TEMPUS FUGIT!

On the clock-face side of the Church tower of Brent Pelham in Hertfordshire is the inscription *Time Flies - Mind Your Business*. Presumably placed there by the Lord of the Manor some time ago when politically incorrect statements were thought appropriate. Obviously, it was meant to encourage people who worked on the land to do so more productively. This in view of the fact that time itself is finite. And has a habit of getting out of control!. Hence the term *procrastination is the thief of time*. This adage is thought to have been first used in a poem called *Night Thoughts* by the 18th century poet Edward Young.

The inscription was placed on the clock-face side of the village Church bell-tower at a time when few people actually owned time pieces of any sort. Time was marked by naturally occurring factors such as dawn and dusk and the passing of the seasons. The hours of the day were of less consequence in an agrarian economy. Things changed with the Industrial Revolution (beginning in the 18thC). People working in factories had to adhere to shift patterns, beginning and ending work at particular times of day. So that machines could be used to the maximum.

Time became an all-important safety element with the coming of the railways. The intervals between trains and the resulting departure and arrival times had to be established and published. One of the stumbling blocks to this was that there was no standard time in existence. Every principle city had its own time. For example, there was a *10-minute difference* between the time at Bristol and that in London. Even today there are two minute hands on clock-faces at the Exchange Building and one of the railway stations in Bristol. The standardisation was begun in 1840 by the Great Western Railway adapting the *Mean Time* in London which became Greenwich Mean Time (G.M.T).

A poem by Isaac Watts (1674-1748) entitled *Our God, Our Help* became the hymn *O God Our Help in Ages Past.* There is a verse which begins *Time like an ever rolling stream bears all its sons away.* It is a call to treat each day as precious because time is finite. That becomes ever more apparent to those of us who are more 'mature'. Prioritise those things that *need* to be done rather than those we only *want* to do. The Bible also has much to say about the good use of time. Ecclesiastes chapter 4 verse 1 states *For everything has a season, and a time for every matter under heaven.* And St. Paul writing to the early Church in Ephesus wrote - Be careful how you live, not as unwise people but as wise, making the most of the time, because the days are evil (Eph. 5: 15/16)

One of my father's favourite sayings was *How's the enemy*? Meaning, what time is it? As if time were an enemy to be defeated; not to encroach on life. My experience is that time is a resource we have been given to use as best we can. For others as well as for ourselves. *Tony Mills*

COUNTRYSIDE NOTES

2023 was one of wettest years since records began in 1836 and rain continued to fall until last month. Not only has 2024 been very wet so far but April was unusually cold. Continually waterlogged ground has hit arable and livestock farming hard. Many crops sown last autumn either rotted in the ground or have had their root systems damaged. Few plants can tolerate standing in water for very long. Most farmers haven't been able to get on the land this spring to prepare it let alone actually plant crops, the first week of April being the last Where farmers did manage to get crops sown low viable opportunity. temperatures throughout April stunted germination and growth. Compared with last year it's estimated that all wheat produced would decline by 26.5%, winter barley by 33.1% and oilseed rape by 37.6%. Crops of lettuce, cabbages and cauliflower are started off in greenhouses then planted out as individual plants once they are big enough. This couldn't be delayed so they too were badly affected. UK harvests of many important crops could be down by 20% triggering price rises. Elsewhere livestock farmers have also been hard hit. Most calves and lambs are born in the spring and, although often temporarily housed in barns, this system only works when they can be turned out into the fields after a few days to make room inside for the next batch. When fields become waterlogged for prolonged periods it damages or kills the grass, harms the structure of the soil and pastures get trampled thus immediately affecting the availability of grazing and the future supply of hay or silage. Calves and lambs that are at all weak perish in continued cold and wet. The sudden rise in the cost of cereal, fuel and energy products resulting from the Russian invasion of Ukraine made it obvious how vulnerable we are to world events. Britain has the ability to be much more self-sufficient than it is. Many people think that food security should be a key issue in government planning but more and more prime farmland is being taken out of production because the government is hell bent on portraying a green image by handing out substantial grants and subsidies. Climate change is at its root but at what cost to us does reducing carbon emissions come. Thousands of acres are now covered with solar panels, trees, crops to feed anaerobic digesters, rewilding projects and strips of pretty summer flowers. Is this wise? Shouldn't the priority be putting food on our tables? We can't eat any of them but who can blame farmers for opting for a guaranteed income rather than the risks associated with growing crops and raising livestock! Importing crops that could be home grown is self-defeating although admittedly our own carbon footprint is reduced because that responsibility falls on those countries that produce them. In the four weeks to mid-April grocery price inflation was reported to have dropped to 3.2%, the lowest in 30 months. Don't expect this trend to last!!!

RECIPE PAGE

Rose Crust Pastry

Ingredients

12 oz plain flour
4oz corn flour
4 oz icing or castor sugar
10 – 12 oz cooking margarine
Egg to bind to stiff dough

Method

1. Cream fat and sugar together until soft.

2. Add cornflour and plain flour a little at a time. This makes it easier to mix together.

3. Add beaten egg a little at a time until the pastry is pliable.

4. Roll out (not too thinly) and ready to use as required.

5. Bake in oven mark 6 - 5 or 425 - 400 approx 20 minutes or until golden brown.

FROM THE EDITORIAL TEAM


First a big thank you to those bodies, and the individuals involved, who have contributed funds to enable G4N to continue. This is much appreciated.

"As we approach the summer we have had two major events at the church. Meanwhile work continues on St Mary's with the removal of fire damaged plaster and the restoration of the stonework around the windows. The PCC and project team have been working with lighting and heating experts to bring both back into the church, using economic LED lights and ceramic radiating heaters. This work is concurrent with the plans to provide level access by raising and lowering floors at the west end of the church. For those who were able to attend the Topping Out, you will have had the opportunity to see inside St Mary's and receive a brief on what those plans mean to those who in the past found it difficult, if not impossible, to easily gain entry to the building. We are working closely with the diocesan authorities to complete the necessary bureaucracy to be able to complete the restoration of the church soon. sadly there are no guarantees in this business but we remain optimistic. If you are passing the church and it is clear that there is work ongoing please feel free to stop and talk to the contractors in the churchyard to find out what they are working on. To see what is going on from the leisure of your own home see our facebook page - St Marys Beachamwell, it contains updates, tells of events and has many photographs of the work. These will be of even more interest as the interior work progresses. The plain glass glazing installation has slipped because of the debris from the plaster removal, this could damage the glass.

There will be a church service on the green on 8th of June at 11:00 and this will be followed by the village hall 80th Anniversary of D-Day celebrations. Our village has a son who fell on that day, 6th June 1944, on Sword Beach, so a tangible link to that historic event." *Peter Berendt (Churchwarden and Vice Chairman)*

Fen report for Annual Parish Meeting 7th May 2024

This has not been an easy year for several reasons. Shortly after last year's APM, we were shocked and saddened by the death of one of our long- standing committee members, Dave Cooper. We have missed his input and ready sense of humour enormously throughout the year. To coin a well- known song – "You don't know what you've got till it's gone"

The summer was OK, and then the rain started. It has been difficult to organise working parties. The conditions underfoot have been anything from treacherous to completely flooded much of the time, and it has been constantly pouring with rain. For the first time since we have been managing the fen, the river burst its banks on Lower Fen twice during the winter.

The saturated conditions and gales have caused several large trees to topple over, and large boughs to break off. We have been able to deal with some of these with working parties, but a contractor has been brought in to deal with the bigger stuff, as well as a couple of trees that had become unsafe.

Despite this, by calling working parties at short notice, sometimes in the week, when there was a window in the weather, the majority of tasks on our job list have been completed, as well as the unexpected tree work, and I am please to report that over the season we have welcomed a number of new volunteers.

A reed cut was also achieved, despite the wet conditions, although the area concerned quickly filled with water shortly after the work was completed. The late summer cut to the grassier areas has paid dividends as barn owls have been seen on several occasions, and may possibly be nesting at the moment.

For the first time in fourteen years, the Rural Payments Agency has paid the Stewardship money in the year it is due. Sometimes it has been almost three years behind, so it has been necessary to ensure a large buffer in the bank account to ensure the prescribed work is carried out, whether the money is available or not. Even more surprising is that the rates for each task have been increased dramatically. It seems that Defra have realised that there has been no increase in over twenty years, and in addition, environments involving wetland are currently being encouraged, so our income has risen considerably. Advice has been taken on this from Natural England, who thought it best to invest some of it, in case there is a change of mind in the coming years, and will ensure that there are funds to continue the management of the fen if no schemes are available when the existing stewardship grant comes to an end.

The fen had an impressive starling murmuration over several weeks earlier this year, with visitors travelling significant distances to view it. The recent weeks have seen much bird activity, and many serious birders travelling to the site for it. Recent observations have been three cuckoos, several hobbies, a bittern, woodcock, nightingale, six different types of warbler, and numerous more common species in abundance. Nightingales have not been heard at Boughton for several years, so we must be getting something right.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank my committee for their continuous hard work and interest, as well as the volunteers who have helped us out during the year. We hope for less mud in the next twelve months. **Sue Pogmore**




