RED, RED ROSE

Those words begin the famous poem by Robert Burns. My love is like a red, red rose. He wasn't the only poet to use the analogy of a beautiful flower when describing feelings for the one they loved. The nineteenth century poet Helen Hunt Jackson wrote a poem called Dawn. The poem describes the dawning of a new day but woven into it are those same expressions of love, one for another.

With ring of silver, The sun like a lover
And a ring of gold Who glows and is bold
And a red, red rose Woos the lovely earth
Which illumines her face To his strong embrace

Clearly, love and the person or people of our affections, are by far the

most prevalent subjects among poets and songwriters. Why should that be? Perhaps the answer lies in that love is the deepest emotion we may have (along with it's opposite hate). We are generally blessed by those emotions either continuously or at one time or another during our lifetime. Another emotion that is common to us all is grief. The late Queen wrote, after the death of Prince Philip, grief is the price we pay for love. The final lines of his famous poem on the death of a close friend In Memoriam A.H.H. Alfred, Lord Tennyson wrote 'It is better to have loved and lost, than to never have loved at all.'


Why have I 'waxed lyrical' about the subject of love? Well, of course, it's St Valentine's day on the 14th of February. Incidentally, it isn't just young men who, in the springtime, turn to thoughts of love (inspired by another of Tennyson's poems). I used to think that St. Valentine was a myth. Perhaps invented in the 19th century by florists, greeting card and chocolate manufacturers. How wrong I was to entertain such cynical thoughts. For the Saint was a martyr in the third century when Marcus Aurelius Claudius was Roman Emperor. He fell victim to one of the many persecutions that occurred before Constantine made Christianity the imperial religion.

Valentine became the patron saint of 'courtly' love, of beekeepers and of epileptics. The first came about because of a legend that he wrote a letter to a young lady who was his jailer's daughter whom he had befriended and who had been cured of blindness. He signed the letter 'your Valentine'. Some may regard the sending of Valentine cards as an amusing but trivial pursuit. Whilst others are genuine expressions of love (alright, together with flowers, even red, red roses and chocolates). It is to be hoped that all may enjoy that strong embrace expressed in the poem Dawn.

In the Bible there are also expressions of love. Continuous, not partial, love on which we can depend. St. John wrote God is Love and Jesus gave us a new Commandment Love one another, as I have loved you. Let us all take those intensely expressive and profound words of love to heart!

COUNTRYSIDE NOTES STOATS



Stoats are small predators which are found across the UK, in woodlands, fields, sand dunes, low- ground heaths and upland moors, but they are very rarely seen. They belong to the family known as mustelids and are related to weasels, otters, polecats, domestic ferrets, mink and surprisingly badgers. Weasels are no more than two thirds the size of stoats being only about 25cms long and weighing approximately 150 grams. In appearance both are similar in shape to a ferret and are an orangey-brown colour with a creamy coloured chest and underside. When running stoats bound along with an arched back while weasels keep close to the ground. Only rarely is it possible to get a clear view of either. The easiest way to

differentiate between them is that stoats have a black tip to their tail and weasels don't. In northern parts of the UK many stoats turn white in winter while retaining the black tips to their tails. This offers good camouflage in the snow but can be a liability when there isn't any. The fur is also thicker and known as ermine which was used to make the ceremonial robes worn by royalty and members of the House of Lords.

Stoats are fearsome hunters and can easily kill an adult rabbit, many times larger than themselves, which they do by leaping on its back and biting the base of its skull. Rats and other rodents are also favourite prey and stoats will also take birds. Given the opportunity they will kill more than they need and cache away the surplus. During the nesting season they will steal eggs from birds' nests sometimes climbing ivy covered trees in their search. They have been witnessed rolling large eggs along the ground with their nose.

Stoats are solitary animals which hold territories identified by scent marking. They only come together when they mate in mid-August although implantation of the fertilised egg is delayed until the following spring; the young are then born about a month later. They have just one litter a year of up to a dozen kits. Only the female looks after them and it is quite a sight, although very rare, to see them all in a line following mum. The kits are also very playful and it's fascinating to see a whole litter gambolling together in the open, amidst the undergrowth or scrambling about in bracken.

Even though they are widespread across the UK there are a few places from which stoats are absent. They are not present on the Isles of Scilly, most of the Channel Isles, the Outer Hebrides and some of the smaller inner Hebridean islands such as Coll and Tiree. They were first reported as being on the Orkneys in 2010, probably introduced. There is great concern over the effect they are having on the wildlife and efforts are being made to eradicate them. Stoats can be found in Ireland but not weasels although confusingly stoats there are often referred to as weasels!!

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Cappuccino Cake (Cuts into 12 slices)

Ingredients

250g pack butter, softened 250g/9oz light brown soft sugar plus 2-3 tbsp to add to coffee 300g/10oz self-raising flour 4 eggs, beaten 50g/2oz walnuts, toasted and finely chopped (optional) 200ml/7fl oz very strong coffee (made fresh or with instant), cooled

For the Frosting

500g tub mascarpone 2tbs light brown soft sugar Cocoa powder or drinking chocolate to decorate

Method

- 1. Heat oven to 180C/fan 160C/gas 4. Butter 2 x 20cm sandwich tins and line with greaseproof paper. Beat butter and sugar together with electric beaters until pale and creamy. Add the flour and eggs in one go and keep beating until evenly mixed. Fold in the walnuts (if using) and half of the coffee mixture. Spoon the mix into prepared tins and bake for 25-30 mins or until golden and well risen.
- 2. Leave the cakes to cool in their tins before turning onto wire rack. Sweeten the remaining coffee with the 2 tbsp extra sugar and then sprinkle 4 tbsp of the mixture over both sponges. Leave to cool completely.
- 3. While the cakes cool, make the frosting. Tip the mascarpone into a large bowl and beat in the sugar and remaining coffee until smooth and creamy. Use about half of the frosting to sandwich the sponges together, then using a palette knife spread the rest of the frosting over the top of the cake. Decorate with a dusting of cocoa powder or drinking chocolate.

Best eaten on the day but will keep in the fridge for 3-4 days.

"The PCC would wish all parishioners a very happy new year and provide an update on both the church and upcoming events. Firstly the church, by the time you read this brief the scaffolding will be down and you will be able to enjoy the new thatched roof, now fully revealed. Now the church is weather proof we need to be patient while the building dries out prior to other work commencing inside the building, meanwhile we intend to reinstall the electricity supply and bring in experts to plan the lighting and heating options.

The February church service is planned for Saturday 10th followed by a Winter Lunch straight after service from 12-2pm to raise funds for continuing restoration works".

Then moving onto the Easter Service on March 31st which is Easter Sunday.

In January you will have received an invite through your mail-box from the PCC inviting you to participate in the 2024 Open Gardens. This annual event will take place on Sunday 2 June 2024, and we would be grateful to all who accept the invite and open their garden to the public, this is the major Church fundraiser for the year and your support is very important to the parish.

Now the Christmas period is over, and works are starting again, it is intended to get new regular updates back onto the St Marys Beachamwell Public Facebook page, including photos. Please visit the page, if you have not seen it before it contains a very comprehensive photo record or the restoration thus far since 2 February 2022."

To help you manage your account, we will still be sending reminder emails.



How Wet Has it Been?

Surely no-one has failed to notice that it has hardly stopped raining during the autumn.

In fact it really started in July last year, when we had 75.1mm during the month, with rain on more than half the days. The beginning of August was no better, with almost 30mm in the first five days. The beginning of the school holidays must have been dismal. After that, there was some relief until October, when we had 130.1mm in total. Over 56mm of this came down on 19^{th} and 20^{th} – Storm Babet.

Storm Ciaran came at the beginning of November, bringing another 15mm in one day. It felt like it would never stop. But it did – towards the end of November, when we had about a week of hard frost. It came as something of a relief to those of us who spend a lot of time outdoors. It is easier to wrap up warm than it is to keep the rain from permeating your clothing, however good it is, when the rain doesn't stop and it is windy into the bargain.

This respite was short lived though – December was horrendous, with only eight rainless days. The total for the month was 103.9mm. Anyone who thought – New Year, New Weather – was wrong. It rained almost non-stop for the first six days of January, putting down 40.01mm over this period. Everywhere was awash – the rivers were bursting their banks – many of the local nature reserves – Welney, Sculthorpe Hawk and Owl Trust, and others had restricted access or were closed. Even Boughton Fen, for the first time that we have known, was totally engulfed for several days as the Stringside Drain was unable to cope.

The relief channel at Saddlebow has been fully open at every low water since October, flushing massive volumes of water out to sea. Between each opening, the levels have risen several feet as the water travels down the river and drainage system from Bedford.

However, we have been fortunate here. Whilst everywhere is very soggy, and the farmers must be at their wits end, we have not suffered the dreadful flooding that many parts of the country have experienced. And Boughton Pond is full of water. Everyone who thought it would never fill up again after 2022 can relax – nature invariably balances itself up.

A regular meeting of Boughton Parish Council was held on Tuesday 9th January.

This meeting ratified the council's budget for the year 2024/25 and set the council precept at £58.35 for a Band D property. This reflects increase in costs and the need to build a reserve against equipment replacement. The council adopted a biodiversity policy to comply with new regulations, with an action plan that will be developed and reviewed on a regular basis. We will shortly begin work to improve the water quality in the pond by applying a product to break down the sludge that has built up. This project will take place over a three year period. The council has a new arrangement in place for the village marquee. This is available to residents and organisations to borrow for events in return for a small fee towards its upkeep. 




