

FROM THE RECTORY-TRADITIONS

We have always done this or that especially at Christmas. *Always?* Have we always had Christmas trees, tinsel, baubles, lights and decorations, Father Christmas with gifts especially for children, turkeys with all the trimmings and spent a lot of money? Oh! It wouldn't be Christmas without *all* of those things. And, yes, all of those do comprise a tradition that we are expected to follow. I have to admit to a certain level of reluctant acquiesce in following in the footsteps of, what appears to be, the majority. Though I do find choosing presents a task too far and my family receive vouchers from me. They seem to enjoy choosing their own gifts which discharges them from the necessity to exchange wrongly purchased ones.

One of the things I clearly remember from many years ago on the run-up to Christmas. I was going into a supermarket when a lady pushing an overladen shopping trolley, which she could hardly control, came out. The truly ironical thing was that she turned to her companion, who was attempting to pilot the recalcitrant vehicle, and said *Christmas is really about the children isn't it?* Were their children really going to consume all that alcohol that the trolley contained?

I sincerely hope not! Indeed, I hope that those who drank it, did so over a reasonably long period of time. The other point is that you would think that people were stocking up to avoid a famine or other disaster. Supermarkets and other large shops are only closed for two days in the year; Christmas and Easter Days. Smaller shops remain open, including those that are part of the same chain as the supermarkets.

One of the other traditions is that preachers and writers of quasi-religious articles tend to complain about the commercialisation of Christmas. Hence my own reluctant acquiesce to become involved with the other traditions of Christmas. It remains an inconvenient truth that the economy *could not function* without the spending at Christmas. In the retail sector, dependant on the type of organisation, as much as one third of turnover and thus profit is directly attributable to spending at Christmas. And there are manufacturing firms that are entirely dependent on that trade; Christmas crackers being an obvious one. So, what are preachers and such writers going to do? Continue with our verbal or written handwringing or tut-tuting? But, if so, we must take into consideration of that inconvenient truth about the economy.

It is worthwhile remembering why we give gifts at Christmas. That tradition comes from St. Nicholas from the fourth century A.D. who is named in popular culture as Santa Claus. Legend has it that he gifted some gold coins to prevent some children becoming slaves. He is, appropriately, the patron saint of merchants and brewers. But it was the act of giving, during the Season of Advent, that probably began the tradition. However, the real gift we receive at Christmas (Christ Mass) is that of Jesus. He came into the world as a mortal human being to die upon the Cross but to rise again from death that we enjoy the gift of forgiveness of sins.

RECIPE PAGE Cloud Forest Chocolate Cakes

Ingredients

180g Best Plain Chocolate (broken into pieces) 250g Unsalted Butter 125g Golden Caster Sugar 50g Light Muscovado Sugar

6 eggs 100g Ground Almonds

Method

Preheat the oven to 160 deg C.

Line 25cm spring-form cake tin

- 1.Melt butter and chocolate and half the caster sugar and all of the Muscovado sugar in a bowl over simmering water.
- 2.Beat the egg yolks and remaining sugar in a bowl until doubled in size
- 3.In a separate bowl beat the whites until soft peaks.
- 4. Add the almonds to the melted butter and chocolate.
- 5. Incorporate the three together folding until well mixed.
- 6. Pour into lined tin and bake for 25 minutes.
- 7. Leave to cool in the tin.

This cake is quite dense and very rich so can be divided into many portions and keeps for a week (plus) if it lasts that long!

COUNTRYSIDE NOTES [WITH A DIFFERENCE]

Christmas is a religious celebration but what a sad place our world has become. It should be a time for compassion, understanding, kindness and peace of which there's little evidence. The ongoing conflict between Ukraine and Russia and the tinderbox situation in the Middle East, destroying lives and property, has made it a very unstable place. Where has it all gone wrong?

Whichever direction you look our own country appears to have got its priorities seriously muddled. We're growing fields full of weeds or maize or covering them with solar panels instead of growing food for ourselves. Two or three weeks of thick cloud with no sun or wind has recently shown the inadequacies of solar panels and wind turbines to reliably produce electricity. Many pensioners trying to make ends meet are faced with choosing between heating or eating and some of our own people are homeless while tens of thousands of illegal migrants look forward to spending the winter in comfort at our expense. What has happened to common sense? There was plenty of it about when I was a kid!

In our personal lives during the last year we'll all have experienced some joy, sorrow, heartaches and a lot of frustration. Yet life around us continues in a pleasant sort of way due in no short measure to those kind souls in our villages who make sure it does. Here in Barton we have Linda, Mhari, Janice and Liz organising events interspersed with the Film Club and the Community Hub. Gardens and Arts and Crafts Exhibition attracted many visitors and were hugely successful. These two principal events, like others in the surrounding villages, require a huge amount of organisation and preparation involving an army of helpers. Every parish has its own team contributing so much to the community; village life would not be the same without them. Our parish churches would be redundant and the villages appear neglected. The Group 4 team of editors, contributors and distributors ensure parishioners have access to local news, information and more. There are countless unseen and unpaid people who work hard to raise money for the villages' various needs and keep them looking neat and tidy. Incredibly Ernie, now in his 90s, still cares meticulously for St Mary's churchyard. confidently speak for everyone, both here in Barton and further afield, in saying that Mhari will be sorely missed when she moves back to Scotland. For many years she and Linda have formed an unsurpassable duo in organising nearly all of Barton's major events as well as the popular Pop-Up Cafes. We wish her and her family much happiness as they begin a new chapter in their lives.

Here in the depths of rural Norfolk it feels as though we are a million miles away from the woes affecting this troubled world. And it is here where we can still experience compassion, understanding, kindness and peace. May your Christmas be happy and may the New Year herald a new era of tolerance and common sense.





When you read this we will be about three shopping weeks away from Christmas, not that Christmas should be about shopping. Where has the time gone and what have we done with it? We have had many opportunities to be involved in community activities and those of us fortunate enough to live here are blessed to have the regular events that we enjoy and the expertise and unselfish efforts of so many people who make this place so vibrant and so special. Before you go to the Pop Up Café on January 17th you will, no doubt, have made some New Year's Resolutions. One might be to get more involved in community activities. After all, a community is nothing unless the people in it reach out to each other in friendship. That is what Barton Bendish is about.

On the 7th of December at 4pm Carols at Christmas in St Andrew's Church will be followed by Christmas Cheer at 5pm, which involves breaking bread with your neighbours in the Village Hall, the other centre of community life. This year a Community Grant has so far funded the Hub, a couple of films and a new Gardening Club venture. I rather fancy hiring a charabanc to take us to the sea side but we will have to see about that. Since the Pop Up Cafes began, we have raised £4,900, which is a phenomenal amount. The money raised this year has been used to support the DEC Ukraine Humanitarian Appeal; Macmillan; Tapping House; Marie Curie; The Royal British Legion; YANA; RSPCA; Red Cross Gaza Relief; Guide Dogs For The Blind and Dementia UK. I would like to thank all those who have given so unstintingly of their time to make all these efforts such a success. The last pop up café attracted 73 people. At times we were almost overrun but most people were cheerfully and encouragingly accepting of the hapless waiter's failings.

The first Community Breakfast of the New Year will be on January 4th at 9.30am. Please let us know if you would like to join us.

It has been a little strange to see barbed wire fences going up around some fields. Indeed one appeared just behind my house. For a moment I feared that I was being confined to barracks! I'm sure there is a proper explanation to be had somewhere. It would be nice to know it. Some still complain about noisy aeroplanes. In these uncertain times across the globe, I'm glad to know that they are ready for whatever comes. I certainly felt grateful to all those people who have defended us in the past, some of whom were mentioned by name at our Remembrance Service.

St Mary's Church

"Work is continuing to get St Mary's past the finishing post so that we can enjoy worshipping in our church again. We are currently putting together a faculty application, as directed by the diocesan Chancellor, that will encompass all the remaining aspects of the restoration from the internal construction to the hanging of the hymn and psalm boards. This is a magnus opus and we are working closely with the architect, project

consultants, insurers and the diocese to ensure there are no more glitches.

Now that the Rev Dr Ian Mack has left the benefice as priest in charge we are in a period of inter-regnum during which time we have a new Chair, the archdeacon of Wisbech and Huntingdon, the Ven Richard Harlow. Richard has been working with us since the start of restoration in late 2022, albeit in the background. Our first meeting under his chairmanship is in November. Amongst topics to be discussed will be village meetings with the parish, and the Friends of St Mary's, to ensure that those who have not already seen the proposed plans for the restoration of the church (shown publicly in May, June and September) have the opportunity to both see, and ask questions about them.

In summary these plans are designed to both restore the church as a place of worship and enable its use for other community activities (e.g. concerts and exhibitions), without affecting the valuable work and events led by the village memorial hall. It should be noted that the PCC and the village hall management continue to work closely to benefit our small community.

We appreciate that, at first sight it appears that the church building is lying inactive. However, the reality is that there is a tremendous amount of work taking place in the background, which, once completed successfully, will allow us to complete the restoration of the church. Let us hope that we will be having the 2025 Christmas Carol service in a faithfully restored, 1,000 year old St Mary's.

We had a very enjoyable Harvest Festival service in late October and a well attended Service of Remembrance in November, where the PCC and the Village Hall Committee both laid wreaths. These services were both followed by light lunches for the enjoyment of those who came to the service and those who joined us for the social afterwards.

The 2024 Carol Service will be on Friday 20th December at 6pm, in the church. Do come along, dress warmly and bring a torch (no naked flames please), it will be well lit and there will be seating for those who need it. As per last year the service is followed by the Pop up Pub in the Village Hall."

Boughton Fen going into the winter

The fen is settling into the winter now, which means we have been able to start getting some work done, as there are restrictions as to when we can do significant work on the site.

So far this Autumn, repairs have been carried out to the boardwalk, with a little more still to do. The late summer cut – which is done to promote habitat for barn owls on the grassier areas – has been completed. This is done on a rotational basis in accordance with the Countryside Stewardship agreement. Quite a bit of strimming and tidying up has been achieved by our two super-strimmers – Stephen and Hugh - but again, it is a bit like the Forth Bridge. It never really stops.

One of the interesting observations we have made this year is that the variety of wild flowers growing adjacent to the main boardwalk has increased considerably. They all came very late in the season though, along with the Common Meadow Rue with its delicate cream flowers. Our thoughts are that this late flowering must be due to the cold wet summer, and the increase in species is probably caused by the regular strimming we do along this area to keep the boardwalk passable.

The presence of many red list birds over the year keeps a steady flow visitors coming to the area, and we are fortunate to have such a haven for wildlife on our doorstep. Grateful thanks go to all the volunteers who help us during the year.
