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ANOTHER FESTIVAL AND ANOTHER SAINTS' DAY?

It has been said that Church Festivals and Saints' Days are like London Buses. You wait a long time and several come along all together! No sooner that the celebration of Christmas over on its sixth day that we have The Epiphany, otherwise known as The Revelation of Christ to the Gentiles. That is the day when the visit of the Wise Men to the infant Jesus is correctly celebrated. This despite the image of figures on camels appearing on many Christmas cards. Ah! But in-between those there is the Feast of Stephen, the First Martyr (the day that Good King Wenceslas last looked out) known to us as Boxing Day. And then there is the, perhaps, rather obscure one to many of us, the Naming and Circumcision of Christ which falls on New Years Day, no wonder it's obscure! And hardly a wonder that it is a transferable Feast. That does not include the more 'ordinary' Saints Days that fall between those major Festivals. Similar important Festivals are called Red Letter Days because they are denoted as such in the Church's Calendar. It may not be surprising then, in medieval times the Clergy, monks and nuns together with the aristocracy and gentry enjoyed approximately 80 (Yes eighty) Holy Days. Of course, known these days as holidays. I once tried to acquaint my employer with these interesting facts in a vain attempt to get more of what the medieval folk enjoyed. He did not bite! But referred me to my Contact of Employment and Employees Handbook. My experience has taught me that, contrary to the old saying, there is harm in asking! So much for work/life balance thought I. My pride in my research into all these matters had come to naught. Ok! Another saying is 'pride comes before the fall'. In retrospect I believe that I ought to be thankful that my employer could not readily find someone to fill my position. If that had happened, I would have fallen further. That said, it appears these same facts have been used by some retailers as an excuse for putting Easter Eggs on display directly just after Christmas. If you've bought any check the use-by date would be my advice. Then along comes another Saints Day. Yes - 14 th. February - Valentine's Day. I once thought that he was a myth used to promote the sales of cards and flowers. And that despite having sent cards to a number of young ladies of my acquaintance. On one inauspicious occasion to two in the same office. One of whom shared my birthday, so the covert nature of such cards did not last very long! I maintained that stance right up to the time that I met my late first wife. As you can imagine Carole did not share my opinion. Rather, sentiment and romance took precedence over any attempt at what appeared to be the financial logic of my case. It was not until I began my training as a Lay Minister that I discovered just how wrong I had been. Valentine was real and was a martyr. It is uncertain exactly when he was martyred but it was around the year A.D. 270. The legend savs that he was put to death for marrying two Christians. That is why he is the Patron Saint of lovers; specifically of the engaged and of good marriage. Incidentally, he is also the Patron Saint of beekeepers and those, particularly children, with serious illnesses. At that time, it was unlawful

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to be a Christian. The Roman Emperor was worshipped as a god. And those who did not worship the Emperor were executed. Like the first Christian martyr in this country St.Alban (Feast Day 22nd . Jane), Valentine was put to death during the various persecutions that took place in the first 300 years of Christianity. It was not until the Emperor Constantine saw a vision of the Cross of Christ before going into a battle, during which he was victorious, that Christianity became the official religion of the Roman Empire. He may well have been influenced by his own mother, Helen, who is held to have been a British princess. In all probability there would have been residual Christianity worshippers in Britannia from the time before the Romans left. It is worth remembering and Praying about the fact that oppression and persecutions of Christians, and followers of other religions, are still going on in the world today.

What we face in England is not conventional persecution. Indeed, it is against the law to seek to prevent anyone from going to Church or practicing their religion. What we face is apathy and indifference. All too often, in my view, to peoples 'own disadvantage. Whilst I have found is that the majority of people have some belief in God, they do not see any reason to go to Church. Or any other form of religious practice. The results of the last census, widely commented upon in the media, demonstrate that to be so. Yet, it is because of our Faith that the Church continues to show God's Love towards those who regularly attend worship and those who do not. For, if we ever failed to do so, we would not be carrying out the duty that Jesus Himself gave us "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations." (Matthew 28: 19).

A PRAYER FOR THE NEW YEAR.....

This is rather like the Covenant Prayer that many Methodist Communities use at the beginning of a new year. The prayer was also used at the enthronement of Dr Rowen Williams as Archbishop of Canterbury in February 2003.

I am no longer my own but yours. Put me to what you will, rank me with whom you will; put me to doing, put me to suffering; let me be employed for you or laid aside for you, exalted for you or brought low for you; let me be full, let me be empty, let me have all things, let me have nothing; I freely and wholeheartedly yield all things to your pleasure and disposal.And now, glorious and blessed God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, you are mine and I am yours. So be it. And the covenant made on earth, let it be ratified in heaven. Amen

NEWS RELEASE from the Borough Council Help is at hand if you ask.

We all know that Christmas and New Year was a time for celebration but for people struggling with everyday living costs it can feel like an extra demand on a budget that already doesn't go far enough and we appreciate that the stress this causes for many people is overwhelming and they tend to live life from day-to-day or even moment-to-moment and this has the effect of storing up bigger problems for later. People often respond to money problems in one of two ways. They either avoid the problem altogether because they don't know how to get out of it or panic and go for a short-term solution like giving up their home or going to a money-lender – both of which usually make things worse in the long term.

But it doesn't have to be like that and the council's main message is: talk to us before doing anything else – we can help.

We can check that you are getting all the financial benefits you are entitled to. If you're in debt we have services that will help you get back on track. If you find yourself in crisis we may be able to arrange help with food and rent costs. If you're struggling with your mental health we can put you in touch with people who can help with that too.

We understand that it can be really difficult to think beyond today's problems but if you can just take that first step of talking to us, it could be the most important conversation you have this year.

Get money advice, don't go to money lenders, we know that going to a money lender means fast access to cash without having to fill out forms we know it can be a really tempting choice. But these people prey on desperation, charging huge amounts of interest and sometimes threatening or using violence to make you pay.

There ARE alternatives. If you get proper money advice they can help you maximise your income, making sure you are getting all the benefits you are entitled to and other help, such as discretionary support payments. They may be able to help you consolidate some of your debt or help you make payment agreements that you can manage. The council pays for a money advice service that's specially to help with this and free to use – visit moneyadvicehub.org.uk or call 01553 970004.

Hang on to your home? Rent is usually a household's biggest cost and recently we have had a lot of phone calls from people who have given up their tenancies because they think they can't afford it. They intend to go on the housing register to get an affordable home. What many people don't realise is that in many cases Government rules see this as making yourself 'intentionally homeless', which means that the council can't do much to help. Even if we can help, it could be a long wait as very few affordable homes are available and there are around 1,400 people on the housing register in this borough alone. Over the past three months only 19 homes with 3 or more bedrooms have become available – that's about 6 each month. For most people the best plan is to work out a way of staying in your current home. We can help with this.

Even if staying where you are isn't right for you, the most important thing you can do is talk to us before making any big decisions as this is when we can give you the most help. We're here for you

If you feel ready to talk to us, you can call 01553 616200. Ask for housing options to talk about your housing situation or ask for Lily for anything else.

If you have internet access, have a look at our website pages on help with the cost of living at west-norfolk.gov.uk/costofliving. The pages are broken down into different problems you might be facing.

COUNTRYSIDE NOTES Snowdrops

I have great admiration for any plant that has the tenacity to survive whatever nature throws at it and snowdrops are one of them. They resolutely appear from late January and through February to herald the arrival of spring even if it means pushing through a deep covering of snow. They thrive best in the damp soil often found in deciduous woodland and along river banks but they don't like very dry, sandy soils. For this reason they flourish better around Barton than they do at Beachamwell. Many places hold snowdrops walks in February, frequently for an individual charity or through the National Garden Scheme charitable organisation. Spectacular displays can be seen at Anglesey Abbey, near Cambridge, Chippenham Park near Newmarket and Raveningham Hall near Norwich. Walsingham Abbey in north Norfolk is also renowned for its carpets of snowdrops. An annual Snowdrop Festival is also held at Shaftesbury in Dorset. Closer to home Ryston Hall, near Downham Market, open their grounds to the public as do Lexham Hall and Oxborough Hall. The flower has long been associated with the Christian festival of Candlemas and they were frequently grown in churchyards. Snowdrops are found across the UK and belong to the genus Galanthus which is native to Europe and the Middle East, where there are about 20 known

species. Bulbs are best planted out 'in the green', that is when they have finished flowering but still have green leaves. If conditions suit them they will spread rapidly. Although snowdrops can be grown from seed the usual method of propagation is by dividing the clumps which develop when bulblets form around the original bulb.

Through artificial selection from the three main species, in excess of 1,500 cultivars have been bred around 240 of which can be seen at Anglesey Abbey. Snowdrops are not native to the UK and were not recorded in the wild until the late 18th century. It's thought originally they may have been grown as an ornamental garden plant as early as the 16th century. Just as the poppy has become associated with the First World War so the snowdrop is with the Crimean War. As a prelude to spring they raised the spirits of soldiers on the battlefield who, when they returned home, brought bulbs back with them to plant in their gardens. A medicinal treatment for dementia has been developed from snowdrop bulbs but they are poisonous if eaten.

Surprisingly there are people who have a special attraction to snowdrops and are known as galanthophiles. An obsession for them is known as galanthomania. Bulbs are sometimes auctioned on ebay with rare ones making incredible prices. In 2015 a single bulb made £1,390, a record which was broken in February 2022 when *Galanthus plicatus* 'Golden Tears' bred by Joe Sharman of Monksilver Nursery went for a phenomenal £1,850!!

Snowdrops have long been regarded as a symbol of hope for better times to come. Fingers crossed this is still true for the world at the moment is a sad, mad place. *Jill Mason*

WNAS January 2023 at Mundford Bowls Club

Methwold man, Tim Flatman RN, Officer Commanding 207 sqn at Marham, very kindly offered his time to present a talk about the

revered American F-35 Lightning which is a single-seat, singleengined, all-weather stealth multirole combat aircraft; often visiting Mundford airspace. After coming into service in 2006 it has evolved into three different variants, A, B and C; less difficult to understand than some of the tech-speak in Tim's repertoire. This data however, was limited to an unclassified selection. He explained that the variants could be tailored to suit different requirements: speed, take-off and landing times, vertical take-off, ceiling, aircraft carrier stowage and manoeuvrability; the best of all these necessities is not available in one aircraft. To demonstrate the popularity of the machine he also gave details of the distribution of end users: 1300 in America, 138 in Britain, some in Canada, Australia and quite a few in a number of European countries; he didn't say whether Lockheed Martin had a contract with Russia; perhaps that information comes under 'classified'.

Tim described the qualifications necessary to produce a modern generation pilot: he or she no longer needed muscle, a seat-of-the pants approach or inertia conscious intuition, but, it is preferable to possess iPhone finger-tip coordination.

A pilot can no longer do or go where he/she pleases; the movements are monitored and recorded by base control and, the aeroplane will not allow the pilot to make commands beyond the aircraft's capability. The modern fighter pilot uses avionic technology which allows visual data to be retrieved through monitors in the helmet; information from the ground below can 'come through the floor'. Combined British and American training exercises take place over the North Sea but much of the expertise is achieved using simulators; about 50%.

It seems this well-composed and imposing matter-of-fact young man (say, 43) was responsible for the record turn-out (37 present, six of whom were ladies; very encouraging) or maybe it was the result of additional website data; maybe a bit of both. There was a barrage of questions at the end of the evening and one in particular asked by a lady who was alarmed by the F35's fuel consumption: "Was the aircraft 'green'"? At this point Tim lost a little of his composure and could have said, "No, it's silver" or, as a politician might say, "It's thirsty but for the greater good". Instead he savoured the moment of being part of a comedy double act. One of the things I have most enjoyed here during the last month or so, is watching the progress of the Hot Hub events of Barton Bendish. I was delighted to obtain funding from the County Council and to have the opportunity to do something positive to enhance community life. In essence the grant exists to provide refreshment and a warm space to all those struggling with uncertainty, the cost of living and , often, the lack of social contact. When moves were afoot to improve an expand the Village Hall in the village, some of the momentum was based on the success of events already held here. It was also important to have a community space which was disability friendly, warm and not alive with condensation. We hoped that a bigger, more modern hall with good facilities would attract more people and so it has proved. The unexpected and protracted closure of the Berney Arms, another much loved community hub has made the Village Hall even more essential than it was before.

I believe that the Pandemic has icopardised the sense of community and peoples' desire to socialise. We only have to look at the number of pubs which have closed, a trend which is continuing at a frightening pace. An ageing population has led to more people feeling lonely and isolated, particularly in rural areas. As a society I believe that we have been far too slow to address this, frankly, heartbreaking, problem. My hope, therefore is that our Hot Hub activities would, in a small way, offer something to address it. I think that to begin with there was a misconception that only those who were struggling financially should use the sessions but we have tried very hard to convince people that the community consists of all of us. What I wanted to see was people who are not regular participants in community activities to feel welcome and look forward to Tuesday afternoons. So far we are getting about 20 people a week and I have been delighted to see a number of people coming who have rarely been seen before in the Village Hall. Equally, I have been pleased and grateful for the number of people who have been very happy to help to run the sessions. The Village Hall Trustees and the volunteers have made it possible to run sessions which we hope will grow. Currently we have funding until the end of March. It would be wonderful if we could continue beyond that.

We are also providing fish and chip suppers on three Saturday evenings. We have already had one which again attracted many people into the Village Hall, despite the icy conditions outside. We know that this event will grow and we expect higher numbers on January 28th, February 25th and March 18th. We are also hoping to provide some sessions to teach computing skills and are always open to suggestions from people who come to our events. Recently, I was talking to a lady who told me that she hadn't talked to a living soul since the previous Thursday. It's important that communities are seen to open their arms to everyone. We welcome people from other villages. We welcome each other. We all belong-don't we? Andrew Stephen

As previously noted this meeting is the point in the year where budgets are set. For the financial year 2023/24 the council has agreed a slightly increased council precept, at a rate significantly lower than inflation. As a result the Band D contribution will increase by £2.65 per year to £48.83.

We have submitted a grant request for funding of the playground improvements previously circulated. Thanks to those who wrote to us showing support for this project. We should have a response to this application in March.

While not in our parish we have contacted the highways department at county to ask them to address the flooding and mud collection that is happening at the end of Gibbet Lane where it means the A134.

I am sometimes asked about rules governing churchyards and burials therein, and hope that the following information is helpful.

First, the churchyard belongs to the parish and all parishioners have a right to be buried in their local churchyard. It is not for churchgoers only! Indeed, you will almost certainly find that having a service in church followed by burial in the churchyard is less expensive than fees at the local crematorium. Burials are also deemed to be environmentally friendly.

Secondly, the rules concerning who can be buried in a Church of England churchyard are governed by law. According to this, unless the churchyard is closed by Order in Council under the Burial Act of 1853 the following people have a right to be buried in their local churchyard: those who reside in the parish, those whose names are on the church electoral roll, and those who die in the parish. Where these qualifications cannot be met, the Vicar should be first approached for permission. Depending on the number of spaces available, the size of the village etc., the vicar may allow a person to be buried in the church-yard who does not live in the village or die therein.

The fact that previous generations of a family have been buried in the churchyard does not automatically give a person the right to be buried in a particular if that person no longer lives in the village. Such permission can only be granted by Faculty to the Diocesan Registrar in London.
