COUNTRYSIDE NOTES

What peculiar weather we've had throughout 2018! The so called jet stream did not behave according to the text book. It was cold right from the start of the year fluctuating between cold and frosty and cold and wet. The 'Beast from the East' arrived on February 24th bringing with it snow and temperatures as low as minus 7C. Similar weather persisted through most of March. The bitterly cold east winds continued well into April but then, all of a sudden, we had a brief taste of spring when temperatures for a few days got into the 20s. However, by the end of the month we were back to a very strong northerly wind and a high of only 7C! Throughout June and July we went to the other extreme with many days in the 30s although, surprisingly, night time temperatures in June were sometimes as low as 7 or 8 degrees. Gardens and the countryside were parched which affected crops already suffering from the cold, late spring. Predictably, for most of the school summer holidays, the weather was cool and changeable. Even though summer had returned by the end of September unusually there were a couple of frosts late in the month. Temperature reached 25C on October 13 and once again it had become very dry everywhere. The following day it rained and the thermometer dropped to 13C which came as a bit of a shock! Apart from a few odd days the mild weather continued well into November and the autumn colours were spectacular in the late autumn sunshine.

Apart from the extremes in temperatures and lack of rain another feature of 2018 was the number of windy days there were. It was interesting to see how summer flowering plants that had shut down in the drought conditions burst into life again in the autumn. In the vegetable garden tomatoes and runner beans, which normally would have been almost finished, were plentiful well into October. The rain in August seemed to give everything a new lease of life. I can't help but wonder what sort of winter we'll have. If there's one thing we can be certain about with the British weather is that it's unpredictable.

It's coming up to that time of year when our thoughts most often turn to other people. Once again I'd like to remind everyone about the unseen band of voluntary workers in every village to whom we owe an awful lot. We shouldn't ever take them for granted. There are those involved in producing and distributing our parish magazine providing information about everything that's happening in our villages. There are those who keep our villages, churches and village halls neat and tidy and those who organise fund raising events, not forgetting all the ladies who make the cakes. It is these people who ensure that where we live is much more than just a group of houses – it's a lively community.

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RECIPE PAGE

MINCE PIES USING ROSE CRUST PASTRY

Ingredients

12 oz plain flour
4oz corn flour
4 oz icing or castor sugar
10 – 12 oz cooking margarine
Egg to bind to stiff dough



Sweet Mincemeat

Method

1. Cream fat and sugar together until soft.

2. Add cornflour and plain flour a little at a time. This makes it easier to mix together.

- 3. Add beaten egg a little at a time until the pastry is pliable.
- 4. Roll out (not too thinly) and place carefully into greased baking tins.
- 5. Fill with mincemeat and put on a lid.
- 6. You can leave open and put on lemon icing when they are cool.

7. Bake in oven mark 6 - 5 or 425 – 400 approx 20 minutes or until golden brown.

8. Let them cool slightly before removing.

This pastry can be used for strawberry tartlets in summer or any other fruit you fancy using.

FREE HOME ASSESSMENTS ON OFFER

Older, disabled or vulnerable residents of West Norfolk are being encouraged to book an appointment for a free home assessment from Careline Community Services.

The assessments, which are carried out by a team of qualified staff, will help residents, who may be living with a disability or dementia, or who are simply older and less mobile, to identify concerns in their property which may be affecting their day-to-day life. The assessor, trained by the Disabled Living Foundation, will inspect the home to see whether measures could be introduced that would reduce the possibility of slips, trips and falls and generally make it easier for people to live safely and independently in their own homes. Measures that could be considered include installation of a Careline personal alarm, improved lighting arrangements, heating checks, draught proofing, smoke detectors and easy-to-use taps along with recommendations for other adaptations that may reduce any potential risk to the resident. Practical solutions for those living with dementia are also available, this includes signage or colour differentiation for those who suffer with memory loss and are visually impaired.

The assessors will also be able to advise whether any grant funding is available for any works required.

COULD YOU HELP A YOUNG PERSON WITH A DISABILITY TO THINK ABOUT THEIR FUTURE?

The CSV Futures Project supports young people with learning disabilities to explore their options as they think about leaving education.

Volunteer Mentors provide one to one support to a young person to help them develop a personal profile of their skills and interests, their likes and dislikes and their future goals. The Mentor can then support the young person to start working towards these; this can include accessing work experience and training opportunities plus the chance to try out volunteering and new social activities.

CSV needs volunteers who can offer a couple of hours of their time each week to mentor the young people as they make choices about their futures, raising aspirations by exploring together the young person's skills, interests and abilities.

We are looking for people ages 16+ - Mentors can come from all walks of life and no experience is needed but patience, the ability to listen and a sense of humour are all useful skills. Mentors receive full training and support and out of pocket expenses are paid.

SOVA's "Norfolk Mentoring Project" provides fully trained Mentors, to work as part of a team in the community to support individuals with identified substance misuse behaviour as part of a wider Behaviour Change Service across Norfolk. Our Project works closely with CGL (Change, Grow, Live) and other community providers supporting individuals to address the multiple barriers they may face in overcoming their substance misuse. Community mentors provide practical support and guidance dependant on service user's needs and personal goals. They can also offer support and encouragement in engaging with community resources and external health services, provide befriending to reduce social isolation and improve living skills. Each relationship will have a defined action plan and volunteers will work with service users to achieve small goals helping with motivation, confidence and self-esteem.

Job Role/skills required: Our Volunteer Mentors provide 1:1 mentoring support to Users of the Behaviour Change Service recovering from substance misuse.

Service Users will already be well established in their Recovery Process as they develop confidence to move away from substance misuse.

You should be a good listener, with the ability to show understanding and empathy in a non-judgemental way.

Strong communication skills with the ability to build rapport with a wide variety of people, coupled with good problem solving skills is important.

The ability to motivate, encourage and support individuals to work towards personal goals.

Benefits from this Role: Our volunteers are given an opportunity to build on their current skills, whilst giving back to their community and also gain an understanding of the barriers and stigma associated with substance misuse.



WEST NORFOLK AVIATION SOCIETY



On Tuesday 6th of October, in the cosy confines of the Mundford Bowls Club, the West Norfolk Aviation Society proudly presented, for the first time in the history of the club, a lady speaker captivated her mostly who male audience. This elegant and eloquent lady, Jocelyn C. Blakey, gave a brief but intensive insight into the life of her brave and adventurous father, Roger who, being the son of a Maw. gentleman farmer, expected to follow in his father's footsteps until, that is, he was cajoled into joining the Special Reserve Air Force in 1927 by a wing commander from the nearby base at Waddington. Jocelyn described her father modestly but it was clear that he was a man of exceptional character with a natural flying ability and a good eve for strategy. He earned much respect from his colleagues through a

waggish sense of humour and an incredible practical and innovative ability. He was credited with designing and building the famous vaulting-horse in Stalag Luft 111 which, apart from being used by prisoners of war to keep fit, also served as camouflage whilst escapees tunnelled beneath it.

Not entirely unscathed Roger survived the war and returned to farming at his cherished Lincolnshire village home. Together with his records and his family's subsequent forage for further information Jocelyn published a book in 2014 defining more fully the extent of Roger's talents and achievements. The book is entitled 'Wapitis Wellingtons and Binderband'

There's an interesting sequel to this story, but hardly competitive: our esteemed club secretary, David Allen, was recently dining at a hostelry in Feltwell the landlord of which being Chris Samuels a one-time member of our society. Chris renamed his inn, The Wellington, to commemorate the aeroplane's activity at RAF Feltwell during WW2. Wing Commander Roger Maw DFC flew many missions in Wellingtons; as did our late president, Wing Commander Ken Wallis (James Bond's stunt double in the film 'You Only Live Twice'). Chris was a past pupil at Methwold High School and David was a past teacher at the same school; the former introduced the latter to another diner, her name: Jocelyn Blakey.

Poppies: Barton had its own living display in June when poppies were grown along the roadside verges of Buttlands Lane and on the day itself the church and war memorial were decorated with scores of poppies patiently hand knitted by Joan.

In the Evening: Barton continued remembering and honouring those who served and those who perished in WW1 with a commemorative evening in the Village Hall. A large crowd gathered for this purpose and after Andrew set the scene with a poem at 7 o'clock, in line with others across the country, we witnessed the lighting by veteran Jay Carter of Barton's own version of a beacon (the fire-pit in the pub garden opposite). Back in the warmth of the hall lan treated us to a brief but detailed history lesson of events which eventually led to England becoming a participant in the war already raging across Europe. This was followed with tempting sandwiches, savouries and cake after which lan read the poem 'The Volunteer' by Robert Service and Tom led us in a sing-song of familiar WW1 songs sung by the troops to keep their spirits up. Andrew then explained about the 'Barton Remembers' booklet he's compiled, and later handed out, and read us the poem by W B Yates 'An Irish Airman Foresees His Death'. The choir treated us to splendid renditions of 'If Ye Love Me', 'For the Fallen' and the 'Hallelujah Chorus'. By this time, I for one was feeling quite emotional. The evening finished with a Toast and the National Anthem. A collection was made in aid of 'Help the Heroes' which raised £112.

It was indeed an evening which recognised and commemorated every element of the Great War. Thanks must go to Tom Golden, the choir, now better than ever with the addition of four male voices and Phyllis from Oxborough who accompanied them on the flute, to Ian and also to Maureen B, Lissa, Liz and Andrew for organizing the evening. *Jill Mason*

St. Mary's Church

At 11am on Sunday, 11th November, St. Mary's regained its place as the spiritual heart of the community as a service took place to mark the centenary of the ending of the First World War. Some eighty people attended this once in a lifetime service.

After a night and early morning of rain, the autumn sunlight broke through the dark clouds and the wet grass sparkled like jewels. Before the service began, we stood on the green to watch the Union Jack being raised, the flag was lifted and let fall by the breeze. We then walked to the church where a bugler movingly played *The Last Post* and a wreath of poppies was placed against the altar rail after the two minutes of silence was observed when we remembered the millions of men and women who lost their lives not only in the First World War but the succession of wars which have tragically taken place since 1918.

As the watered sunlight streamed through the stained glass windows creating altering patterns across the stone floor, hymns were sung, poems were read and popular songs from the Great War were performed, the congregation joining in with the well-known lyrics.

It was particularly moving to simply hear the names of those from Beachamwell who died read aloud, their voiced names echoing within the ancient walls as voices of prayer and praise have echoed in this building for over a thousand years. After the names were read, we learned a little of the personal stories which lie behind those names. Not only the names of the dead were read aloud but the names of the known survivors of the war were read and we learned how those who were physically or psychologically maimed struggled to take up their lives again after the war had ended. In many respects, their harrowing experiences never left them. Nothing for those survivors or for the many bereaved families would ever be the same again as the Great War altered the world for generations to come.

The service ended appropriately with the sharing of the peace and with the singing of the hymn *Morning Has Broken* with its words of hope and renewal:

Sweet the rain's new fall, Sunlit from Heaven, Like the first dewfall On the first grass.

As nature heals the wounds inflicted on it by man, perhaps we can also learn one day to start again to heal the wounds of the past and put aside conflict.

Needless to say, an event such as this can only come about by those villagers willing to give their time and effort to create a service those of us fortunate to attend will long remember. *James Knox Whittet*

"The Life and Hard Times of Mary Caney"

Our speaker on 13th November was local writer, Jill Mason. It was a note left in Barton Bendish church by a visitor in search of an ancestor, that set Jill off on the trail of Mary Caney, who lived in that village from 1786 to 1878. Research in the church records and census returns revealed that Mary's family had been agricultural labourers, that she had ten children (four of them out of wedlock) and that she was married and widowed twice. She and her family led precarious and probably rather monotonous lives, against a backdrop of changing times; the Napoleonic Wars, the impoverishing results of the Corn Laws, the arrival of threshing machines and the railways. In her talk, Jill described how in writing her novel, "The Life and Hard Times of Mary Caney"

she used her research and knowledge about the period to make this woman, about whom there was only scant real information, come alive. In this fascinating talk, Jill also described what she has found out about Mary's real descendants, including a son, William who despite his humble origins trained as a clockmaker and became a prosperous tradesman.

News from All Saints' Church

Dates for your diaries:

Carol service of Nine Lessons and Carols MONDAY 17th December at 7pm. I'll be looking for readers as usual...... It's always a well attended service, with plenty of well known hymns and readings. In spite of the NINE lessons, it doesn't go all night and everyone will be welcome.

Crib service 4 pm on Monday 24th December in the church. No service on Christmas Day, but there will be services at several other churches within easy reach. There is a 10 am service at Fincham as well as those in the Wissey benefice.

Oil Tank

Some of you will be aware that we need to replace the oil tank at church. We are currently looking to obtaining planning permission from the local council and then we can apply for permission from the Diocese. The heating is a vital part of the building's usefulness to both church and village, but the new tank will be expensive. Any offers to help defray the costs will be most welcome.

We continue to have a problem with moving chairs. Although attractive, they are too heavy to move easily. If anyone is able to help with this, please contact me, so that we can keep them. Furniture which is unusable is of little value and will need to be replaced. There are certain set times in the month when the chairs need to be moved and set out. I'm not strong enough to do it. If anyone is willing to help on a regular basis, please contact me - 500429 or by email.

Boughton took part in the group Remembrance Day service at Fincham, with three other villages. There was a strong attendance from all the villages and the pleasure of taking part in a large service made the work that went into it worthwhile. Frank Reid read the names of the Boughton dead – which could also be seen in last month's magazine – and arranged the purchase of the wreath, which is now on our own war memorial. Thanks are also due to Angela Faherty for selling poppies around the village. I'm sure you all gave generously and in due time, Angela will publish the amount raised in Boughton.

The Stringside drain and the Wissey Catchment area

I am sure many would agree that rivers are for many reasons an important resource. In this connection readers might like to know that the Environment Agency (EA) have a significant project to improve the rivers in our area – the Wissington catchment area project. The work they have done is starting to yield results and I give below a short summary prepared by the EA which gives an interesting overview. Of particular note we have heard that the EA hope to begin work on our stretch of the Stringide drain very shortly. When completed it should improve the river enormously.

EA Summary

"There are 9 main rivers that make up the Wissey catchment. This catchment has been highlighted by The Environment Agency as a priority catchment and therefore we have a dedicated Priority Catchment Officer working in the catchment full time, Helen Blower, alongside a Catchment Coordinator who oversees the catchments that make up the Cam and Ely Ouse, Sam Sweeney. There has been a wide variety of projects already completed in the Wissey, with many more planned. Our work is planned by the issues that are highlighted from our monitoring and projects are put in place to rectify the issues and improve all aspects of the watercourses. For instance, on the Watton Brook it was highlighted that phosphate was an issue. There are two sources of phosphate, farming run off and sewage treatment. Helen found that there was large scale poaching of the watercourse due to cattle usage. Since October last year, 5 cattle drinkers have been installed and 4 sets of gates to close off the drinking points and allow the watercourse to recover and phosphates to reduce. We are planning to install more gates and drinkers with the help of one of our catchment partners. We are now working with the Water Company to ensure the phosphate being released from sewage treatment is minimised also. We are hoping to carry out habitat improvement work, to create back channels that fish can use in times of high flow whilst putting work in place to help alleviate flooding.

On the Gadder, at Oxburgh Hall there has been 1.5km of improvement work carried out. A further 1.5km of improvement work is planned to be completed before the end of March 2019 if possible. The work carried out in the Gadder included the removal of weed in the channel, habitat enhancement and installation of woody debris to allow the channel to be narrowed and flow improved at certain points as well as providing habitat. The work, carried out by the field team in King's Lynn, has improved the channel greatly and managed to bring back a very nice chalk stream with trout in some parts.

Closer to home on the Stringside, Helen has been working with local partners to improve the habitat for 6-7km of the Upper Stringside. The Stringside stream is currently failing for fish and so it is paramount that habitat is created and fish barriers removed. A walkover has been completed that highlighted a number of ways that this could be achieved. An example of this this is to do a bit more than the mid channel weed cut which has not solved much of the problem. Ideally we would like to remove both the weeds (some sections of the Stringside have extensive weed / reed growth) and their roots. To help with this a project proposal has been put together so that we can start finding some funding to get the work done.
