SWAFFHAM MUSEUM 2020



"Enjoyed it all! but especially the Monique Slaven Room (archaeology)" *Visitors - April 2019* "Fabulous exhibition - our 8yr old was totally absorbed" *Visitors - July 2018* Over our closed period – Christmas to mid-February –

we have been hard at work doing general maintenance work, cleaning and changing some of the displays.

In Room 1, as part of our story of Swaffham, this year we have a display cabinet dedicated to the Plowright Story. This sits alongside a carved lectern from the Old Hamond's School, the clocks made by local clockmakers, the town armour circa 1624, and the

Carter model engine.

Last year we renamed our Archaeology Gallery the 'Monique Slaven Gallery', in memory of our very supportive and enthusiastic volunteer who had spent around 30 years using a metal detector in the fields surrounding her Sporle home, and found a huge array of 'treasures' which are beautifully displayed in the Sporle and Palgrave Cabinet. You can also hear Monique talk about this collection in a short audio tape.

Until April we have a display of the photographs from the 2019 Rotary 'Capture Swaffham' competition. However, many of our visitors come because they have heard of the Howard Carter connection and we have a gallery devoted to him, his family connections and his discovery of the most famous Egyptian tomb – that of Tutankhamun.

There are children's activities, take home information sheets and family museum trails as well as the newly revamped Museum Shop which also houses the Tourist Information Centre.

Last admissions 30 minutes before closing time.

ST MARY'S CHURCH, HOUGHTON ON THE HILL SPRING OPENING EVENT!



The historic 11th century church of St Mary's, Houghton on the Hill, is only a few miles from Swaffham and is an architectural and historic gem of national and international importance. The church is open every weekend from 2pm to 4pm and from 28 March it will be open every afternoon to mark the start of its spring and summer season.

The story of the church is remarkable: left to decay in the last century when the village of Houghton, and its parishioners, disappeared, the church was restored through the efforts of Bob and Gloria Davey. In the course of that restoration the remains of extensive wall paintings were discovered, described as 'the most extensive scheme of early church paintings to have survived'.

Today the church of St Mary's and its beautiful garden is looked after by its trustees and a band of volunteers. It is completely dependent on donations from the public to survive. That is why we want to encourage you, your family, friends and visitors to come to St Mary's and join us for our special events now that the spring season is starting.

On Saturday March 28 we are hosting a special event to mark the installation of the Church bell and the launch of a brand new guide to the Church. At 2pm the bell will be rung after a dedication by the Rev Stephen Thorp. Visitors will be encouraged to tour the church and garden, examine the collection of historic books, marvel at the paintings and even have a go at ringing the bell themselves (for a small donation!). And we hope that our visitors will contribute to the running of the church so that we can preserve and enhance its magnificent 1000 year old history.

St David of Wales

March 1st is St. David's Day, the national day of Wales and it has been celebrated as such since the 12th Century. Today the celebrations usually involve the singing of traditional songs followed by a Te Bach, a tea with bara brith (famous welsh fruited bread) and teisen bach (welsh cake). Young girls are encouraged to wear national costume and leeks or daffodils are worn, being the national symbols of Wales.

So who was St. David (or Dewi Sant in Welsh)? Actually not too much is known about St David except from a biography written around 1090 by Rhygyfarch, son of the Bishop of St. Davids.

According to legend, David was born on a cliff top near Capel Non (Non's chapel) on the South-West Wales coast during a fierce storm. Both his parents were descended from Welsh royalty. He was the son of Sandde, Prince of Powys, and Non, daughter of a chieftain of Menevia (now the little e cathedral town of St David's). The site of Davids birth is marked by the ruins of a tiny ancient chapel close to a holy well and the more recent 18th century chapel dedicated to his mother Non can still be seen near St. David's Cathedral.



In medieval times it was believed that St David was the nephew of King Arthur. Legend has it that the patron saint of Ireland, St. Patrick – also said to have been born near the present day city of St. Davids – foresaw the birth of David in approximately 520AD. The young David grew up to be a priest, being educated at the monastery of Hen Fynyw under the tutorage of St. Paulinus. According to legend David performed several miracles during his life including restoring Paulinus' sight. It is also said that during a battle against the Saxons, David advised his soldiers to wear leeks in their hats so that they could easily be distinguished from their enemies, which is why the leek is one of the emblems of Wales!

A vegetarian who ate only bread, herbs and vegetables and who drank only water, David became known as Aquaticus or Dewi Ddyfrwr (the water drinker) in Welsh. Sometimes, as a self-imposed penance, he would stand up to his neck in a lake of cold water, reciting Scripture! I is also said that milestones during his life were marked by the appearance of springs of water. Becoming a missionary David travelled throughout Wales and Britain and even made a pilgrimage to Jerusalem where he was consecrated bishop. He founded 12 monasteries including Glastonbury and one at Minevia (St. Davids) which he made his bishops seat. He was named Archbishop of Wales at the Synod of Brevi (Llandewi Brefi), Cardiganshire in 550.

Monastery life was very strict, with the brothers having plough and sow to grow their food, . The monks had to keep themselves fed as well as provide food and lodging for travellers. They also looked after the poor. Many crafts were followed – beekeeping, in particular, was very important.

St David died on 1 March 589A.D., at Minevia, allegedly over 100 years old. His remains were buried in a shrine in the 6th century cathedral which was ransacked in the 11th century by Viking invaders, who plundered the site and murdered two Welsh bishops.

After his death, his influence spread far and wide, first through Britain and then by sea to Cornwall and Brittany. In 1120, Pope Callactus II canonised David as a Saint. Following this he was declared Patron Saint of Wales. Such was Davids influence that many pilgrimages were made to St. David's, and the Pope decreed that two pilgrimages made to St. Davids equalled one to Rome while three were worth one to Jerusalem. Fifty churches in South Wales alone bear his name it is not certain how much of the history of St. David is fact and how much is mere speculation. However in 1996 bones were found in St. David's Cathedral which, it is claimed, could be those of Dewi himself. Perhaps these bones can tell us more about St David: priest, bishop and patron saint of Wales.

Free home assessments on offer

Older, disabled or vulnerable residents of West Norfolk are being encouraged to book an appointment for a free home assessment from Careline Community Services.

The assessments, which are carried out by a team of qualified staff, will help residents, who may be living with a disability or dementia, or who are simply older and less mobile, to identify concerns in their property which may be affecting their day-to-day life.

The assessor, trained by the Disabled Living Foundation, will inspect the home to see whether measures could be introduced that would reduce the possibility of slips, trips and falls and generally make it easier for people to live safely and independently in their own homes.

Measures that could be considered include installation of a Careline personal alarm, improved lighting arrangements, heating checks, draught proofing, smoke detectors and easy-to-use taps along with recommendations for other adaptations that may reduce any potential risk to the resident. Practical solutions for those living with dementia are also available, this includes signage or colour differentiation for those who suffer with memory loss and are visually impaired.

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RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Boiled Fruit Cake

Ingredients

12 oz mixed cake fruit

6 oz butter or margarine

8 ioz caster sugar

2 eggs

8 oz self raising flour

1 teaspoon mixed spice

Method

Put fruit in large saucepan, just cover with water and bring to the boil.

Simmer for 5 minutes, then strain very well.

Stir the butter or margarine into hot fruit, then stir in the sugar.

Finally add the eggs (do not beat), stir into mixture alternately with the flour and spice.

Pour into greased lined 8 in. cake tin.

Bake in centre of preheated oven (350F/180C/gas mark 4) for about 1 hour 30 minutes, or until cooked through

COUNTRYSIDE NOTES CLIMATE CHANGE

Climate change is an extremely complex subject and, as with anything to do with nature, one simple deed, however well-intentioned, can lead to an unforeseen chain action.

The amount of meat consumed in Britain declined in 2019 as people turned to vegetarianism and veganism. As a matter of conscience plant based diets are often adopted as an aid to saving our planet because animals are blamed for being part of the climate change problem. But it's not as simple as that. Many of the components of a meat free diet such as soy, rice, lentils, quinoa and avocados have to be imported from half way round the world because they are not grown on a commercial scale in Britain. Transport of any kind results in pollution to the atmosphere, the very reason why some vegetarians and vegans denounce eating meat. Soya beans are a primary source of plant protein not only used to feed the animals we eat but it is also a key product frequently used in the manufacture of meat substitute products and soy milk, soy sauce, tofu, tempeh and edamame. Most of our imported soya is grown in North America and Latin America where vast tracts of the Amazon rain forest have been destroyed so the land could be used for growing soybean. Trees play a vital part in our environment by purifying water and the air which we breathe. However it's not only the trees that are destroyed but also the plants and wildlife that lived amongst them. The knock-on effect is huge.

Even more worrying is the fast growing popularity of palm oil right across the world. 85% of it comes from Indonesia and Malaysia. Obtained from the fruits of palm trees it is the healthiest option available containing less fat than other oils. It is also widely used in the food and cosmetic industries, personal care products and even to produce bio-fuel. Palm trees being perennial makes them more profitable than any other oil producing plants providing five times the yield obtained from annual crops such as rape and sunflowers. But it comes at a price. Palm oil production has resulted in extensive areas of rain forest being destroyed in Malaysia and Indonesia. Through loss of habitat the Sumatran tiger and Sumatran elephant are in danger of extinction and in Borneo there is little room left for orangutans to survive. Large animals require large territories. They not only die during deforestation activities but the habitat of those who are spared is fragmented making it difficult for them to find a mate, if they do in-breeding is likely.

Save our planet campaigners and activists have good intentions but maybe it would be more environmentally friendly to stick to home produced foods including meat. However, no one ever wants to admit that the real problem is that there are now far too many people on our planet. In 2000 the world population was 6.12 billion, double what it was in 1960, now it is 7.7 billion and rising fast!!

TNHA NEWS

The Nicholas Hamond Academy A 7am start on a cold and rainy Sunday did not deter our TNHA rugby fans who were given the opportunity of visiting a Leicester Tigers Match recently. Visiting the home ground of the rugby union side at Welford Road, students were given the opportunity to take part in a masterclass with the team's

coaches and to be 'flag wearers' on the pitch before the game. They also were able to have a photograph with the team as a memento of their visit.

Meanwhile in a warmer setting, we have been delighted to welcome visitors to the academy inspiring our students, the first of which was Baroness Hayman GBE who spoke to students on the nature of the House of Lords and House of Commons. She is certainly well qualified to do so, being the first elected Lord Speaker of the House of Lords, serving on the privy-council committee and being the youngest ever MP (one of only 27 female MPs in the House of Commons at that time)! She encouraged students to pick an avenue that they are passionate about and argue for it (e.g. the environment and climate change) and answered some excellent questions on Brexit, Cancer Research UK and the Privy Council (who advise the Queen on the carrying out of her duties, including the exercise of the Royal Prerogative and other functions assigned to the Sovereign by Acts of Parliament). Students joined her afterwards in a more informal setting enjoying refreshments and being able to ask her questions on a one-to-one basis. Also visiting us were The Breckland Youth Advisory Board (YAB) who are a body of Young Commissioners aged 11 to 19 who work with professionals, to identify issues impacting young people. Their focus is on personal development, consulting other young people, campaigning for change, lobbying decision makers, funding projects and much more. They gained views from our Student Council on a number of issues including mental health and well-being, bullying, youth voice and participation and careers, learning how they too could become involved. Regular TNHA Youth Advisory Board Meeting are held weekly with all students welcome to attend and have their 'voice heard'.

Still on the subject of 'listening and ensuring students are heard' February saw the re-launch of our Anti-Bullying Ambassador Programme where a group of volunteer students are available at break and lunch for those who may have worries or issues and find it easier to talk to their peers. Ensuring a quick and effective response is the goal of all at TNHA and these excellent students are helping in this endeavour.Celebrating their success, are two of our VI Form students, who been offered a place on the Senior Health & Care Academy Programme at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital in Kings Lynn. The Programme which will run from late January until June will offer an insight into the various skills and experience required to apply for apprenticeships in the Health Sector. They are certainly a credit to TNHA and we wish them every success in taking the first steps towards their career goals.

Wereham's WW2 Dead

While the overall tone of Wereham Heritage Group's planned event to mark the 75th anniversary of VE Day will be upbeat, we cannot let this moment pass without remembering the two local men named on our village war memorial who lost their lives in WW2. It would be great to learn a little more of their short lives.

I've been able to piece a little together from records, but it doesn't amount to much. Maybe you knew their families or can throw some more light on their backgrounds?

Dennis Clarence Matthews was just 22 when in 1944, he lost his life, alongside others from the 2nd Dorsetshire regiment, in some of the most bitter fighting of the Burma campaign. His grave at Kohima bears the inscription 'Not just today, but every day, remembered by dad, aunty, Barbara, grandad'. On the CWGC commemorative certificate he is listed as nephew of Mrs L Rowe of Wereham. He was clearly much loved. The 1939 survey shows several households that include someone with the Matthews surname, but just one that also includes a Mrs Rowe (New Buildings, Stoke Road). Could this be where Dennis grew up?

Alexander Herbert Bellamy died in 1940, aged 30. He was a Colour Sergeant with the 7th Battalion of the Royal Norfolk Regiment and lost his life

at Dunkirk. He is shown on several casualty lists as 'missing' and was only declared 'presumed killed in action' in 1942. Unlike Dennis, he has no grave, but is commemorated on the Dunkirk Memorial. The 1939 survey lists his parents, Richard S. S. Bellamy, a retired shipping merchant and Ellen Bellamy, living at Row House, The Row, Wereham along with a younger sister, also Ellen Alexander was born in Cheshire, and there seem to be strong Cheshire and Rio de Janeiro family connections, so I wonder what brought them to live in Wereham?

King's Lynn Festival Chorus (of which there are several members in the G4N parishes) will perform the mighty **St. Matthew Passion** by that giant of composers, **J.S.Bach**, in time for Easter.

This epic work requires 2 full mixed voiced choirs as well as 2 orchestras. We, as a group, have worked very hard this past year raising funds in order to subsidise the cost of tickets to a reasonable level so this masterpiece may be experienced and appreciated by as many people as possible. Fund raising efforts have ranged from Catch-a-Copper (coin collection) to marathon walking and sky diving!

For this performance, we are joined by the London-based **Meridian Sinfonia**, a professional orchestra performing on period instruments. Soloists, all of whom are prominent musicians, include West Norfolk's own **Angela Brun**, ex Sydney Opera House, now of West Bilney.
