Dear All, Pastoral Letter May 2015

This year 'Rogation Sunday' falls on 10th May Rogation means 'an asking of God' - when God is asked to bless the land for the year ahead. The practice was inherited by the Church from the Romans. In those days a crowd moved in procession around the cornfields, singing and dancing and 'driving away the winter with sticks'. In 465 AD following an earthquake, tsunami and epidemic, a bishop required that prayers should be said in the ruined and neglected fields on the days leading up to Ascension Day (forty days after Easter). The keeping of Rogation-tide arrived in England in the 8th century and became an annual ritual in which God's help was requested for a fruitful harvest. In Rogation-tide, a party would set out to trace the boundaries of the parish. At the head marched a bishop or priest, with someone bearing a Cross and after them the people of the parish, often with children and their teachers trailing along behind. At certain points along the route, usually at well-known landmarks such as a bridge, stile or ancient tree, the cross and procession was halted, all gathered about the priest, and a rogation prayer was said, imploring God to send them a sufficient harvest, and the ground would be struck with sticks to mark the boundary. In the days when maps were neither common nor accurate, there was much to be said for 'beating the bounds', which instilled the boundaries in people's memories and it was still common practice right up to Victorian times. Today we may not have disputes over our parish boundaries but Rogation is still an opportunity to show our grateful thanks to God for all that he provides for us day-by-day and our prayers will be with our farmers, as they once again seek to provide us all with the food we need.

BENEFICE NEWS

VE Day 70th Anniversary

Friday 8th May 2015 is the anniversary of VE Day (Victory in Europe Day), marking 70 years since the end of the second world war in Europe.

The occasion will be commemorated with events across the UK. A chain of beacons will be lit across the country, Spitfire and Lancaster bomber planes will take to the skies and a star-studded concert will be held in London as part of commemorations to mark the 70th anniversary of Victory in Europe (VE) Day.

VE Day itself will be a day of remembrance. A service of remembrance will be held at The Cenotaph, including a national 2 minute silence at 3pm, marking the moment Winston Churchill broadcast his historic speech formally announcing

the end of the war.

Fincham bells will be rung in honour of the event, with ringing before and after the two minute silence.

Then the lighting of more than 100 beacons, stretching from Newcastle upon Tyne to Cornwall will take place.

The following day, cathedrals across the country will ring bells at 11am in

celebration.

Stars will also perform at a 1940s-themed concert held on Horse Guards Parade in London in the evening, to be shown on the BBC.

On Sunday 10th May, veterans and their families will join members of the Royal Family, politicians, members of the Armed Forces and representatives of Allied nations and Commonwealth countries that fought alongside Britain for a service of thanksgiving at Westminster Abbey.

A parade of bands, veterans and current servicemen and women will then make their way from the Abbey along Whitehall – past the balcony of the Treasury building, where Churchill made his speech – before a reception in St James's Park for 2,000 veterans hosted by the Royal British Legion.

That afternoon there will be a fly-past of current and historic aircraft from the RAF, including Hurricane, Spitfire and Lancaster bomber planes from the Battle of Britain memorial flight. Vehicles dating from the 1940s will also be on display in St James's Park.

Tea Loaf or Tea Cakes



Ingredients:

1lb Be-Ro SR Flour

- 1 teaspoonful Salt
- 2 ozs Lard
- 1 oz Sugar
- 3 ozs Currants
- 1 oz Chopped Peel Half Pint Milk

Method:

- 1. Mix flour and salt in a basin.
- 2. Rub in lard.
- 3. Stir in sugar, currants and peel.
- 4. Make into a dough with the milk.
- 5. Turn onto a floured board and form a round.
- 6. Place in well greased round cake tin (7" diameter, 3" deep).
- 7 Brush over with milk
- 8. Bake in a moderately hot oven (350 375 F or Gas Mark 4 5) for about an hour

To make smaller cakes,

divide mixture into two portions, roll out and place in 2 well greased 7" sandwich tins.

Brush over with milk and bake in a moderately hot oven about 30 minutes.



COUNTRYSIDE NOTES

Now is the time to think about buying tomato plants if you haven't grown them from seed. While there are probably a dozen or so varieties which are easily sourced from garden centres there are actually 7,500 different varieties! Tomatoes originate from the Andes in South America where they grow wild. Being a member of the nightshade family it was thought for centuries that they were poisonous (the leaves are slightly) but it was the Mexicans who first discovered they were edible. It's thought Spanish Conquistadors brought seeds back with them in the 16th century which grew well in the Mediterranean climate. The first cultivated tomatoes were yellow and cherry sized. They've been grown in Britain since the 1590s but because of our lower temperatures their cultivation required specialist care. It was the mid 18th century before they were widely available and Victorian times before they became commonplace. The Latin name for the cultivated tomato translates into 'wolf peach' and at one time the French were convinced they had aphrodisiac properties calling them 'pommes d'amour' – love apples.

Right from the beginning there has been debate as to whether the tomato is a fruit or a vegetable. Whichever it is the tomato must be the most versatile of them all as it can be eaten raw, cooked, as soup, sauces, paste and even drinks.

We generally think of tomatoes as being red but they can also be yellow, orange, pink, purple, green, black, blue, white or even striped. Popular varieties include the trailing 'Tumbling Tom' which can be grown in hanging baskets, the cherry tomato 'Gardener's Delight' and the old standards such as 'Money Maker' and 'Alicante'. There are several different varieties of plum tomatoes and if you want enormous ones weighing up to two pounds choose a beefsteak type.

Blight is a disease to which tomatoes grown outdoors are very prone. In early August 2012 it attacked mine and within a few days had killed off all the plants before I had picked any. Since then I've grown a blight tolerant F1 hybrid named 'Ferline' which has proved prolific and remained healthy. The first year I had some massive tomatoes the largest of which weighed fourteen and a half ounces but were normal last year. This year a new variety 'Crimson Crush' is being marketed which is claimed to be completely blight resistant.

140 million eco-friendly tomatoes are grown annually at Cornerways Nursery which is connected to the beet factory at Wissey. A quarter of a million plants

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GARDENING TIPS

As I write this article on Easter Day, my last comment in April 'beware of frost' comes to mind – something as gardeners, even though we are now entering the merry month of May, we must be aware of. So far 2015 temperatures have been quite erratic. Nothing terribly severe but invariably a cold edge to the wind as there has been of late. Plants that were already starting to break several weeks ago have had their growth checked. Hopefully, by the time this article is published the weather will have a more settled pattern and be considerably warmer.

Whatever the weather work, tempered by conditions, must go on. When we experience unsettled conditions those of us with greenhouses, particularly if they are heated, definitely have an edge on others less fortunate. At least we can, with the aid of a cold frame, try to maintain plant development somewhere near normal. Having written that I have to admit to having a near disaster this year with three of my early varieties. I use my sprayer, under low pressure, to water my seedlings when they are first pricked out rather than using a watering can but I did not clean out my sprayer early in the year as usual. I therefore had to clean it much later and although thoroughly rinsed out as I thought, obviously not adequately - there was obviously a weak residue of the cleansing solution left in the sprayer. A mixture of old age and memory I regret to say! I mention this as a warning to all my readers – you cannot be too careful!

Many of the early narcissi and tulips are now over so do not delay in cutting off the old flower heads. As soon as the old leaves start to die down I always recommend a feed of bone meal in and around the clump of bulbs – watered in if the weather is dry. I always leave my narcissi in the ground but dig out, dry and store tulips. If you leave tulips in the ground they will lose much of their strength and vigour in shedding many small bulblets, which will in turn rob the parent plants of the nourishment available in the soil.

Autumn sown sweet peas will, by now, be well into their main period of growth. As soon as the first buds appear I always start feeding the plants with a liquid, high potash, medium. I have used Phostrogen in the past with good success. Spring sown plants should be ready to plant out into their flowering positions by now. To get the best results do remember to prepare the soil well in advance. Dig well-rotted manure or compost into the ground and finish off with a good dusting of both blood, fish and bone and sulphate of potash forked into the top

are grown there in a glasshouse covering an area of 18 hectares (almost 50 acres). Nearly 250 miles of piping circulates hot water from the factory's combined heat and power plant around the glasshouse. Waste carbon dioxide rather than being released into the atmosphere is also pumped into the glasshouse which the plants absorb. Water for irrigation is collected from the roof of the gigantic structure. Over 8,500 bumble bees living in 170 hives are used to pollinate the crop which is harvested between February and November and packed on site. *Jill Mason*

three or four inches (7 to 10 cm) of soil. Ideally the preparation should be done at least two weeks in advance of planting. Towards the end of the month it will be time to plant out all the summer bedding but please do be sure to harden the plants off properly before so doing. This is particularly important if you are buying your plants from a garden centre or similar as their supply has probably just come out of a very warm greenhouse and will be very 'green' and unable to stand any really inclement weather. Keep them in a well sheltered spot for a few days gradually bringing them more into the open to give them time to acclimatise, watering as necessary.

Again at the end of the month even the most tender plants like cannas, dahlias, runner beans and similar can be planted outside but in this case keep a weather eye open in case of cold conditions in which case it might be advisable to delay planting for a few more days.

To help achieve good quality fruit apply a dusting of sulphate of potash round each bush or tree by the middle of the month, watering it gently into the soil. A similar treatment to perennial flower plants would not go unrewarded – it will really benefit the quality of their flowers.

Regularly mow your lawns, but not too short, and keep those weeds under control. They make any garden look unkempt whilst robbing the plants you so tenderly look after of their water and nutrients. Whatever you do, please get the weeds out before they run to seed. *Roy Coughtrey*

A DOG'S LIFE IN THE COUNTRY.

I should like to respond to April's Countryside Notes.

First, I affirm that I am a supporter of field sports and realise that the gamekeepers have a job to do but the countryside is rapidly becoming a no-go area for those living in it who are not landowners. We are reduced to exercising our dogs and horses along the lanes with the perils of traffic that this entails.

The wild life is at risk all year round from predators, traffic, weather and, in season, the shoots themselves with their guns and dogs. The farms are quite happy to send men on quad bikes roaring around shooting the wild life they choose not to treasure.

The farms are littered with traps and snares which are fairly indiscriminate about what they catch. I was caught in a snare myself when I strayed off a path to get a closer look at a Kingfisher.

Unlike town dwellers, we have no playing fields or recreation grounds, or even pavements where we can safely walk or ride and there are hardly any bridle paths.

I was fortunate to have lived for 10 years in West Acre, where the villagers are encouraged to enjoy the tracks, woods and stubble fields as long as they are responsible about it. Some of our local farmers are kind enough to allow us access to their tracks and fields but, increasingly, most are not. This means that there are few safe routes between the villages.

We need to find a way forward whereby we can all enjoy our beautiful environment. After all, we live in the countryside so that we can be part of it, not relegated to jumping onto the narrow verges with trembling animals to avoid the traffic. **Pauline Stock Eastmoor**

Hello Pauline.

Thanks for your email and I sympathise with your observations. Here in Barton Bendish there are several public footpaths in the vicinity of the village but you are less fortunate in Eastmoor in that it means having to ride or walk along the road to access any in your area. The footpaths and bridleways in our parish are displayed on a board close to the telephone box in Barton.

I think you were particularly lucky while you were at West Acre to have that amount of freedom as there are not many estates that actively encourage as much. For a variety of reasons, most of them well founded, landowners do not

generally welcome open access to their land but there is such a thing as a permissive path, permitted path or concessionary path which is not a public right of way, but a path (which could be for walkers, riders, cyclists, or any combination) whose use is allowed by the landowner, but over which there is no legal right of access. Permissive paths are open for only part of the year.

Maybe if you approached the local landowners you might be able to negotiate something along these lines..

FIND THE "NATIONS' FAVOURITE WILDFLOWER"

As part of celebrations for its 25th anniversary, Plantlife has launched a poll to find the nations' favourite wild flower (also the favourites in England, Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland). Will it be the common poppy, cowslip, more elusive ragged robin or that woodland favourite, the bluebell? Voters have until 5 June to vote online for their favourite and the results will be announced soon after. As the people have their say, they will be able to see what difference it makes to the chart....

"I love this shortlist produced by Plantlife members" says Plantlife expert Dr Trevor Dines. "It's slightly bonkers and in many ways reflects us as a nation. There are country icons we can be proud of, like dog rose for England and wild daffodil for Wales. There are familiar plants we all know and love – bluebell, primrose and foxglove. But then there some real oddities... Who would have thought chickweed-wintergreen, a rare plant of woods in Scotland and northern England, would have made the list? I've only seen it once, although that was enough to confirm its undeniable beauty. On the contrary, cow parsley is seen as road verge weed by some but is clearly loved by many. There are powerful symbols too – we cherish poppies to remember our fallen soldiers – while legend has it that Pasque flowers grow on the graves of Viking warriors, springing up from their blood. It's an eclectic mix; one that perfectly reflects our countryside and our relationship with it."



Boughton Fen Report for Parish Council Meeting 17.04.2015

The work on the fen has now been concluded for both our fiscal and seasonal year.

The most noticeable part of this work was the clearing of trees and scrub, in order to consolidate approximately 200 metres of the raised bank adjacent to Stringside, with the work being funded jointly by the Environment Agency, Natural England and Boughton Fen Committee. Along with the work, we have also been able to construct an outfall to control water levels on the fen, should the bankworks retain too much water.

Further clearance of other areas of scrub has been carried out, to maintain and increase the area of reed.

Our reedcutters, Steven Eyles and Tim Bennett have cut about four and a half acres of reed on Middle Fen, including a specialist habitat cut. The reed has been burned on site by the cutting team and our own volunteers. Small amounts of reed have also been stacked to form micro habitats.

We have had several new volunteers this year, and this has enabled us to carry out some further clearing and tidying up, as well as the construction of a number of new benches around the site. As always, we are grateful for their help.

On behalf of all the committee and those who have been involved over the past few years, a big thank you to Kevin Fisher and Allan Hale who are retiring from the committee. Their help has been invaluable over the years.

A lot of work has been carried out on the fen over the past few years using various contractors and we would like to thank them for their input. They are WR Chapman and son, West Dereham Plant Hire Ltd, Thos B Bonnett, Greenfingers Countryside and SJ & LJ Eyles; all of whom are very local businesses, with Greenfingers being the furthest away, travelling all the way from Hilgay!

We finish the year on a good note with the fen having been upgraded from the fourth to the second level of five by Natural England, a healthy bank balance and plans to take the fen forward with more conservation work in the new financial year.



The session will be facilitated by Gilly, Community Development Manager, for Norfolk County Council's Adult Education Service, who has considerable experience in helping communities set up new and exciting projects. She is very enthusiastic and has lots of fantastic ideas to share. However, we can only make this work if we get sufficient numbers of people involved NOW, at this early stage. Your feedback is vital as this project cannot get off the ground if people don't show their support and interest. The project needs to be tailored to what local residents want, so get your thinking caps on and make a special space in your diary to join us on 25th June.

Suggestions from the door to door village survey highlighted a need for IT and Cookery Skills.

For you, the former might include getting to grips with your laptop, iPad or tablet. Perhaps keeping in touch with friends and relatives using email and Skype? This support is already available at Downham Library, but for those without transport, it is easy to feel left out and isolated.

There are countless cookery programmes on TV, but it's hard to be inspired if you are unfamiliar with techniques or the ingredients, or if you lack the confidence to know where to begin, especially if you are new to cooking. Most

of us lack the wealth of fancy gadgets used in TV cook's kitchens but there are ways of creating the same dishes using everyday equipment, even if it takes a while longer. Maybe you are already motivated to join a Wereham version of the 'Great British Bake Off', but if you are more sceptical, feel your culinary skills need help or stimulation, or just don't know where to begin, we need you with us on 25th June to discuss possibilities.

Ideas for the above might include: -

Cooking on a budget.

Cooking for one.

Replacing ready meals and takeaways with home cooking.

Family Meals.

Cooking for special diets, allergies etc.

Healthy eating.

Using spices.
