RECIPE PAGE

QUICK PORK CHOP SUEY A light, quick meal that is ideal for hot days

3 British pork loin chops cut into bite sized pieces

Half a sweet white onion very roughly chopped and separated into bite sized pieces

6 - 8 medium chestnut mushrooms cut into bite sized pieces

1 red pepper cut into bite sized pieces

1 packet of bean sprouts

The zest and juice of a lemon

1 - 2 teaspoons of dark soy sauce

1 teaspoon of coconut oil

Heat up a large wok / sauté pan / large frying pan until it is close to smoking - keep the heat on high as this cooks really quickly

Add the coconut oil and the pork and brown on one side

Turn the pork and add the mushrooms, onion and pepper - cook until hot but still Crispy

Add the bean sprouts and the lemon zest and quickly stir through for no more than one minute

Add the soy sauce and stir through

Remove from the heat and squeeze on the lemon juice Serve hot.

COUNTRYSIDE NOTES

The Wheelyboat Trust is a charitable organisation that enables wheelchair users, those with mobility issues and people of all ages who are otherwise disabled, along with their carers, to take part in water borne activities previously denied them. Their boats are based on various lakes, reservoirs, rivers, canals and some larger craft on inshore waters across the UK. More than 220 are stationed at various sites from South Uist in the Outer Hebrides to Cornwall.



Wheelyboats are designed to be used for pleasure boating, nature watching and fishing, additionally those with a top speed of 30mph can extend to power boating. Several designs of step free wheelchair accessible boats have been developed to suit different locations. They either take the form of mini landing crafts which work on a roll on/roll off principle or smaller ones which are designed for disabled people so they can fish either still waters or rivers. These are more of a conventional boat design which incorporates a hydraulic platform for easy access.

COUNTRYSIDE NOTES

I was invited recently to Blakeney for the launch of 'Poppy' one of the latest models - a top of the range Coulam V20 capable of negotiating inshore waters and the first to be powered by both electricity and petrol. £80,000 was raised through collaboration between the Royal British Legion's Blakeney, Cley and District branch, the Norfolk Charitable Trust and the Wheelyboat Trust to pay for her.

Poppy is the first Wheelyboat to be sited on the north Norfolk coast and will enable the disabled to view the wonderful scenery and wildlife, an experience previously impossible for them. Being out on the water in a boat offers a sense of freedom most of us take forgranted. The first Wheelyboat built was launched in 1985 and since then the charitable Trust has gone from strength to strength. The staff consists of two people, Andy Beadsley the Director and Paul Elgood who is Fundraising & Communications Manager. Andy is disabled himself and has been Director for the last 20 years. I have known him personally for 40 years and there could be no better person for the job. An accident when he was 17 left him paralysed from the chest down and confined to a wheelchair but he's let nothing stand in his way since. Unaccompanied, he drives himself all over the country and has even been known to deliver a boat on his own!

A large number of Wheelyboats are self-operated, all of those on fisheries for example, but a helmsman is provided for those like Blakeney's that are capable of powerboating. Operators set their own charges – some ask for a donation to help with the running costs while others operate on a more commercial footing and charge a set price.

In Norfolk they are available at Blackdyke Trout Fly Fishery, Hockwold, Sportsman's Staithe, Ormesby Broad, Fritton Lake and Country Park, Great Yarmouth and Norwich and District Pike Club, River Yare.

Magpie Riders Fly High at Regional Competition

Disabled riders from throughout East Anglia gathered at the College of West Anglia's Milton campus on Sunday May 8 to contest the Riding for the Disabled Association (RDA) Regional Dressage competition.

Riders are grouped according to their level of disability, and of the West Norfolk Riding for

the Disabled team, based at the Magpie Centre, Wallington Hall, five of the six strong team placed first or second in their classes, and won through to the RDA National Championships, to be held at Hartpury College, near Gloucester, on July 15/17.

Seasoned competitors Michelle Alflatt and Aynsley Calvert, riding new mounts, Sully and Ava, respectively, both won their classes. Michelle piloted Sully to victory, with an excellent mark of 69.3%, while Aynsley won both his dressage class and the Countryside Challenge qualifier. This last is like a mounted obstacle course and, despite Ava stopping to peer at a cardboard hen, the pair achieved top marks.

Said Michelle: 'Sully was a very good girl, and I was delighted with my marks. I just hope we can consolidate this with a win at the Nationals.'

But competing at the Nationals doesn't come cheap, so, although the riders pay their own entry fees, plus travel and accommodation costs, West Norfolk RDA will need to foot the bill for horse transport and stabling, as well as staff transport and accommodation.

Watch this space to find out how you can help.

Entries are still open for the Charity Ride, scheduled for June 12, with routes of various lengths, around Wallington Hall estate. The shorter ride is even suitable for riders on lead rein, so, even if the ground remains hard, but you and your horse fancy a gentle saunter, off-road, in lovely surroundings, visit our website; www.rda-westnorfolk.org.uk for details of how to enter.

"I hope that was cleaned out before they brought it here!" "Whv?"

"It's a Blue Danube, a nuclear bomb, didn't you know?"

Well, that's roughly how a conversation went between two members of the West Norfolk Aviation Society during an evening in May at Marham. My group was wending its way through a tour of the Heritage Centre, beginning at the First World War exhibits, moving through the WW2 artefacts and finally reaching the Cold War area.

Our guides had kindly given up their own time to explain to us what we were looking at. And very successful they were too. They described the aircraft which had flown from Marham airfield over a period in excess of a hundred years: the biplane fighters sparring with Zeppelins, the Mosquitos 25 years later and, the V Bombers and Tornados in more recent years.

But Bunny, formerly an RAF Armourer, and Ken, who used to fly as a Navigator, took particular care to recall the contributions made by other people involved: the aircrews of course, the engineers, the parachute packers, the armourers, the cooks and particularly the relatives of those who were in harm's way when on Active Service.

During the intermission Chris, our Chairman and also an ex armourer, produced refreshments: sandwiches and tea which he had previously made himself. Thank you, Sir!

Our sincerest thanks are due to those two chaps for a fascinating couple of hours which we would like to experience again (our memories are not as good as they were!); perhaps in a couple of years' time.

So, if you find yourself near Marham, check the museum's opening times on their website and spend an hour or two there. You will enjoy a very friendly welcome, a highly competent guide and, a lot to learn!

In the meantime, if you are interested in other subjects aeronautical, do peruse our website to see what we have to offer on the evening of the first Tuesday of each month in the Bowls Club at Mundford.

From 1 July 2018, our Lily service expanded to include everyone over 18, not just those in later years.

Lily provides a comprehensive range of support in West Norfolk to combat loneliness and social isolation in adults of all ages. The project is linked to the 'No Lonely Day' initiative and encourages our residents to develop friendships and engage in their local communities.

The Lily online directory lists organisations, services and activities that help people to live healthy, active and independent lives. It includes information relevant to adults of all ages. If you would like your event or organisation to be included in the directory, get in touch asklily.org.uk

Lily Advisors from local charities are available to offer one-to-one support to people at home or in community locations.

Lily has a strong focus on community development, by helping groups to arrange activities and encouraging volunteering, and by providing community events, onsite information sessions, and support for employers, schools, and colleges.

Free Home Assessments on Offer

Older, disabled or vulnerable residents of West Norfolk are being encouraged to book an appointment for a free home assessment from Careline Community Services.

The assessments, which are carried out by a team of qualified staff, will help residents, who may be living with a disability or dementia, or who are simply older and less mobile, to identify concerns in their property which may be affecting their day-to-day life.

The assessor, trained by the Disabled Living Foundation, will inspect the home to see whether measures could be introduced that would reduce the possibility of slips, trips and falls and generally make it easier for people to live safely and independently in their own homes.

Measures that could be considered include installation of a Careline personal alarm, improved lighting arrangements, heating checks, draught proofing, smoke detectors and easy-to-use taps along with recommendations for other adaptations that may reduce any potential risk to the resident. Practical solutions for those living with dementia are also available, this includes signage or colour differentiation for those who suffer with memory loss and are visually impaired.

The assessors will also be able to advise whether any grant funding is available for any works required.

COULD YOU HELP A YOUNG PERSON WITH A DISABILITY TO THINK ABOUT THEIR FUTURE?

The CSV Futures Project supports young people with learning disabilities to explore their options as they think about leaving education.

Volunteer Mentors provide one to one support to a young person to help them develop a personal profile of their skills and interests, their likes and dislikes and their future goals. The Mentor can then support the young person to start working towards these; this can include accessing work experience and training opportunities plus the chance to try out volunteering and new social activities.

CSV needs volunteers who can offer a couple of hours of their time each week to mentor the young people as they make choices about their futures, raising aspirations by exploring together the young person's skills, interests and abilities.

We are looking for people ages 16+ - Mentors can come from all walks of life and no experience is needed but patience, the ability to listen and a sense of humour are all useful skills. Mentors receive full training and support and out of pocket expenses are paid.

Parochial Church Council

It has been four long months since we lost our church in the devastating fire and the preliminary investigations and specifications for phase one of the contract (clearing and structural stabilisation works) are nearing the end.

Preparation of the tender documents by the appointed project management company has been a slow and complicated process, involving consultation and

approval of several professional bodies and the involvement of various specialists in order to ensure full compliance with the prescribed procedures, which apply to such old buildings of special interest.

The new PCC has recently held a meeting with the project manager and we've been informed that the first phase of works is likely to commence by the early summer, with the intention to have the temporary roof covering over the whole extent of the remains before the winter sets in. It was explained to us that, due to the specialist nature of this type of clearance and debris recovery, the progress is usually very slow as every attempt is made to carefully examine the remains and try to preserve and restore any valuable artefacts, memorials and parts of the built in features.

Once the first phase of works draws close to completion we will be asked to specify what are our final proposals for the re-building of the church. The outcomes from the recent questionnaire and the public consultation meeting discussions will help inform the PCC of the local residents' wishes for the future of our church and the overall scope of the redevelopment. The final proposal will be also influenced by any funding limitations that might be applied by our insurers, so any proposed modernisation / improvements within the new building, apart from those stipulated by the current building regulations, might require further fund-raising activities within our community, with the help of 'Friends of St Mary's'.

In the meantime, we will continue to hold our monthly 'Church on the Green' services on the first Saturday, starting at 11 am. We hope you can come along and join us in our prayers for the safe future of our special little church.

On Tuesday 3rd May the Annual Parish Meeting was held - a meeting specifically for residents (it's not a council meeting). Sadly not a single resident attended. This is a pity as it is an opportunity for residents to have their say and the council uses the outcome to guide its policy for the coming year. The minutes of the meeting containing reports from the Chair and Fen Committee will be made available on the council website.

Also on 3rd May, the annual meeting of the parish council was held. We received our annual audit results and ratified our annual return. The RFO/Clerk reported that the income and expenditure had closely followed the budget and ear-marked reserves for future planned expenditure were on target. Councillor roles and responsibilities remain the same and I will be continuing as Chair for another year.

At the Parish Council meeting it was resolved not to further pursue the installation of dog waste bins at this time. We are still awaiting highways to add a "SLOW" marking the corner of Stoke Road. We are actively opposing a planning application for a holiday site neighbouring Boughton Fen having concerns about the potential effects on our Site of Special Scientific Interest

On Thursday 2nd June at 2pm we will be dedicating the Boughton Queen's Platinum Jubilee Tree on The Green and unveiling a commemorative plaque. Residents are welcome to join.

Boughton Fen

The past year has been successful in several ways.

We have had a number of new volunteers offering their time – several of whom had discovered the fen during the Covid restrictions, and wanted to help, as well as a new resident in the village with a keen interest in bird watching. It has been a pleasure to welcome new helpers to our working parties, all of whom have been happy to muck in with whatever tasks came to hand.

In addition to this, two canoeists contacted me to enquire if they could assist with a water born litter pick. They had done this on other watercourses elsewhere, and had all the necessary documentation to launch their canoe. They kindly came at the beginning of April and collected three bags of rubbish and other larger debris from the river banks.

Harrier numbers are high, with sightings of up to ten at a time, and evidence of nesting was established, whilst ringing tawny owl chicks. Our bird of prey ringer was able to ring three chicks and, after a suitable time period, was able to arrange to have the growing birds wing-tagged. This is not an opportunity that presents itself very often, so was something of an achievement for the bird recorders.

Working parties have all gone well, with most of the work required being carried out by volunteers. Due to the scale of the work required to repair the boardwalk,

we are currently making enquiries for having at least some of this done by a contractor.

Our reed/grass cutter has successfully kept the path mown, and completed the late summer cut as required by Natural England. This cutting has to be done sequentially across the non-reed areas, and records kept as to their locations every year. He has also managed quite a decent reed cut for the first time in three years. Unfortunately, the quality of the reed was so poor that he could not bale it as he usually does, enabling us to burn it. It shattered into brash, so he collected up most of it with another machine, leaving a large area covered in only the fine debris, ready to be raked up by hand at a working party.

We were invited to enter the CPRE Norfolk awards, so made the appropriate submission.

We were rewarded with a visit from one of the judges, and in September, received a highly commended award at the presentation evening in Dereham.

The knowledgeable birders who frequent the site seem to be recording an ever increasing list of rare and endangered species on the fen, most recently turtle dove. It is important that the habitat is maintained in its present condition to support this wildlife.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank my hardworking committee, without whom this would not be possible, as well as the volunteers, both old and new. *Sue Pogmore*
