hatherley Gardens. She hadn't the confidence to open her garden before – and many don't. I have tried to say to people that it isn't about having a pristine garden and that it's more about hospitality – the whole village is on display after all. Anyway, her garden, which had been a wilderness when she moved in 8 years ago, had been transformed into a wonderful tropical garden. It is one of the village's hidden gems. I hope that it will always be open in future years and that those others who are reluctant to share their gardens with others will think again.

Barton Bendish punches above its weight and does so because there are enough people willing to get involved. Of course, we have to be organised by the PCC which is a real powerhouse. A huge number of ploughman's lunches were served, the cake stall sold out regularly, the vintage cars were admired and Pimms was enjoyed by many. Several people commented on how lovely the village is.

It was good to see the newly extended, vastly improved Village Hall unleashed on the public. It is a credit to the present village and a fitting memorial to those who put hours of devoted service into it over many decades.

The proceeds of a memorable, and hugely enjoyable, day will go towards the

Good news and new life on Boughton Fen

It is nice to have some good news to write about amidst all the gloom and doom of the pandemic. The CPRE awards have been in touch very recently, following the visit from their judge, to let us know that Boughton Fen will be receiving an award in the early autumn. They hope to hold an award ceremony, Covid permitting, so that will be something to look forward to.

Back on site, several weeks ago, while Tawny Owl chicks were being ringed, it became apparent that there was a Marsh Harrier nest very close by. Our intrepid local expert investigated, and found that there were three viable chicks, which he was able to ring. As they became larger, he was able to make arrangements to have these youngsters wing-tagged, which means that their movements can be recorded wherever they are. The people who perform the ringing and tagging are licensed to carry out these processes, and they also take various

measurements and other data from the chicks at the same time. One of them has been seen flying already, so they may not stay around for much longer.

Norfolk-tagged Marsh harriers have been seen as far north as Norway and as far south as Senegal in West Africa. Anyone who has spent much time on the fen over the past few months will be aware that there have been quite large numbers of marsh harriers moving around the immediate vicinity consistently throughout the year. We are fairly confident that there have been other nests, either on Boughton Fen, or on the adjacent land.

In UK terms, Marsh harriers are no more common than Golden Eagles. It's just that we're lucky enough to live in a hot-spot for the harriers, whereas we have as much chance of seeing a flying saucer in Norfolk as we have a Golden Eagle.

From Boughton Parish Council.

On Tuesday 6th July, Boughton Parish Council had its first face-to-face meeting in 16 months with lockdown restrictions easing. Full COVID-19 protection measures were observed.

We noted that following several approached to Highways over the years, new bollards have now been installed on Chapel Road to help protect our verges. We also noted that a Highways subcontractor had inadvertently sprayed weed killer along the verge edges, instead of simply alongside kerb stones. This should not now reoccur.

The council approved the purchase and installation of emergency equipment for the pond following an independent water safety risk assessment. This will consist of a throw rope mounted on a post near the edge of the pond to be used if anyone gets onto difficulty in the water. While this is a low likelihood scenario, we cannot in good conscience ignore the risk assessment we ourselves commissioned.

For the Queen's Platinum Jubilee in June 2022 we will be planting a new tree on The Green (as was done for the Silver Jubilee in 1977). It will be sited on the East side of the pond and will be a variety that will give good colour during the year. The council have received its annual playground inspection report and have taken steps to keep the equipment safe. We inspect it on a monthly basis looking for deterioration, but if you see anything that needs attention, please get in touch. We are aware that the litter bin does not always get emptied as it should, so volunteers have to deal with it.

The SAM2 speed awareness sign continues to give good information about the behaviour of traffic through our village. I'd like to remind everyone that even if you go past the sign just a couple of miles per hour over the limit and think that is "OK", it isn't. Be aware that stopping distances increase dramatically with every mile per hour. For example, if you see an obstacle (like a duck, — or a child!) 75 feet in front of you and hit the brakes at 30 miles an hour you will stop in time. If you are doing 32mph, you will still be doing 11mph when you reach 75 feet. At 35mph you will hit the obstacle at 18mph, enough to do serious damage. Please watch your speed.

We hope that now pandemic restrictions are easing, we can get back to some level of normality. If you are planning, or just thinking about an event for the village, please get in touch. The council can help with permissions, publicity, facilities and possibly even insurance. Let's all help "Boughton Bounce Back".
