COUNTRYSIDE NOTES DECEMBER 2019

There can be few places in the world richer in bird life than Norfolk is in the winter. Although summer visitors have long departed vast numbers of other species decide Norfolk is the place to be when there is hard weather. Ducks, geese and waders in their thousands arrive from breeding grounds in many parts of the northern hemisphere.

In North Norfolk farmers leave sugar beet tops on their fields for the hungry Pink -footed geese that have made long journeys from Greenland, Iceland or Spitsbergen. What a magnificent sight, and sound, they are when they 'whiffle' from side to side as they drop in to land with feet outstretched or flight in V formations to and from their coastal roosting places at sunrise and sunset. Gaggles of less common Brent geese can be found flying over Cley marshes or in Wells harbour. They have winged their way from Arctic Russia or Siberia. On the fields between the road and the sea at Holkham flocks of White-fronted geese from the Arctic can sometimes be spotted, distinguished from other species by their barred breast and white patch around the base of their bills. Often accompanying them are flocks of Wigeon, a colourful mallard-sized duck, probably from Russia or Siberia. Unlike other species of duck they feed on grass like the geese. At high tide great quantities of waders gather on the mud flats at Snettisham and huge groups of Knot, that have nested on the Arctic tundra, can be seen swirling around like flocks of starlings.

Welney Wetland Centre is always worth a visit in winter at this time of the year. The flooded washes and surrounding farmlands become home to thousands of waterfowl including Pochard drakes. I wonder where the females go. The swans too are a spectacular sight with a mix of our own familiar Mute swans and families of yellow billed Whoopers who have flown in from Russia or other parts of Northern Europe. The similar, but smaller, Bewicks can also often be spotted amongst the others. They are fed every afternoon at 3.30pm, and it's quite a spectacle to witness the frenzied free for all and 'bottoms up'.

There is an incredible abundance of birds that winter in our county and there are two things that never fail to amaze me. The fact that those who spend their summers in remote wilderness areas seem so little fazed by the attention they attract and being in such close proximity to people. The other thing is the sheer abundance of invertebrates there must be available to support all those thousands of waders. Don't forget to take your binoculars if you visit the coast.

As yet another year draws to a close we owe a big thank to all those who work so hard to make our villages nice places to live. Within our communities they are the unsung heroes and it is very easy to take them all for granted. Season's Greetings to one and all.

MAGPIE CENTRE BECOMES DEMENTIA-FRIENDLY

An Open Morning held on October 25 at the Magpie Centre, Wallington Hall, home of West Norfolk Riding for the Disabled Association, proved a great success. Aimed at people living with dementia and their carers, the event allowed visitors to meet and greet the ponies, view a demonstration of the Centre's specially-commissioned wheelchair-accessible carriage, and experience a 'sensory table', featuring grooming equipment, a sheepskin saddle, plus items of saddlery such as bits and stirrups. This was followed by tea and cakes, allowing visitors to chat about the activities. A total of 12 visitors, each accompanied by a carer, participated, and Michael Owen, Activities Co-Ordinator at Dove Court Care Home, Wisbech, was enthusiastic about the benefits to his clients.

'The residents really enjoyed their visit to the Magpie Centre,' he said. 'It was very therapeutic and brought back to several of them their memories of horses from the past. They were very happy after their visit and some of them were talking about it for the next four days at least,' he added.

The following week saw a 'Becoming a Dementia Friend' training session at the Centre, attended by six members of the Centre's staff, plus 15 volunteers. This was delivered by Anne Cauvin, Volunteering Officer at the Alzheimer's Society, Norwich.

Going forward, Tea with a Pony sessions, aimed at people living with dementia and their carers, are projected for the New Year, and for these a cohort of volunteers will be needed to make and serve tea and cakes. If you can help in any way, please contact the Centre on 01553 810202 for a Volunteer form and say that's the area of activity which appeals to you. If you can make cakes, but are unable to deliver them to the Centre, your help is still very welcome, so do let us know.

The Quiz with Hog Roast Supper, held on October 19 at Stowbridge Village Hall was the best ever. No fewer than 19 teams competed, and a total of £1200 was raised for the Centre, which will provide riding and carriage driving lessons for people of all ages and disabilities. Many thanks to all who participated, provided raffle prizes and helped on the night. Free home assessments on offer

Older, disabled or vulnerable residents of West Norfolk are being encouraged to book an appointment for a free home assessment from Careline Community Services.

The assessments, which are carried out by a team of qualified staff, will help residents, who may be living with a disability or dementia, or who are simply older and less mobile, to identify concerns in their property which may be affecting their day-to-day life.

The assessor, trained by the Disabled Living Foundation, will inspect the home to see whether measures could be introduced that would reduce the possibility of slips, trips and falls and generally make it easier for people to live safely and independently in their own homes.

Measures that could be considered include installation of a Careline personal alarm, improved lighting arrangements, heating checks, draught proofing, smoke detectors and easy-to-use taps along with recommendations for other adaptations that may reduce any potential risk to the resident. Practical solutions for those living with dementia are also available, this includes signage or colour differentiation for those who suffer with memory loss and are visually impaired.

The assessors will also be able to advise whether any grant funding is available for any works required. To book an appointment call the Careline Community Team on 01553 760671 .

Such was the enthusiasm for WNAS member Bob K's talk last month that he was asked to deliver the sequel this month. After spending over 30 years as a pilot in the RAF it is no wonder there was so much more to tell.

Having qualified as a pilot he joined 3 Squadron at Coningsby in the 1960s and his responsibilities were extreme and varied. When stationed at Laabruch in Germany, a 3 minute mobilising time was often achieved in preparing his Canberra for a potential nuclear strike. Collaborating now, with old allies and some old enemies, combined exercises were important. Target practice in the Libyan desert won them prizes for accuracy; the Salmond Bombing Trophy being one.

Compared to the American Starfighter the Canberra was aging somewhat but it still excelled, beating the American and European teams by at least 20%. Despite this, Bob's comrades were still in awe of the Starfighter's performance and, when offered a flight in one, foot already poised on the bottom rung of the boarding ladder, his excitement was suddenly extinguished by orders to return to the mess.

The testing of ejector seats was another practice vital to a well-trained squadron; here again the Martin Baker equipment was superior to that of the competition.

He was later invited to go to Oman and demonstrate to the Sultan's air force procedures for parachuting from aeroplanes. The preferred types were Islanders, Dorniers and his favourite: Buffalos. After a cancer scare he was ordered to return to England where he was invited to assist with the formation of Air Wales and a charter company at Ipswich, operating Dorniers. With this experience he was asked to return to help his mate, the Sultan, refine his air force. As if his life's adventure so far wasn't enough, Bob, having a musical bent, still felt the urge to express himself in other ways and formed a band with some of the locals. They called themselves 'Rashid goes to Nizwa'; 'The Duelling Banjos' being their signature tune. Bob now on a high and, having talked for nearly two hours, Jenny his wife, prompt and manager, cautiously coaxed him down to a safe landing.
