# **RECIPE PAGE**

## TREATS FOR YOUR DOG......

### **Banana Chips**

12oz (350 g) whole wheat flour 3 fl oz (100 ml) skimmed milk

1 egg

- 1 pureed banana
- 1 tbsp. golden syrup



- Preheat the oven to 300F or 150C
- Mix all the ingredients into a dough
- Roll out the dough to 1/2 inch (1 cm) thickness and cut into small cubes
- Place the cubes onto a prepared baking sheet
- Bake for about 30 minutes

### **Vegetable Crackers**

- 1 courgette
- 1 carrot
- 2 eggs
- 1 tbsp. sunflower oil

5oz (150g) whole wheat flower

- 1 2 tbsp. milk
- Preheat the oven to 345F or 175C
- . Grate the courgette and carrot very finely
- Mix with the eggs and sunflower oil
- Knead in the flour
- . Add enough milk to make an easy to shape dough
- Using a teaspoon, form the dough into little balls and place on a prepared baking sheet
- Bake for 20 25 minutes.
- . Turn off heat and allow crackers to dry in the oven

## **COUNTRYSIDE NOTES**

Wherever there are rocky rivers in Britain wild salmon might possibly be found but it is Scotland that is most famed for its salmon fishing. Eating the 'king of fish' was the prerogative of the rich until the early 1970s when rearing salmon in captivity became feasible. There are now 250 fish farms round the west coast of Scotland and the Western Isles annually producing around 177,000 tonnes of salmon of which 60% is eaten by British consumers. It is an expanding industry and salmon is Scotland's single biggest food export worth £660million and providing work for 1,500 people.

Farmed salmon are reared until they are two to three years old in large cages sited in sheltered sea lochs. Environmentalists are concerned this is having an adverse effect on our declining wild salmon population which need to pass through these lochs to reach the rivers in which they spawn. Intensively farmed captive salmon pose a number of serious health risks to migrating salmon. They are often infected with large numbers of parasitic lice. Harmful chemicals are frequently used to remove these although keeping small fish that feed on sea lice within the cages or bathing the salmon in warm water to remove the pests are alternative treatments. Further threats are pollution from the excrement of caged salmon and the fact that many escape, an estimated 300,000 in 2016, which interbreed with wild salmon the progeny of which do not possess the natural instincts needed to survive.

The whole life cycle of wild salmon is incredible. A hen fish has the ability to lay 5,000 eggs which are immediately fertilised by the male. These hatch in early spring and the miniscule creatures are known as *alevins*. As they begin to develop they become fry and at two to four years old are known as parr. At this stage, in late spring or autumn, they head out to sea and are called *smolts*. After spending at least one year as grilse out in the Atlantic, the few that have survived return to breed in the same river in which they hatched. After spawning both the males and females (kelts) are exhausted and most die. The Latin name for salmon is 'salmo salar' which translated means salmon the leaper. They have the miraculous ability to return to the same shallow, gravel-bottomed area of the river, several miles from the sea, where they hatched and which they identify by sense of smell. These are in fast flowing rocky rivers and the salmon's tenacity in negotiating obstacles, sometimes leaping more than 10ft up steep, rocky inclines, is nothing short of amazing. They need to wait for sufficient water in the river before they can do this; heavy rain after a dry spell stimulates them into action. Autumn is generally the best time to see them leaping. Because stocks of wild salmon are in decline salmon fisheries now have a catch and release policy.

For true sportsmen the pleasure is in the catching of a salmon not in the eating! *Jill Mason*

#### FREE HOME ASSESSMENTS ON OFFER

Older, disabled or vulnerable residents of West Norfolk are being encouraged to book an appointment for a free home assessment from Careline Community Services.

The assessments, which are carried out by a team of qualified staff, will help residents, who may be living with a disability or dementia, or who are simply older and less mobile, to identify concerns in their property which may be affecting their day-to-day life. The assessor, trained by the Disabled Living Foundation, will inspect the home to see whether measures could be introduced that would reduce the possibility of slips, trips and falls and generally make it easier for people to live safely and independently in their own homes. Measures that could be considered include installation of a Careline personal alarm, improved lighting arrangements, heating checks, draught proofing, smoke detectors and easy-to-use taps along with recommendations for other adaptations that may reduce any potential risk to the resident. Practical solutions for those living with dementia are also available, this includes signage or colour differentiation for those who suffer with memory loss and are visually impaired.

The assessors will also be able to advise whether any grant funding is available for any works required.

## COULD YOU HELP A YOUNG PERSON WITH A DISABILITY TO THINK ABOUT THEIR FUTURE?

The CSV Futures Project supports young people with learning disabilities to explore their options as they think about leaving education.

Volunteer Mentors provide one to one support to a young person to help them develop a personal profile of their skills and interests, their likes and dislikes and their future goals. The Mentor can then support the young person to start working towards these; this can include accessing work experience and training opportunities plus the chance to try out volunteering and new social activities.

CSV needs volunteers who can offer a couple of hours of their time each week to mentor the young people as they make choices about their futures, raising aspirations by exploring together the young person's skills, interests and abilities.

We are looking for people ages 16+ - Mentors can come from all walks of life and no experience is needed but patience, the ability to listen and a sense of humour are all useful skills. Mentors receive full training and support and out of pocket expenses are paid.

Not that he had a passion for law enforcement it was just that he always knew what was going on, and who was about, in the village. If any of us wanted to know anything we asked Bill. He also had a heart of gold and was always there for us. If anyone was in a fix it was him we first went to. However, you could never have a quick conversation with Bill, but that was part of what made him the character he was.

It was so sad to watch his health rapidly deteriorate over the last few months and we all admired Maureen's dedication to caring for him. With him being so independent by nature this could not have been an easy task. Bill's last few days were spent in the tender care of Tapping House Hospice to which donations, exceeding £860, made in memory of him have been sent.

Bill, we all miss you and thanks for everything.

On Saturday, 8<sup>th</sup> August, the Norfolk Historic Churches Trust bike ride took place and it was good to see some cyclists visit St. Mary's despite the wind and rain which only eased a little in the afternoon. The money raised in sponsorship is used to provide grants to maintain Norfolk's many historic churches. Over the past thirty years or so, the annual bike ride has raised almost three million pounds for churches throughout the county. With the drastic decline in congregations, the money raised has become increasingly important to preserve the ever decaying fabric of ancient buildings. Those of us who live

in Norfolk tend to forget that the county has the largest collection of medieval churches in the world. These buildings are not only works of art in themselves but they contain unique works of art works of art within, such as painted screens, frescoes, statues, intricately carved woodwork, irreplaceable organs and sonorous bells. Medieval artists believed that it was only by witnessing beauty that humans could form some conception of the beauty of the Creator and that is why they strove to create beautiful works of art. In the words of one of the greatest artists, Michelangelo: *Every beauty which is seen by persons of perception resembles more than anything else that celestial source from which we all come*. Michelangelo saw himself not so much as a creator as someone

Wereham Cemetery Memorial Safety - The Parish Council are trying to trace relatives or those responsible for memorials. The Wereham Parish Council have recently reviewed its responsibilities for health and safety within the Wereham Cemetery and commissioned a report with a registered gualified inspector of all memorials. The inspector advised the Parish Council of 17 memorials in the cemetery that they classify as 'dangerous' to public safety and therefore in order to remedy they recommend fitting what is called a 'naam bar' for the current memorial to remain in use, these 17 are memorials that we would like to hear from people about. Please contact the Clerk if you are responsible for a memorial in the cemetery. These memorials have now been laid down by the Parish Council as agreed at their meeting in July 2018 in line with their health and safety responsibilities because no contact had been received. All of the memorials effected can be reinstated by the owners as long as within safety guidelines. The Parish Council recommends that purchasing records are checked for any guarantee of workmanship which it may be possible to claim from. The inspecting company is able to provide costs of fitting a 'naam' bar. If you are the person responsible, relative or have knowledge of contact, a response would really be appreciated, as you will have realised, this is a health and safety issue which the Parish Council are obliged to resolve as soon as possible.

**New Dog Waste Bins** – Two new dog bins have now been installed in the village by the Wereham Parish Council. The new places are at the junction of Back Lane/Church Road and at the junction of Wretton Row and The Row. There are three others are located at the end of Lamas Lane (Flegg Green end); along Cavenham Road towards the public footpath (field end); and on the playing field near the village hall entrance.

These dog bins have been purchased using precept funds, and the costs of emptying them is also paid for in the same way. Please could we all be encouraged to use these bins and keep our village a pleasant place to live.
