## A VIEW FROM A PEW

Dear Friends,

Having made what I think is probably my last 'official' public appearance at the wonderfully joyful Easter Ceremonies I have been given this opportunity to express a view - this time from a different pew! You know, the beautifully constructed, boxed-in, locked-in pews from which it is not easy to escape to share the peace! My pew/view now is the window on to the promising part of the garden which separates the house from the road which runs through rural Eastmoor to rural Barton Bendish, and currently enhanced by a terrific show from the flowering cherry, Snow Showers. If I have over-used the word 'rural', I have done so intentionally because I believe it is over- used or misplaced with regard to the ministry of the Church. Multi-parish ministry is <u>not</u> the same as 'rural' ministry. The former is a strategy or means of administration the latter is the content of that ministry!

As a countryman, I can reflect from my new pew on the meaning and purpose of the traffic which passes the window and the importance of the seasons to those of us who live and work here. Are enough of our daily concerns reflected in our Christian lives and on our intercession lists in Church?

For example; 1. We pray for peace in the Middle East and in particular Syria and for cessation of what seems like indiscriminate killing of men, women and children. Do we or can we relate our prayers to the conveys of tankers and other HGVs which rumble through Eastmoor and Barton Bendish to make a contribution to the extension of RAF Marham; where the world's most sophisticated fighter bomber will be stationed. We, as rurally insignificant as we may feel we are, cannot ignore their presence, and that they will be used!

2. Another issue that has been about for sometime is that of bees and the use of neonicotinoids. Some of our community grow oilseed rape and need a suitable insecticide and some of us grow fruit and need bees for pollination; but of course we all need bees too.

3. The Sugar beet Factory is an important employer in our area and yet every week we are told that we should reduce our intake for the sake of our health! Beet is a useful cash crop - when the price is right.

4. Most of us acknowledge climate change but how can we reduce the use of Diesel engines? Pollution and health?

5. Rogation. The gospels are full of stories of Jesus being out and about in the Countryside with his disciples and there are stories with examples of husbandry too. Rogationtide is an opportunity for us to bring our concern and interests

before God in our fields and gardens and <u>be seen to be doing it.</u> At the heart of this is thanksgiving, care and co-operation; the Church calls it witness, and it can be fun!

6.Animals in Church. Animals are for many of us in the country an integral part of daily lives so that fact should be reflected in our worship. Companionship and service are matters for Thanksgiving and blessing. Animal services are not a gimmick, rather a date in the annual calendar.

7. Health. Our communities are small and with an ageing population thus we make a proportionally heavy call on our medical services; we pray for each other, do we pray for our doctors and pharmacists? A recent book review in The Reader magazine featured a book by Fr. Teilard de Chardin in which he mentioned a prayer of blessing over our medication, now there's a challenge!

8. Wildlife. My neighbour and I were rejoicing together about the re-emergence of a pair of song thrushes who share our gardens, not seen for a few years - neither of us uses slug/snail pellets now! Together with the Buzzard saga here is a rural issue for our concern and prayers.

We are still in the Easter season when we pray for the coming of the Kingdom of God in the light of the Resurrection. All these issues, and you will have your own, are relevant as we relate our own Rural ministry in our parishes to the Archbishops' 'Kingdom Come' call to prayer.





# YOGURT-MARMALADE CAKE

This was served at the film 'Paddington 2' which was shown by the Barton Bendish Film Club on April 14th. Many thanks to Elizabeth Perry.– there may be some Americanisms.

#### Ingredients:

1 1/2 Cup All-purpose Flour
1/2 teaspoon Salt
2 teaspoons Baking Powder
1 Cup (heaping) Plan, lowfat Yogurt
1 Cup Sugar
3 Whole Eggs
1 teaspoon Vanilla
1 whole Zest of Lemon
1/2 Cup Veg. Oil

#### Orange Glaze:

1/2 Cup Orange Marmalade 1/4 Cup Yogurt

#### Preparation:

Preheat oven to 350 degrees Fahrenheit (I baked in my fan oven @ 165 Celsius)

Spray a loaf pan with non-stick baking spray (or grease and flour it) Sift together the flour, baking powder and salt. Set aside.

In a separate bowl, mix together 1 Cup of yogurt, sugar, eggs, vanilla lemon zest and vegetable oil until just combined. Pour over dry ingredients and mix until just combined; do not over beat! and do not panic, Yes there will be a few lumps.

Pour into a loaf pan and bake for 45 min. ( I baked mine for nearly 55min. and after about 30 min. covered the top with aluminum foil to prevent the cake from browning too much.) Remove from oven and allow to cool slightly. Remove from pan. While cake is cooling, pour marmalade into a sauce pan. Heat it on low until melted, stirring occasionally. Add 1/4 cup of yogurt to the pan and turn off heat. Stir to combine, then pour slowly over the top of the cake, allowing icing to pool around the sides (here, I poked the top of the cake with a long wooden

## WEST NORFOLK RIDING FOR THE DISABLED SIGNS UP FOR "WEST NORFOLK WINS"

Big news from the Magpie Centre, home of West Norfolk Riding for the Disabled, is that we have signed up as one of the first beneficiaries of the newly-launched West Norfolk Wins lottery.

West Norfolk Wins (WNW), is the Borough Council of King's Lynn and West Norfolk's way of benefiting all West Norfolk charities. A launch presentation took place at King's Lynn Town Hall on March 20, at which Elizabeth Nockolds, Deputy Leader of BCKLWN introduced the scheme to representatives of more than 40 charities, including West Norfolk RDA.

The lottery will benefit good causes based in West Norfolk, with 60p from every £1 ticket sold going to charities, voluntary organisations and other good causes, as compared with 28p for the National Lottery Players of WNW can win £25,000 per month, plus smaller prizes. At the time of writing, tickets were scheduled to go on sale from April 17, with the first draw planned for May 26.

To play, just go online and visit: <u>www.westnorfolkwins.co.uk</u> or call 01553 341414, which is the Council's WNW department. Then choose your beneficiary: we suggest West Norfolk Riding for the Disabled. Well, we would, wouldn't we?

Payment can be by Direct Debit or card payment for one, three or six months at a time. For your security, Gatherwell, which runs the lottery, does not store bank details. All payments are securely audited, using SafePay. No paper tickets are issued, but players receive an email, confirming their numbers, or a letter, if they are not online.

Once the lottery is up and running, WNRDA will have a page, whose dashboard will keep supporters updated with how their cash is supporting us.Make no mistake, the more supporters WNRDA can rely on, the better we can project our income, and so plan for a really bright future.

#### Free home assessments on offer

Older, disabled or vulnerable residents of West Norfolk are being encouraged to book an appointment for a free home assessment from Careline Community Services.

The assessments, which are carried out by a team of qualified staff, will help residents, who may be living with a disability or dementia, or who are simply older and less mobile, to identify concerns in their property which may be affecting their day-to-day life.

The assessor, trained by the Disabled Living Foundation, will inspect the home to see whether measures could be introduced that would reduce the possibility of slips, trips and falls and generally make it easier for people to live safely and independently in their own homes.

Measures that could be considered include installation of a Careline personal alarm, improved lighting arrangements, heating checks, draught proofing, smoke detectors and easy-to-use taps along with recommendations for other adaptations that may reduce any potential risk to the resident. Practical solutions for those living with dementia are also available, this includes signage or colour differentiation for those who suffer with memory loss and are visually impaired.




#### COUNTRYSIDE NOTES LITTER MAY 2018

An Eastmoor resident contacted Barton Bendish Parish Council recently because she is appalled by the amount of litter that has accumulated along the roadsides. I think everybody is. But what can be done about it? I'm very much afraid that the answer is that we pick it up ourselves. Sadly there is no way we can prevent that certain mentality of people from winding down their car window and lobbing it out. In my opinion the situation is going to get even worse now Norfolk County Council have introduced charges for disposing of DIY waste at their tips. Previously this had been limited, but at least was free. Now, measured by the 80 litre bag full (largest sized compost bag,) the tip at Crimplesham will continue to take rubble and wood but now charge £3 per bag and £5 for nonrecyclable waste. They won't take flat glass, plaster board or tyres, (these can be disposed of at the King's Lynn site for a charge of £5, £9 and £4 each respectively). How naïve is it to think that everyone will be willing to hand over their hard earned cash? What will they do instead? They'll tip it out on the verge or in a layby somewhere. It's estimated the authority will save £280,000. They might as on past form not a lot has been spent on removing either litter or fly tipped items. I am disgusted at the number of old household appliances which are accumulating between the slip road exiting Swaffham by pass and the boundary fence of the Breckland District Council run Splashes travellers site. With their efforts to promote Swaffham as a tourist attraction surely it would be in the local council's interest to keep this particular stretch of road verge looking good. After all they are responsible for managing the site and are hardly setting a good example by turning a blind eye to this shameful situation. If you, or I, dumped an old fridge by the roadside outside our property we'd very soon be receiving a letter from the local council. By the way it's worth knowing that Frimstone Ltd, (near Crimplesham tip) will take bricks, slabs, stone, concrete and soil and charities such as Sue Ryder, Age UK, the Red Cross and British Heart Foundation will collect unwanted saleable furniture and electrical items for Then there is Michael Gove's proposed charge of up to 22p on every single-use plastic or glass bottle and aluminium or steel can! I religiously recycle everything that's acceptable so will that mean I've got to cart bottles and cans back to where I shop to get a refund? Either that or I'll be out of pocket if I put them in the recycling bin. Have we got to pay the price for other people's irresponsible b h а ? v o 11

#### Swaffham Museum 2018

Although our doors did not open to the public until February 12, we had a flurry of interest in late January following the broadcasting of an episode of **Antiques Road Trip** which featured Swaffham Museum. Raj Bisram came to explore the connection between Swaffham and Howard Carter who discovered the tomb of Tutankhamun in 1922. This episode is available to view on YouTube. We have one large room dedicated to Egyptology and Howard Carter.

One of our new displays 'From Beginning to End' is also very exciting as we



celebrate the Swaffham Railway. This opened in 1847 and closed under the Beeching cuts in 1968. Some of you may remember catching the train to the coast for a day out, or using it to travel to work or school. Whatever your memories, you will enjoy our displays of photographs and memorabilia, and the model rolling stock.

We have also delved into our store rooms and have a room

of art work. All are by local artists and include a number by Ben Ripper. There is also a digital display of some of the museum's photographs of old(er) Swaffham.

**Also new to the museum** this year is the 16<sup>th</sup> century Communion Chalice, with its 19<sup>th</sup> century paten, from the ancient church at Houghton-on-the-Hill near North Pickenham. The church itself has a latest date of 1090 and its remarkable wall paintings system of the same date is world renowned.

The Houghton display includes a Roman ring found in the hedgerow by the church and a mourning ring to Robert Say. Reverend Say was vicar at Swaffham and then Rector at Houghton-on-the-Hill in the 18<sup>th</sup> century. The ring was found on Campingland and subsequently sold on Ebay. Luck, or otherwise, brought it back home. The museum tells the story.

There are children's activities, take home information sheets and family museum trails as well as a Museum Shop which also houses the Tourist Information Centre. Opening times are Monday to Friday 10am to 4pm and Saturdays 10am to 1pm.

# Ascension Day is on May 10<sup>th</sup>

What does Ascension Day mean? Ascension Day is the fortieth day of Easter. It occurs thirty-nine days after Easter Sunday. It is a Christian holiday that commemorates Jesus Christ's ascension into heaven according to Christian belief.

What Do People Do? Some Christians in the United Kingdom attend church services on Ascension Day to celebrate this event. Communion, also known as Eucharist, may also be offered to the congregation. (There will be a service at Boughton at 10 am.)Ascension Day marks the end of *Rogationtide*, which is a time when people pray for blessings to occur.

#### Background

Ascension Day is one of the earliest Christian festivals dating back to the year 68 CE. According to the New Testament in the Bible, Jesus Christ met several times with his disciples during the 40 days after his resurrection to instruct them on how to carry out his teachings. It is believed that on the 40th day he took them to the Mount of Olives, where they watched as he ascended to heaven.

Ascension Day marks the end of the Easter season and occurs ten days before Pentecost.

**Pentecost is one of the most significant dates of the Christian calendar,** although it may not be as widely known or celebrated as Christmas and Easter. The festival, which this year falls on 20<sup>th</sup> May, commemorates the coming of the Holy Spirit to the disciples following the death of Jesus Christ.

The biblical account describes how the apostles, who were gathered to celebrate the Jewish harvest festival of Shavuot, began to talk in foreign tongues, leading the massed onlookers to assume that they were drunk. However, Saint Peter explained that the disciples were inspired by the Holy Spirit and preached the first Christian sermon, prompting the conversion and baptism of 3,000 people.

This first Pentecost marked the beginning of the Christian church as an official, meaningful movement, so the celebration is widely considered the birthday of Christianity.

#### Why is the festival called Pentecost? When is it celebrated?

The festival's name comes from the Greek word 'Pentekostos', meaning '50'. It is celebrated on the seventh Sunday after Easter, marking 50 days since the final Sabbath of Passover, and so falls on a different date each year.


#### Why is it also known as Whitsun?

While 'Pentecost' is more widely used in the UK, traditionally the church has referred to the celebration as 'Whitsun', or 'Whit Sunday'. It is believed that the name comes from Pentecost being a day for baptisms, when participants would dress in white. 'Whitsun' is also thought to derive from the Anglo-Saxon word 'wit', meaning 'understanding', to celebrate the disciples being filled with the wisdom of the Holy Spirit.

#### How is it celebrated?

Between 1871 and 1978 the festival was marked by a UK bank holiday on Whit Monday, the day after Whit Sunday, before it was replaced by the current Spring Bank Holiday on the last Monday of May. However, Pentecost Monday is still a public holiday in many European countries, such as France, Germany and Belgium.

Within Christianity the day is still popular for baptisms, while some churches hold Whit Walks. Folk traditions such as cheese rolling and morris dancing also have long-standing associations with Whit Sunday.

#### <u>Barton Bendish Ordinary Parish Council Meeting held on 14<sup>th</sup></u> <u>March 2018</u>

Cllr Chapman was in the Chair, six Parish Councillors along with five parishioners, were in attendance.

Restoration work on the old map of the village had now been completed by Norfolk Records Office. A digital copy of the restored map had been provided to the Parish Council and this was passed to Councillors.

The Parish Council was disappointed to hear of damage on Hatherley Gardens which had been caused by a contractor for Anglian Water. It was agreed that an official complaint would be made from the Parish Council to Anglian Water and copied to Elizabeth Truss MP, Borough Councillor Sandra Squire and County Councillor Brian Long.

The Parish Council agreed to raise again with Norfolk County Council Highways the issue of a 30mph speed limit on Boughton Long Road.

First World War Centenary Commemorations:

The Parish Council was pleased to contribute to a village community project to plant poppies and wild flowers on Buttlands Lane and over the wall on either side of the War Memorial in the churchyard. A grant application had also been submitted by the Parish Council to assist with the cost of producing the planned book.

GOOD NEWS! As planned the Public Access Defibrillator has been fitted to the External Wall of the Village Hall. It is near the front entrance for all to see when you next drive carefully through the village.

This appliance has been registered with the Ambulance Service and First Responder, access to the number-locked PAD can only be gained once they have been called as they have the number to open it. IF you ever think the PAD is needed call them FIRST and explain the situation and visible symptoms of the person you are concerned about. They will talk you through the procedure, so you are not alone if it is needed, until the required

medical professional person arrives.

We must include our thanks to Breckland Council for the match funding of this appliance and of course our thanks to the Village Hall Committee for making a good viable space available to place it and agreeing to meet the annual running costs for the electricity to keep the PAD ready for use at a moments notice.

70 years a Church Organist... Where has it gone?

It all started unplanned and unexpectedly. In 1947 I was at home in Barton Bendish awaiting the results of my School Certificate Examinations. One day, while alone in the house, I was playing the piano when Miss Bessie Rumball (Sunday School teacher) called to see my mother. She expressed surprise because she did not know I played the piano.

Two weeks before Easter the Reverend Pallister, Rector at that time, came along and said he wanted me to play for an Easter Sunday Family Service, <u>but</u> on that lovely pipe organ in St Andrew's – Barton Bendish.

Easter Sunday, March 1948, was that first Service. It was a very warm sunny day and, with several butterflies in my tummy, I climbed to the organ. After that I was hooked, thrilled by the wonderful sounds those pipes produced.

Then followed three happy years of organ lessons with Mr Frederic Bone, organist of Sandringham, in Sandringham Church.

I then started to help by playing for Services at Beachamwell. Firstly on a small harmonium which eventually broke down and was replaced in the 1980's by the electric organ we are using now while the pipe organ is repaired. Again so many happy memories and friends through the years have given nothing but pleasure.

I have a lifelong love of music, especially rich organ music. One of my treasured possessions is a medal presented to me in June 2010 In Ely Cathedral "for over 60 years of parish music".

It has been an honour and a privilege to serve our Lord and the community; my reward is the great pleasure it has given me. If I have given pleasure along the way to some people, that is an added bonus.

The service starts with the church quiet and three fairly long readings, describing the events leading up to Easter. Then the church is plunged into darkness, while the congregation goes outside to witness the lighting of the Easter candle from the fire ably prepared by Frank. In the darkness we were trying to change the sombre Lent colours into celebratory white for Easter, to bring up the candles and flowers – not the safest activity in long robes. We were not quite ready when the candle was borne in with William

Burke singing the celebratory words. The service continued with bells, singing and every sign of joy. Thanks to Ken Waters for taking a service which was unfamiliar to him but dear to everyone else and to William for taking part. It was a great way to celebrate the first Communion of Easter.

The Annual Parish Church meeting was held on Monday April 9<sup>th</sup>. Pam Wakeling was re-elected as Churchwarden and the other members of the PCC were reelected. The churchwarden's report noted all the main events since the last APCM, including the replacement of guttering on the north side and the repair of the lightning conductor. Thanks were given to all those who help keep the church going: Paul Coulten as Treasurer, Angela and Andrew Faherty for all that they do, Frank and Sandy Reid for running Breakfast Church and Pippa Blackall for taking the service every month.

#### Two major fund raising events:

Wednesday May  $16^{\text{m}}$  - a talk about Oxburgh Hall to be given by Roger Farmer. This will be £3 per head, and well worth attending. Roger is one of the conservation volunteers at the Hall and has a wealth of knowledge about it, well illustrated and very interesting. He has given this talk several times and I hope it will be well attended. I've heard it twice already and it was fascinating on both occasions.

**Sunday June 10<sup>th</sup> – OPEN GARDENS Day.** Several gardens already offered for us, but more would always be welcome. If you haven't opened before, and feel a bit nervous, talk to someone who has. It's great fun and visitors come from far and wide to enjoy our gardens and the refreshments on offer. I know the weather has been bad, and everyone will say they can't get it ready, but the garden doesn't have to be perfect. There are a range of sizes, styles and degrees of perfection and the visitors love them all. If you have spare plants or garden related articles, they would be gratefully received for sale. It's the church's biggest fundraiser of the year and a way for many people in the village to come together – can you make a cake for the teas?

#### **Buzzard fatalities**

The police responded quickly to the finding of two dead buzzards in Boughton last month, by having the birds Xrayed. No shot was found, and if a rifle had been used there would have been visible damage.: It was suggested that the birds had eaten poisoned rats, but I believe that buzzards are hunter killers after

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young pheasants and vermin, and are not scavengers, though it is of course possible that poisoned rats struggle about on the surface before d y i n g.

However PC Ben Clark from Downham, the wildlife officer dealing, now tells me Natural England have become concerned at the loss of such birds (not just here) and will be examining the birds with a toxicology report. This will take several weeks, but hopefully we will learn exactly the cause of death. Something is contributing to the loss of these birds.

Talking to the police it emerged that they are in a joint initiative with local landowner to prevent hare coursing. Hence all these gates and excavated field entrances. Personally I am distressed that we locals are being barred from walking (and riding) field tracks that we have used for years, but reference to some old maps regarding rights of way bring some redress.

We will also be installing some barley straw soon to help reduce the nitrate levels. To buy new plants would cost the village hundreds of pounds which would be added to all our council tax bills. So why not donate some from your garden like our Chair has done? –

Obviously if you think your pond is polluted or has a disease please don't donate as this will create problems instead of helping. Our village handyman carried out the work above (paid for privately by the chair). The issue of dog fouling was discussed by the Parish Council at their March meeting and information can be found in the minutes on the website. We will all agree that this is just not acceptable for dog owners to not collect and dispose of their dog's mess, and it has been going on for far too long all over the village where this has not happened.
