Dear All,

At the Olympics in Mexico, in 1968, some die-hard spectators lingered in the Olympicstadium, watching the late finishers of the Marathon. The race had been won over an hour previously, and it was getting cold and dark, when suddenly the small crowd heard the sound of sirens and police whistles coming to the stadium. As they watched, one runner made his

way onto the track for the last lap of the 26 mile race. It was John Akhwari of Tanzania. As he ran the final circuit of the track people saw that his leg was bandaged and bleeding. He had fallen and injured himself earlier in the race, but had refused to let it stop him. The few people in the stadium rose and applauded him until he crossed the finishing line. As he finally hobbled away, he was asked why he had not given up, as he had clearly had no chance of winning a medal. His reply was memorable. He said simply: "My country did not send me to Mexico City to start the race, they sent me here to finish it." He had looked beyond the pain of the moment and kept his eye on the purpose for which he was there.

As Christians, we are also called to 'finish the race before us' as we fulfil God's particular calling for us in this life: 'Let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which so easily ensnares us, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith...' Hebrews 12: 1 -2. May you have the perseverance to finish your race in life, and cross the finishing line that leads to heaven

GARDENING TIPS

This year Spring seems to have been a very 'start and stop' season. Very dry, with quite pleasant warm sunny days. but with a persistent cold wind that just didn't want to go away. Hopefully we shall by now be in a warmer and more settled pattern of weather, if rather wet. If the latter, in view of the dry start, it will be quite a blessing from the gardening point of view.

As I write this article a feeling of complete despondency is trying to envelop my whole being! I have had a near disaster with most of my new seedling and other new plants this year and I am coming to the conclusion that the reason I outlined in my April writings may not be the only cause. I always make my own compost and something this year has gone seriously wrong. Despite using the formulae that I have used for many years with one exception, in that I could not find a supply of John Innes base fertilizer and had to use an alternative. I have even gone to the trouble of buying in fresh bags of compost and replanting flagging seedlings and what were well rooted cuttings, but only some of the hardiest types are surviving. This problem combined with the intermittent frosts that we have had of late and being unable to satisfactorily harden off the plants that have survived is not making for peace of mind! The one good set of plants that I do have are some fifty or so different varieties of geranium cuttings that I took last July/ August and over wintered. At least they will provide some cheer around the garden whilst the more delayed survivors try catch up. If I ever find the real reason for my problems this year I will advise further in the hope that my trials may help others prevent them.

I normally use a feeding solution on my lawns in Spring but in view of the dry conditions this season the opportunity did not come until after we had had some rain during the last month. However, if you have not yet applied your preferred feed it needs to be completed as soon as possible and watered in if a granular form to avoid burning.

By now it should be possible to plant out all of those tender subjects that bring a real delight to summer but, do watch the weather forecasts. I am not convinced at the time of writing that we are yet free of the occasional early morning frost!Many of my perennial flower plants are growing quite quickly now (2nd May). In fact one or two of them are producing flowers whilst the green growth is still way behind. It is a classic way of a plant thinking that it is going to fail – the desert syndrome – flower whilst you have the energy, tomorrow you may die! Where this happens give the plant a good watering otherwise if dry conditions prevail it may well do just that! The soft fruit season is rapidly approaching, with all its delights! To help your bushes along give them a light dusting of sulphate of potash around their base followed by a good, but lightly applied, watering. Check around the bushes and canes to ensure that there is no dead or frosted growth that needs cutting out if this has not already been done and tie in any canes that have come away from their supports before they come into flower.

It is time to put up the hanging baskets. They are unlikely to be troubled by frost – too far off the ground. My climbing roses, on the back of our bungalow, had a bad infestation of greenfly very early in April this year and I noticed some more just a day or so ago. However, we have our usual Great Tit residents in the garden again so I don't think the greenfly will survive for very long! I must apologise if this article seems a bit morose early on but I have never had an experience like it before. It goes to prove that even the most experienced of us can come severely unstuck! However, the holiday season is rapidly approaching and hopefully we can all look forward to happier times so I wish you all safe journeys and happy vacations and may your plants grow well! *Roy Coughtrey*

ROASTED ASPARAGUS AND POTATOES

This makes a simple lunch or supper dish. Simply adjust the quantities to suit your appetite/the number of people you are serving.

Ingredients

small new potatoes, scrubbed and halved / quartered if large - aim for bite-sized pieces garlic – several cloves peeled, and halved if large but otherwise left whole asparagus (about half a bunch per person) – trimmed and cut into 1 inch/2 cm lengths halloumi – cut into 1/2 inch / 1 cm cubes large bunch of fresh parsley, roughly chopped juice of at least one lemon salt and pepper olive oil

Method

1. Pre-heat the oven to 180 C/gas mark 4 while you prepare the potatoes and garlic.

2. Throw the potatoes and garlic into a large roasting tin with a generous glug of olive oil. Season well and mix to ensure the potatoes and garlic are well coated in oil. Roast the potatoes for about half an hour while you prepare the rest of the ingredients.

3. Add the asparagus and halloumi to the roasting pan, and roast for a further 15 minutes.

4. Stir through the parsley and plenty of lemon juice.

Serve straight from the oven, or having allowed to cool for about 5 minutes, with crusty bread to mop up the juices.

COUNTRYSIDE NOTES

JUNE 2015 EDIBLE FLOWERS

David and I consider ourselves to be 'hunter/gatherers' but we've never really thought to look in the flower garden for things to eat. I knew you could eat nasturtiums and pansies but when I recently received an order from Thompson and Morgan enclosed was a booklet titled 'Edible Flowers'. I was very surprised how many were listed although some had warnings that they shouldn't be eaten by pregnant women while it was advised others should be consumed sparingly and a few were only specific types within a flower family. Some flavours are mild, some citrusy and others spicy.

Flowers of vegetables can be a useful addition in providing flavour to dishes, recommended were those of onions, chives, chicory, rocket, radish, courgettes, marrows, peas, runner beans (red varieties only) and even strawberries. Unsurprisingly flowers of many herbs were listed - basil, borage, coriander, dill, fennel, lemon balm, mint, oregano, rosemary, sage, salvia sclarea (clary), sweet cicely, sweet mace, and sweet marjoram.

Looking around the flower borders there is a wide choice which not only add flavour but also colour. Rose petals, apple and lilac blossom are delicate but others are much stronger tasting such as hyssop, giant hyssop, lavender, gardenia, bergamot, nasturtium and nepeta. Some species, like marigolds and tagetes, must only be used sparingly. Some of the more surprising plants are bellis daisies, carnations, pinks, gardenia, gladioli, hollyhock, busy lizzie, sweet william, cornflower, evening primrose, sunflower, yucca and the flowers of the scented foliage types of geranium and pelargonium. Only the flowers of specific varieties of some plants are edible such a begonias (*tuberous* only), chrysanthemum (*coronarium* only), jasmine (*officinale* only) and perennial phlox (not annual or low growing creeping phlox).

Apparently the flowers of day lily flowers can be eaten safely (but no other types of lily as they are poisonous!) Tulip flowers are said to be alright to eat although some people may suffer an allergic reaction (the bulbs must not be eaten on any account). Other spring flowers such as primrose, cowslip, polyanthus, violet, pansy and viola must make a special dish look particularly attractive. Obviously, rather like picking mushrooms, caution needs to be practised and you really need to be very well informed before indulging. Specialist books are available but even so better to have a small nibble first!

Besides the list of edible flowers there is a long list of those which certainly must not be eaten as they are all poisonous to a greater or lesser degree. On the list are anemone, autumn crocus, bluebell, hyacinth, celandine, columbine, hellebores, clematis, cyclamen, daffodil, delphinium, foxglove, fritillary, hydrangea, iris, laburnum, leopards bane, lily of the valley, lobelia, lupin, marsh marigold, monkshood, morning glory, pasque flower, periwinkle, pheasants eye, St John's Wort, spurge, swallow wort, thorn apple and tobacco plant (nicotiana). Even though these plants are deemed poisonous extracts from many of them are used in medicine. All parts of alliums are poisonous to cats and dogs and lilies including the pollen are especially to cats.

St. Mary's Church

We were all really pleased that the work on the porch roof had progressed to the stage of lime washing the inside of the porch by Easter and we were able to hold the Easter Sunday Service in the church. I would like to thank everyone who decorated the church with lovely floral arrangements for Easter Sunday.

I would also like to thank Carole and Brian Wilson for once again organising the Beachamwell Half Marathon. For the first time in many years the weather was dreadful and everyone got very wet indeed – so a very special thank you to everyone who took part or supported the event in any way. I understand that approximately $\pounds1,000$ has been raised which is a wonderful result.

The churchwardens have received an enquiry as to why there are three crosses that appear to have fallen down in St Mary's Churchyard. The explanation is that the PCC is required by law to annually inspect every headstone and cross both in St Mary's Churchyard and Shingham Churchyard to check whether they are secure and safe. These regulations follow several accidents and one death a few years ago elsewhere in the country when unstable heavy crosses fell down on top of people.

Last year's inspection showed that 3 crosses in St Mary's churchyard could easily be rocked by hand and were therefore unstable and potentially dangerous. 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The coronation of Queen Elizabeth II as monarch of the United Kingdom, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, Union of South Africa, Pakistan and Ceylon took place on 2 June 1953.

Elizabeth ascended the thrones of these countries at age 25, upon the death of her father, King George VI, on 6 February 1952, and was proclaimed queen by her various privy and executive councils shortly afterwards. The coronation was delayed for more than a year because of the tradition that such a festival was inappropriate during the period of mourning that followed the death of the preceding sovereign. In the ceremony itself, Elizabeth swore an oath to uphold the laws of her nations and to govern the Church of England. Celebrations took



place and a commemorative medal was issued throughout the Commonwealth realms. The Coronation ceremony of Elizabeth II followed a similar pattern to the coronations of the kings and queens before her, being held in Westminster Abbev. and involvina thepeerage and clergy. However, for the new Queen, several parts of the ceremony were markedly different. The coronation of the Queen was the first ever to be televised (although the BBC Television Service had covered part of the procession from Westminster Abbey after her father's coronation in 1937^[]), and was also the world's first major international event to be broadcast on

television. There had been considerable debate within the British Cabinet on the subject, with Prime Minister Winston Churchill against the idea; but, Elizabeth refused her British prime minister's advice on this matter and insisted the event take place before television cameras,[[] as well as those filming with experimental 3D technology. The event was also filmed in colour, separately from the BBC's black and white television broadcast.^[13] Millions across Britain watched the coronation live, while, to make sure Canadians could see it on the same day, RAF Canberras flew film of the ceremony across the Atlantic Ocean to be broadcast by the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation,^[14] the first non-stop flights between the United Kingdom and the Canadian mainland. In Goose Bay, Labrador, the film was transferred to a Royal Canadian Air

Force CF-100 jet fighter for the further three such voyages were made as the

trip to Montreal. In all, coronation proceeded.

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When Queen Salote of Tonga (1900 - 1965) attended the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II in London in 1953, she was greeted as the tallest queen of the smallest kingdom, and gained universal admiration by her natural



dignity and the warmth of her personality. This event reinforced Queen Salote's reputation as a universally beloved monarch. She lived on a diet of Tongan food principally suckling pig roasted over an open fire.

What this reputation concealed were the verv real achievements of a very human person. Vulnerable at the beginning of her reign, Queen Salote succeeded to her titles under threat of annexation and with the enmity of a powerful clique of chiefs who perpetuated dynastic guarrels and resisted centralised government. She soon won the confidence and loyalty of significant people, not least the representatives of the British government in the Western Pacific, and profoundly influenced the opinion and behaviour of her subjects by personal example. Queen Salote gave her people a strong sense of their identity, which was tested by internal dissension, occupation by US forces World War Two. and the challenges of the in modern world.

She attributed her eventual success as a ruler to hard work and a strong character, and observers referred to her intelligence, authority, and knowledge of her people. Salote achieved her great mana by intelligent manipulation and

(as she admitted in a rare moment) by 'hard work ... character. strong and kindness'. She did indeed have a strong character, and also worked very hard. Her 'kindness' was benevolence, although she could be scathing, particularly of those who did not do their duty or If you remember the coronation, you remember Queen Salote, who kept smiling in an open carriage despite the pouring rain!
