The Diocese of Ely was extremely saddened to hear yesterday (4th September 2019) about the devastating fire at St Mary's Church, Wimbotsham.

The Ven Hugh McCurdy, Archdeacon of Huntingdon and Wisbech, immediately travelled to the scene to offer his support to the local community.

Hugh said of what he saw;:

"The community is obviously devastated by the damage caused to the ancient and beautiful St Mary's Church.

We must now await the outcome of the structural report, and while some church treasures were saved, we know the Holy table dating from 1638 has been destroyed. As we move forward from the day's sad events, we will be working very closely the

whole community about what we now need to do following this devastating fire. We are also so grateful to the brave fire crews from the Norfolk Fire and Rescue Service who tackled the blaze and give our thanks that no-one was hurt in the fire".

Hugh went on to say: "You can read the history of the village in the church building and it's a centre for celebrating significant life moments. There are lots of strong members in the church building and they feel very connected even if they are not there Sunday by Sunday. It's a symbol of hope and a symbol in the Christian community that God is present."

Hugh spoke to the Bishop of Ely, The Rt Revd Stephen Conway who was said to be very distressed to hear [that] one of the churches is so badly damaged and [that] his thoughts and prayers are with the community.



STICKY GINGER CAKE

Ingredients

25 g crystalised ginger

70g prunes

180g golden syrup

50g black treacle

150g dark brown sugar

150g unsalted butter

8g ground ginger

2g mixed spice

2 medium eggs

2 tbl spoons milk

120g self raising flour

Method

Pre heat oven to 160C/Fan 140C /Gas mark 3

Grease and line 18cm cake tin

Finely chop ginger and set aside

Finely chop or blitz prunes. Put in large pan with golden syrup, treacle and butter.

Heat gently stirring together until evenly combined

Remove from heat and add ginger and mixed spice

Lightly beat eggs and milk together add to mixture stirring to a smooth batter

Fold in the flour completely then transfer to baking tin

Bake for 1 hour until springy to touch

Leave in tin until cold.

The West Norfolk Aviation Society



At our September meeting in the Mundford Bowls Club, Steve, a WNAS member and pilot, gave a flying start to our autumn programme of presentations & activities with his account of post WWII British test and research aircraft. A Lancaster powered by two jet engines and two RR Merlins, the Short SB5, the RR Flying Bedstead and the Fairey Delta are just four of the many aircraft that some of us did not know about or had forgotten until Steve's lecturette. And that was just the first half of the evening!

After the break, Steve showed and discussed some rare footage of the development of spy aeroplanes, including the Canberra and the U2. Thanks, Steve, you are already booked for next year!

Although September's meeting was a hard act to follow, another of our members, Bob, will rise to the challenge with a talk called: With my Head in the Clouds or some such. As a former Canberra pilot, we expect the evening to be both informative and entertaining. So, if you would like to join us on October 1st for a couple of hours, come to the Bowls Club just after 7pm. There is no charge for a first visit.

October.....

4th October 1911 Britain's first escalator opens at London's Earls Court. There were in fact two escalators — both supplied by the Otis Elevator Company — and linked the Piccadilly Line platforms with the subway that runs under the subsurface lines (District/Circle). One escalator could only carry passengers upstairs, while the second model which normally took passengers down, could be reversed to upwards if the other unit was out of action.

5th October 1930 The British airship R101 crashes near Beauvais, France killing 48 people. The impact was gentle and survivable but the ship was inflated with hydrogen, and the resulting fire incinerated 46 of the passengers and crew. Two additional crew members died of their injuries soon after.

7th October 1920 Women become eligible for admission as full members of Oxford University and are given the right to take degrees.

8th October 1967 Clement (Richard) Atlee dies. British Labour politician. As Prime Minister 1945-51 introduced radical reform of the social welfare system and introduced the N.H.S.

9th October 1967 Transport Minister, Barbara Castle, introduces the breathalyser. The breathalyser offered a way of testing a person's BAC (blood alcohol concentration) level at the roadside

12th October 1984 An IRA terrorist bomb kills 4 people at the Grand Hotel, Brighton, Sussex. The Brighton hotel bombing was a Provisional Irish Republican Army (IRA) assassination attempt against the top tier of the British government that occurred on 12 October 1984 at the Grand Brighton Hotel in Brighton, England. A long-delay time bomb was planted in the hotel by IRA member Patrick Magee, with the purpose of killing Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher and her cabinet, who were staying at the hotel for the Conservative Party conference.[3] Although Thatcher narrowly escaped the

blast, five people connected with the Conservative Party were killed, including a sitting Conservative MP, and 31

were injured.

22nd October 1957 The children's cartoon hero Captain Pugwash makes his television debut. Captain Pugwash a fictional pirate in a series of British children's comic strips and books created by John Ryan. The character's adventures were adapted into a TV series, using

31st October 1517 Martin Luther nails his '95 Theses' to the church door at Wittenberg, Germany triggering the Protestant Reformation. His "95 Theses," which propounded two central beliefs—that the Bible is the central religious authority and that humans may reach salvation only by their faith and not by their deeds—was to spark the Protestant Reformation. He was attempting to get the Roman Catholic Church to stop selling indulgences, or 'get out of hell free' cards. Luther did not think the Church had the authority to grant such indulgences, especially not for money

Bellringing.....

Change ringing is a style of church bell ringing started in England around the end of the sixteenth century. Because of constraints imposed by the physics of swinging bells, tunes are not played. Instead, the bells are rung in ever changing patterns to a steady rhythm.

Change ringing, while an obscure art, remains as widely practiced today as at any time in the past, and continues to evolve. The largest concentration of interest remains in England, which is home to over 95% of the world's bells hung for change ringing, with many of the remainder in other parts of the UK. However, there are small pockets in other parts of the world, mostly former British colonies, including Australia, Canada, Ireland, New Zealand, South Africa, the United States, and Zimbabwe. The past few decades have seen an increase in interest outside the UK, with the number of towers outside it roughly doubling since about 1960.

Free home assessments on offer

Older, disabled or vulnerable residents of West Norfolk are being encouraged to book an appointment for a free home assessment from Careline Community Services.

The assessments, which are carried out by a team of qualified staff, will help residents, who may be living with a disability or dementia, or who are simply older and less mobile, to identify concerns in their property which may be affecting their day-to-day life.

The assessor, trained by the Disabled Living Foundation, will inspect the home to see whether measures could be introduced that would reduce the possibility of slips, trips and falls and generally make it easier for people to live safely and independently in their own homes.

Measures that could be considered include installation of a Careline personal alarm, improved lighting arrangements, heating checks, draught proofing, smoke detectors and easy-to-use taps along with recommendations for other adaptations that may reduce any potential risk to the resident. Practical solutions for those living with dementia are also available, this includes signage or colour differentiation for those who suffer with memory loss and are visually impaired.

The northern white rhino is a subspecies of white rhino, which used to range



over parts of Uganda, Chad, Sudan, the Central African Republic and the Democratic Republic of the Congo. Years of widespread poaching and civil war in their home range have devastated northern white rhino populations and they are now considered to be extinct in the wild. Only two remain, both on OI Pejeta Conservancy, Kenya.

White rhinos have few predators in the wild; their main predator is humans with rhino horn being exported to the Far East where rhino horn is worth an estimated \$65,000 per kg on

the Asian black market. It is used in Traditional Chinese Medicine and is a symbol which is used to display success and wealth.

Neil and I were privileged to visit the two remaining northern white rhinos, at Ol Pejeta Conservancy, whilst on safari in Kenya this summer. Not only is Ol Pejeta home to two of the world's last remaining northern white rhinos, it is also a sanctuary for over 110 critically endangered black rhinos. We learnt of Ol Pejeta's plans to harvest the eggs of the last remaining fertile northern white rhino and have them inseminated with frozen sperm from the deceased males. This in vitro fertilisation technique and stem cell technology has never before been attempted in rhinos...

SCIENTISTS FERTILIZE EGGS FROM THE LAST TWO NORTHERN WHITE RHINOS

On 25° August, scientists in Italy were able to fertilize seven of the 10 oocytes, or eggs, which had been extracted from the two northern white rhinos the previous week.

"That outcome was better than expected", said Cesare Galli, the managing director of Avantea, the laboratory in Italy. "Now the injected oocytes are incubated and we need to wait to see if any viable embryo develops to the stage where it can be cryopreserved for later transfer."

The results of possible embryo development are to be announced around September 10th.



Village Hall Update

It has been a long haul but we now know that we have achieved a Lottery Community Fund Grant of £50,636. This is a staggering amount to receive in these financially straightened times and we are very grateful for it. We are very fortunate to have Chris Parsons on the case. Hours of hard work, and his considerable expertise, played a huge part in achieving this breakthrough grant. I say breakthrough, because, together with the £1,000 given to us by Tesco, we now have a total of £104,000, which means we have achieved 38% of the money needed to achieve all the improvements we have envisaged. We expect news about our application for VAT exemption soon and that too will have a huge bearing on how much of the work we will be able to do. What we do know is that it can start and that some of the planned improvements will now definitely happen. If we are successful with other grant bids now open to us, we might be able to do everything we've planned for. We will see.

We are lucky that our community is so united, not like the one at Winterton on Sea, where the Parish Council had to cancel a garage sale. The Village Hall Committee had organised their own! This followed their resignations 'en masse' due to "tensions with the PC"! Ego should have nothing to do with it. The community comes first.

COUNTRYSIDE NOTES CHANGING THE CLOCKS

On October 27th at 2am we have to put our clocks back an hour. News programmes for the rest of the day will be telling us that we'll now be having an hour less daylight. No we won't, it will merely be getting dark an hour earlier in the evening by the clock and light an hour earlier in the morning. The number of daylight hours doesn't alter; they are determined by the tilt of the Earth's axis. The shortest day in Britain is December 22nd, in New Zealand it's June 22nd. Changing the clock is a contentious issue and, as always, there will be a debate on whether it comprises the safety of schoolchildren. The fact is in mid-winter, one way or other; they would either be going to, or coming home, from school in the dark. In winter the hours livestock farmers work, because of the nature of their job, are ruled by the hours of daylight, not the clock. For example, because of the risk of mass slaughter by foxes, free range hens need to be shut in at night. You can't drive chicken and they don't voluntarily go to bed until its getting dark, that is 10 o'clock in mid-summer and 3.30pm in winter. It's also difficult to check the welfare of stock kept outdoors in the dark.

GMT (Greenwich Mean Time) is what we have in winter and BST (British Summer Time) is what we have in summer. This was introduced in 1916 to save energy and resources. Over the years there have been a few variations. During WW11 double summertime was adopted between 1941 and 1945 and Harold Wilson's government trialled not changing the clocks. They were put forward in March 1968 and remained at GMT+1 until October 1971.

Many countries have adopted DST (Daylight Saving Time) with the exception of Iceland, Africa, Asia, Japan, South Korea, Taiwan, India and, more recently, Russia. Some parts of South America and Australia observe DST while others don't. Interestingly in Canada and the United States it's only Hawaii and Arizona, (with the exception of the Navajo Nation) who don't change their clocks. Countries across the EU have observed DST but have now voted to end this in 2021.

The Greenwich Meridian is an imaginary line drawn between the North and South Poles. From London it crosses France, Spain and Africa where it meets the Atlantic Ocean on the coast of Ghana. Time zones are complicated things that don't concern us in the UK; to the west of the Meridian they are earlier than GMT and to the east later. There are eleven in Russia and Asia, six in North America, Canada and Africa, five in China and three in Australia. Theoretically if each time zone varies by one hour there should be twenty four but due to regional variations there are in fact 37, some being only half an hour.

Americans have an easy way of remembering to alter their clocks - 'Spring forward and Fall back.'

Beachamwell to Feature on German Television and Across the World



Bank Holiday Monday was the day that Deutsche Welle, Germany's public international broadcaster, came to Norfolk and to Beachamwell to learn about our wonderful system of public rights of way. Germany has no such network giving the public access across private land and deep into the countryside. So how was this network of footpaths, and bridleways created? How are they maintained and kept open?

Senior members of The Ramblers' Association were on hand to explain the legal obligations on:

- the public in using the rights of way (keeping to the designated route, keeping dogs under close control, etc.)
- the landowners (ensuring that paths are clearly defined over agricultural land and re-instated after disturbance and are not obstructed by fencing, barbed wire, vegetation or dangerous animals)
- the volunteer Ramblers work to ensure these rights of way are kept open.

The team from Deutsche Welle also learnt how The Ramblers are researching paths that have been 'lost' over time. The Ramblers, and others, have until

2026 to make a case for 'lost' paths across the country to be added to the Definitive Map of Rights of Way that shows exactly where the public can legally go. An example of such a 'lost' route – a blocked and over-grown old drove road near Hillborough - was filmed as the perfect example of a way that should be re-opened to the public.

As a contrast to the impenetrable drove, the production team were delighted to come to Beachamwell, to film on the Village Green with St. Mary's in the background. They also took great delight in filming the well-cut footpath that crosses the field behind the old school, and in seeing villagers walking there in the evening sunshine.

The DW television audience in Germany and across the world, will hear of the benefits that public rights of way bring to those living in rural communities: health to body and peace to mind, the joy of being close to the natural world and an awareness of the history revealed in buildings and countryside along the way.

The Wednesday Walkers explore the Beachamwell paths on the first Wednesday of each month. The informal group meets at the Village Hall at 10.00 a.m. and walk for about an hour and a half. New walker-explorers are always welcome.

From the Chair, Boughton Parish Council

This month sees the end of Summer and we look forward to a new season, with memories of holidays in the sun fading away

.

Over the last couple of months your parish council has been active with maintenance tasks on the pond and the village footpaths. In July we also had a parish litter pick that saw eight volunteers collect eleven bags of rubbish from the grass verges around the village. It is remarkable the sort of things that people throw from their vehicles as they pass, rather than take them home to dispose of properly. Careless littering is not only an eyesore, but a very real danger to our wildlife

My wife and I were invited to visit RAF Marham on their Friends and Families Day. It was a memorable visit on one of the hottest days of the year and were we able to get up close and personal with one of the new F35B Lightning II aircraft that we all hear flying overhead from time to time. The air displays also included aerobatics and fly-pasts from an assortment of aircraft including a Spitfire, a Eurofighter Typhoon, and a home-built Rhin DR 107. Static displays included two F-16s, an Osprey and an in-flight refuelling tanker. A classic car display and various trade and charity stalls rounded out the occasion. The Parish Council met on 3rd September and among the topics discussed were the village marquee, playground maintenance, speeding, and a bus stop for the village.

The topic of re-instating a bus shelter for the village was raised at the meeting. This would serve both the school bus and others. It would need to be constructed from transparent materials to deter its use as a .. well, that's just say "alternative uses". We would like to hear your opinion on this idea and potential sites for it. Please get in touch.

Councillor Cooper has been investigating the reasons why some delivery trucks continue to speed through our village and has discovered that some satellite navigation systems used by supermarkets still have an incorrect limit for Boughton. He is trying to get this corrected, or at least have the drivers instructed to observe the many "30" signs in the village! As we move to Autumn, the beet campaign will be upon us.

This year Albanwise have a plantation of sugar beet in Boughton, at the bottom of Wretton Road. Parish Councillors met with their Farming Manager for a briefing on the traffic plan for the harvest. Contrary to what you may have read in an incorrect article in Lynn News we are not expecting 200 trucks to "murder our village". While the majority of the crop will be removed via tracks to Stoke Road there will be some heavy goods vehicle movements along Wrettton Road, Mill Hill Road and Gibbet Lane. We estimate between 75 and 100 trucks laden with beet will be taken out along this route between 23rd September and 15th October. Empty trucks will enter the site from the A134. Truck movements will be Monday to Friday only to minimise weekend disruption. For more information as we receive it, please check our "All About Boughton" Facebook page (@boughtonpc).

Wereham Cemetery - Memorials Next of Kin

Please could any members of the public known to be the next of kin for memorials within the Wereham Cemetery contact the Parish Clerk to agree to share their contact details. We need to ensure that our contact database for the purposes of contacting next of kin, where we need to discuss memorials is as up to date as possible.

Norfolk County Council – Tree Communication

We are in the process of carrying out inspections of roadside trees and we may be surveying in your parish on smaller, rural roads known as class 4A2. The primary focus of the inspections is to identify ash trees that are in decline due to ash dieback disease (ADB) and assess whether they are now posing a risk to highway users. We may also pick up other trees that are in a dead or dangerous condition.

For further information on ADB please visit our webpage: www.norfolk.gov.uk/ashdieback This summer, our approach is to remind landowners that 'their trees are their responsibility' and to raise awareness of ash dieback disease. If trees are found in poor condition but not considered imminently dangerous we are fixing notices to the trunks of trees and marking the trees with yellow paint to inform the owner that they may need to take action. We may contact you in future if we find any particular areas of concern or have a query regarding ownership of an individual tree or tree group.

Should you need any further information or have any queries concerning the above, please visit our webpage or contact us at ashdieback@norfolk.gov.uk

The Parish Council would like to reiterate the advice of the Norfolk County Council and ask that residents with trees within their property boundary, and particularly any which overhang the highway, that they are inspected regularly and any works identified acted upon. There are in particular a number of very large trees along the A134 within private property, which will require inspection. Also, if you have bushes on your property that border a public footpath, please ensure that you keep these trimmed back through the year to avoid causing an obstacle for pedestrians, whilst adhering to rules around this work needing to be done outside

of the bird nesting season.
