BENEFICE NEWS

At the time of writing, our Priest in Charge Barbara Burton is on sick leave and we do not know when she will return to work. I'm sure we would all wish to send our regards and best wishes for a speedy return to health.Thanks to the generosity of the people who take services for us, we hope that all carol services, Christmas services and the regular pattern will continue as planned. Please contact your churchwardens for updates. There will be a meeting with the Archdeacon on 9th December.

On 16th November, the Archdeacon hosted a 'Roadshow' at St Edmund's Downham Market, to discuss the Ely Strategy for the future. It dealt with the need to look at what we do and seek to grow the church, perhaps using our resources in new ways.

The Church of England's income maybe bigger than a certain burger joint but then we have far more outlets to spend it on.

Our income is all ploughed back into our seven day a week work supporting our priests and churches who provide a Christian presence in every community. Our 16,000 church buildings, house foodbanks, credit unions, post offices, libraries and places for reflection, prayer and worship. Not to mention providing a home for clubs and groups for all ages, often being the main point of contact in the community.

More than 80% of people visit a church every year. Our churchgoers contribute 23.2 million hours of voluntary service a month with more than 100,000 church volunteers working regularly with children & young people. More people do voluntary unpaid work for church organisations than any other.

Our clergy support local schools, offering a pastoral role and more than one million pupils are educated in church schools. 10 million people visited our cathedrals last year with weekly worshippers rising by one fifth in the past decade. Our clergy lead more than 3,000 funerals a week - and CofE funerals are available for everyone - giving support before, during and after the service, for as long as it's needed.

CHRISTMAS IN THE PALESTINIAN TERRITORIES



Christmas is very important in the Palestinian territory of the West Bank as it contains Bethlehem, the town in which Jesus was born. Bethlehem is about six miles (10 kilometres) south of Jerusalem (which is in Israel). Bethlehem means 'house of bread' and back in history was famous for growing wheat for making into bread.

Only about 20% of Palestinians are Christian, but many Muslim Palestinians are also proud that Jesus was born in a Palestinian Territory!

On Christmas Eve there is a parade through the town. This is very important to the Christian part of the population. There are bagpipe bands in the parade, which you might not expect! Playing the bagpipes is a tradition left over from when the British army occupied the area between 1920 and 1948. People also dress up as Santa Claus and give out sweets. The streets and main square are decorated with lights.

Perhaps the most famous part of Christmas in Bethlehem is the church service of the Mass of the Nativity. It is held on Christmas Eve afternoon/evening/ midnight in the Church of the Nativity. The Church is built over the place where it's traditionally thought that Jesus was born. There's a small door into the Church called the door of humility. The church was built, by the romans, about 500 years after Jesus was born. The most holy part of the church is the Grotto of the Nativity, which is under the main altar. A silver star marks the place where Jesus was meant to have been born.


It had been prophesied in the Bible that the Jewish Messiah or Savior (who Christians believe Jesus is) would be born in Bethlehem.

The Church is administered by three churches, the Roman Catholic Church, the Greek Orthodox Church and the Armenian Apostolic Church. The Mass service is led by the Roman Catholic Bishop of Jerusalem. Many local political people go to the service, Christians, Muslims and Jews. The church is crowded and lots of frankincense, one of the gifts bought to the baby Jesus, is burnt. People also sing Christmas Carols on Christmas Eve evening in Manger Square, a large paved courtyard in front of the Church.

The Greek Orthodox and Armenian Apostolic Churches don't celebrate Christmas on December 25th, but rather January 6th & 7th. They hold services on those days.

COUNTRYSIDE NOTES DECEMBER 2015

VILLAGE SIGNS. I've always found village signs interesting because they're usually the result of local people getting together to create a design depicting a characteristic feature of the village, part of its history, a local legend and often to mark a significant national occasion. They all began when Edward VII made the suggestion, when cars were first appearing on roads, that a picturesque sign in a prominent position would aid the identification of places. The first four village signs were erected on the Sandringham Estate in 1912. Prince Albert, Duke of York, further encouraged the idea in 1920 and King George V voiced his support in 1924.

Barton once had three churches, St Mary's, St Andrew's and the long gone All Saints; these are shown on our sign together with a sheaf of wheat depicting the importance of agriculture to the village. Above are two blue and white symbols of St Andrew. Money for the project was raised from 'bonanzas' held in the village and the fibreglass sign was unveiled in 1990. Beachamwell's sign is the village name created simply in wrought iron by architectural metal worker Barry Rowe of Demax from Narborough, a business he founded in 1971. It is supported by an oak post shaped by John Sanderson and was erected in July 1978 commemorate the Queen's silver to jubilee. Originally the Boughton sign, unveiled by the Bishop of Ely in 1972, depicted a horse drawn wagon but the more recent one was carved from oak earlier this century by Boughton resident Denzil Davies. It shows the Domesday name of Buchetuna, the pond with ducks rising on either side and the church in the background. Best kept village awards won by Boughton are displayed on the supporting post.

Wereham's wooden sign depicts the church of St Margaret with a red cloaked priest kneeling in front. Included are cameos of Billy the seal, a resident of the village pond in the 1920s, and the village pump. Unusually on the reverse side is a further picture of a man offering Billy some ale with the pub in the background. Other signs that have attracted my attention are the wrought iron one at Harpley representing local flora and fauna with oak leaves, a sheaf of corn, a pheasant on the left and a hare on the right; I used this in my Hare book. Weeting, near Brandon, has a lovely sign showing the terrace of ten dwellings, believed to be the longest continuous row of thatched houses in England, with a rabbit on one side and a stone curlew on the other. One of my favourites though is at Wretham, near Thetford. On it are a ram's head, marking an old tradition of letting a ram loose among the tenants which they could keep if they could catch

it. There are also trees representing the surrounding forestry, French partridges, the shooting in the 1800s and a witch because witchcraft persisted until the 19th century.

GARDENING TIPS FOR DECEMBER AND JANUARY

First of all I do apologise for the absence of my November article. Having written for the October edition of Group 4 News just prior to going off on a cruise, I'm afraid an article for November was far from my thoughts at that time. I had made a list of all the jobs to complete in the garden before departing, but I am sorry to say, an article for your magazine was not listed!! I did write one as soon as I returned, having been prompted by Pam Wakeling but, I regret to say, it was too late for publication. Sorry, an age related moment perhaps!!

We are at the end of another gardening year. In many respects the year has been quite kind to us despite periods of cooler than average conditions. The big question now is "What does the winter have in store for us all"? There were grave forecasts a few weeks ago that developments in the central/southern Pacific Ocean could bring us quite a severe winter. However, I have neither heard nor seen anything more about that particular scenario so I suspect things did not quite turn out as expected. I must admit however, to being somewhat concerned that we shall ultimately have to pay for all the mild weather we are experiencing as I write.

I hope you have all managed to get those last minute jobs completed so that it matters not what the season brings. You will then be able to relax and enjoy the forthcoming festivities without having to think about all those jobs that should have been done, but weren't!

My late vacation, and the very wet conditions that we have experienced since I returned, have meant that, at the time of writing, I am desperately trying to complete alterations to my garden, and at the same time endeavouring to catch up with the essential work on the lawns. Things that did not cause a lot of difficulty when in one's younger years suddenly become problems later in life. Fortunately, I am very lucky in still enjoying good health and the ability to get most things done, but even so I am trying to make the garden easier to look after. Hence the alterations.

Unless you have a greenhouse, or a conservatory, there is not much you can do garden wise in December and January. Keep an eye on your stored fruit and vegetables to ensure that none are decaying, and quickly throw out anything that is in trouble. Similarly, if you have dahlias stored away, look over them every so often to ensure that they are in good condition. If you have a tuber that shows signs of mould, clean it up with a clean cloth and put it somewhere safely for a few days to dry off before returning it to store. If you have a major problem then follow the above practise but in addition if you find rot then cut the individual tuber off. A dusting with' flowers of sulphur' when the tubers are returned to

store will often stop such conditions returning.

For those of you who are really keen and intend growing onions and shallots for the show bench then early in January is the time to make your first sowings and plantings. It's a bit too early in January to start dahlias and chrysanthemums into growth, but if you are hoping to enter either of these in the early summer shows then start them up early in February to take the first cuttings later that month or early in March.

So much for 2015, let us now look forward to 2016 and all that it may bring.





Paprikache with Soured Cream

(serves 4)

4 tbsp oil

1lb onions, skinned and finely sliced

1 tsp caraway seeds

1 tsp dried marjoram

1lb carrots, peeled and thinly sliced

2 heaped tbsp paprika

1/2 tsp chilli powder (or hot paprika)

1 tbsp wine vinegar

2lb potatoes, peeled and cut into chunks

Small pot of soured cream to serve

Heat oil in a heavy pan and add sliced onions. Sprinkle with salt, the caraway and marjoram. Fry gently, stirring regularly, until the onions soften – don't let them brown and don't hurry.

Push onions to one side and heat carrots for a moment (you might need to add a little more oil at this point). Stir in paprika and chilli and sizzle for a second before adding the vinegar. Add potatoes and stir. Pour in a glass of water and allow to bubble up.

Turn down heat, cover and leave to cook gently in its own juices for about 1 hour, until the potatoes are perfectly tender. Check occasionally and add a splash of water if it starts to stick. Alternatively, cook in the oven for an hour at 180° C / 350° F / gas mark 4.

Serve with soured cream spooned on top.

Future Plans for Marham

The Parish Council Meeting held on November 11th began with a presentation by the Royal Air Force at Marham outlining what would be happening during the next few years. Lightening 11 F35Bs are scheduled to arrive at the base in August 2018 after which the Tornadoes will be gradually phased out. The new planes have short take-off and vertical landing capabilities. However much construction work needs to be carried out before then including a new runway, refurbishing the main runway and building new facilities. This is due to begin next spring and inevitably there will be a large number of construction vehicles involved which is of major concern to local villages even though they are supposed to be confined to using major routes and not B roads.



Creative Writing Group In Beachamwell

My wife and I are moving to Beachamwell this month and I am keen to set up a creative writing group in the village. I am a published writer and President of the Suffolk Poetry Society. I was born and brought up in the Hebridean island of

Begin by measuring the water into a preserving pan, then cut the lemon and oranges in half and squeeze the juice out of them. Add the juice to the water and place the pips and any bits of pith that cling to the squeezer on the square of muslin (laid over a dish or cereal bowl first). Now cut the orange peel into quarters with a sharp knife and then cut each quarter into thinnish shreds. As you cut add the shreds to the water and any pips or spare pith you come across should go into the muslin. The pith contains a lot of pectin so do not discard any and don't worry about any pith and skin that clings to the shreds as it all gets dissolved in the boiling.

Now tie the pips etc. up loosely in the muslin to form a little bag and tie this onto the handle of the pan so that the bag is suspended in the water. Bring the liquid up to simmering point and simmer gently, uncovered for 2 hours approximately until the peel is completely soft. Put the saucers into the fridge at this point.

Next remove the bag of pips and leave it to cool. Pour the sugar into the pan and stir it now and then over a low heat until all the crystals have melted (check this carefully, this stage is important). Now increase the heat to very high and squeeze the bag of pips over the pan to extract all of the sticky, jelly like substance that contains the PECTIN. Stir well.

As soon as the mixture reaches a really fast boil, start timing. After 15 minutes spoon a little onto one of the chilled saucers and let it cool, back in the fridge. You can tell when the mixture has cooled if you have a set by pushing the mixture with your little finger; if it has a really crinkly skin then it has set. If not, continue to boil the marmalade and give the same test every ten minutes until you have a set.

After that remove the pan from the heat (if there is a lot of scum, most can be dispersed by stirring in half a teaspoon of butter). Leave the marmalade to settle for 20 minutes.

In the meantime the jars (washed, rinsed and dried first) should be heated in a moderate oven for 5 minutes. Pour the marmalade, with the help of a ladle, into the clean jars and cover with waxed discs and seal while still hot. Enjoy – we look forward to lots of entrees......

As Marmalade is on the Schedule for 2016 we thought you might like to have a traditional Seville Orange Marmalade recipe to try and enter (hide one jar for the event). By the time you receive the G4N for Dec/Jan the Seville oranges should be available.

Seville Orange Marmalade (makes approx 6 x 450g jars)

2lb Seville Oranges (900g)

4 pints water (2.25 litres)

1 Lemon

4 lb Granulated Sugar (1.8kg) warmed

You will also need a 9 inch (23cm) square of gauze, string and three or four saucers.



Boughton Fen Report for Parish Council Meeting 23.10.2015

We have now completed our programme of summer cutting on both Highland and Lower Fens which should promote more diverse vegetation in these areas.

Our summer visitors have now flown off to warmer climes for the winter, enabling us to start our winter work programme. Quotes are awaited from new scrub clearance contractors who will replace our long serving contractor, Greenfingers Countryside. The clearance works should be underwayin the near future to help control the expanding areas of scrub and re-growth.

Our reed cutting programme should continue in the new year, with a further four to five acres in our sights.

The first working party of the year took place last Saturday, 17th October 2015.

A large area of willow re-growth was successfully cut down and treated, to hopefully allow the reed to recover in this area.

Two younger members of the village have been involved in the fen recently – one starting his Duke of Edinburgh community service put in a fantastic effort last Saturday at the working party; and the second preparing an 'A' level presentation on wetland management.

We have also had two plant surveys carried out in different areas of the fen which shouldgive us a further insight into the flora that we have here.

Welcome again to Boughton Cricket Club (BCC),

We are an up and coming small, locally-run club which plays its home matches at its own ground, a short distance from the village centre at Boughton near Stoke Ferry, Norfolk. The club plays friendly, social cricket on weekends and evenings throughout the summer months. You may know that BCC applied for a grant from Sport England in the early summer of this year to erect a pavilion at the ground off Wretton Road. This followed a design phase and successful planning application at the end of 2014.

The wonderful news that I am able to pass on to you all now is that the application for grant funding has been successful with the club being awarded approx.£54K towards the total building cost of approx, £72K. Obviously this is fantastic news for the club and I am also delighted to tell you that after further debate and consideration the club committee voted unanimously at a meeting on Mon 19th October 2015 to accept the grant offer.

You will note that there is an £18K shortfall in the funding which that club has committed to fund raise to enable the project to progress. The club is further constrained by Sport England rules which dictate that the project has to have begun within 6 months of the offer and be complete within 18months. Pledges, donations and reserves within the club of approx. £2500 have given us a head start towards the target but obviously there is considerable work to be done.

Two subcommittees have been formed, one to oversee the project design and build and the other to fundraise so anything that you can do on either of these fronts would be greatly appreciated but no doubt you will hear from these committees very soon and in particular the fund raising side of things.

The club really does now need everyone's help on this so please volunteer your services and get involved to make this happen. It is a wonderful opportunity for the club, village and local community to progress the project and for us all to enjoy a fine building in a beautiful setting whilst enjoying some cricket. *Steve Short*

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
CHRISMONS AND CHRISMON PATTERNS

Chrismons are Christmas decorations with Christian symbols on them. They help Christians to remember that Christmas is the celebration of Jesus's birthday. They are often used on Christmas Trees in Churches and Christians homes.

They were first made by Frances Kipps Spencer at the Ascension Lutheran Church in Danville, Virginia, USA. She also thought of the word, Chrismon, which is a combination of Christ and monogram (meaning symbol). The idea quickly spread to other churches. It is traditional that Christian groups can make their own Chrismons with their favourite symbols on.

Each year a 20ft (6 metre) Christmas Tree is decorated in the Ascension Lutheran Church, as Mrs Spencer intended, and visitors come and the hear the story of Jesus explained through her original Chrismons and a few gifts from around the world.

Chrismons are traditionally coloured white and gold. White is the liturgical (or Church) colour for Christmas and symbolises that Jesus was pure and perfect. Gold symbolises His Majesty and Glory. Chrismons can be made from nearly anything, but paper and embroidered ones are the most widely used. You can find them online if you search for Chrismons.

People Fully Alive: Ely 2025 -a strategy for growth

The Diocese of Ely has formally launched a new strategy, unambiguously aimed at transformation and growth.

This strategy has arisen out of Bishop Stephen's call to imagine our future and from the development over the last few years of a diocesan vision and set of imperatives.

We pray to be generous and visible people of Jesus Christ' is our diocesan vision. It gives us a picture of the kind of church and people of God we hope to be. It gives us something to aim for.

The 'we' is the diocese in all its forms-individuals, PCCs, parishes, deaneries and diocesan bodies

-all of us are invited on this journey to continue to discern what God is calling us to be:a

people fully alive here in Cambridgeshire and West Norfolk.

The strategy in its final format has been shaped by the 2,000 plus people who attended the consultation roadshows across the diocese, and the insightful and prayerful responses of individuals, parishes and groups who contributed to the survey. Overwhelmingly there is a desire and sense of urgency for change. There is an appetite to engage with, and welcome, steps towards transformation and growth. There is a widespread desire to cherish the past but to invest in the future. So the strategy aims to begin to help us map out the future of the church over the next ten years

This is a huge challenge. It means there has to be new ways of working, it will take time to adjust to,and not everything will be able to be done at once. We will need to pace ourselves as we immerse ourselves into the unfolding narrative of becoming people fully alive. Key signposts in the strategy are the levers of change. These provide a common language and focus for ourpriorities and actions. The levers set the agenda and overall direction of travel as we

begin now to identify the opportunities and challenges ahead.

The levers are:

Nurture a confident people of God

Develop healthy churches

Serve the community

•

Re-imagine our buildings

•

Target support to key areas.

The strategy will be fully integrated with the outworking of mission and ministry in the diocese. We will, as our imperatives indicate, engage fully and courageously with the needs of our communities, locally and globally; grow God's church by finding disciples and nurturing leaders; and we will deepen our commitment to God through word, worship and prayer.

None of this will work without being deeply rooted in God's grace, help and blessing.

No work of ours is of any use at all unless we seek to abide deeply and continuously in the divine life and love. We wish to be rooted in prayer

Speaking of our strategy, Bishop Stephen says: 'As much as anything else our strategy is a call to prayer. We pray ... that we may be the people God calls us to be, fully alive in Him.'

Part of Brian Hullah's thoughtful reflection on the future of local churches.....the rest was specifically Shouldham, but could apply in general to most of us, where a small number struggle to keep the villages' historical assets in good condition.

A Cautionary Tale - Over a number of years, we have often mentioned the problem of upkeep of All Saints' church. The Church of England has recently floated the proposal to create "Festival Churches" in those parishes where the regular, average attendance at services is 10 or less. This will apply predominantly to rural churches when the services would be held only on the great Christian festivals, ie: Christmas, Easter, etc. Thus the usage of the buildings for normal worship would be drastically reduced, for reasons of declining attendance, and the increasing difficulty of recruiting clergy willing to work in country areas.

This concept of Festival Churches is currently only a proposal. But – with many large groups of parishes already in the care of just one priest – this reduction in services/usage seems highly likely to materialise. The Diocese of Ely is holding a number of regional meetings to outline its long-term strategy, and by the time you read this we may have a clearer idea of how Shouldham church could be affected.

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
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Christmas in Ghana



People in Ghana celebrate Christmas from the 20th of December to the first week in January with lots of different activities. Many people travel to visit their relatives and friends in other parts of the country. Over 66 languages are spoken in Ghana and all these language groups have their own traditions and customs!

December is also the start of the cocoa harvest (the bean that make chocolate) in Ghana. Ghana is the worlds second biggest cocoa producer. I really like some fair-trade chocolate that's made with cocoa from Ghana!

Christmas Eve night is the time when the celebrations really start with Church services that have drumming and dancing. Children often put on a Nativity Play or other drama. Then choirs come out to sing and people come out in front of the priests to dance. Songs are mostly sang in the languages that the people understand best. This makes them feels that God speaks their language. Sometimes these services and dancing go on all night long!

Other people celebrate Christmas Eve with fireworks and parties.

On Christmas day the Churches are very full. People come out dressed in their colorful traditional clothes. After the Church service on Christmas morning, people quickly go back to their houses to start giving and receiving gifts.

Traditional food includes stew or okra soup, porridge and meats rice and a yam paste called 'fufu'.

During the Christmas period children's parties, employees' end of year parties, etc. are mostly celebrated in the hotels, at the beaches, school parks and community centers with good wishes for all people on earth.

Some Ghanaians also go to Church on the 31st December to thank God for sending Jesus and to pray for a good and safe New Year. People may also use that time to remember those who died during the previous year and pray that the difficulties that they may have encountered over the year don't carry on into the New Year.
