MISTS AND MELLOW FRUITFULNESS

The meteorological start of autumn is the 1st September each year. You could have fooled me! At the time of writing I had just ridden 41 miles on my bike for the Norfolk Churches Trust Ride, Walk and Drive sponsored event. That took place on one of the hottest days of the year. Don't we normally associate hot days with summer? Is this the result of Global warming? Well maybe, however, there has always been the phenomena of an Indian Summer. This was a term left over from Britain's imperial past which described an autumn heat wave. I don't expect that John Keats would have experienced such a heat wave as we have just had when he wrote the wonderfully descriptive poem To Autumn. That begins with one of the most often quoted lines about this season in the English language Season of mists and mellow fruitfulness. Keats goes on to describe the ripened fruits and the grain harvest. And favourably compares autumn with spring. In many ways such seasonal events have not changed since Keats wrote the poem in 1819. The beauty of the countryside, with the tree leaves turning to browns and reds, remains with us. And before the heat wave we even had some misty mornings!

We have a population approximately seven times what it was 200 years ago, we cannot allow ourselves to nostalgically read Keats' poem or look at John Constable's painting The Hay Wain and wish that things could be as they were then. Incidentally, the farm worker driving The Hay Wain would have had an average yearly wage of 20 - 25 shillings (£1 - 1.25p.). Do we really think those times were some form of rural ideal? Many of our city-dwelling fellow citizens may actually believe that's how things are now, in spite of watching Countryfile. I did watch one episode when a famous TV personality was eulogising what amounted to hobby farming. The country cannot be fed by some people keeping a couple of sows, a few hens and a vegetable patch in their back garden! We need what some disparagingly call factory farming.

Many of us will have attended Harvest Thanksgiving Services. These traditionally mark the end of the grain harvest. Although, these days, certain cereal crops such as maize remain after others. There are other crops yet to be harvested. Sugar beet being one of those, as we may be aware living close to the British Sugar factory. There are other harvests which go on the year-round including fisheries. So, is it right to continue to hold a festival at the traditional time of the year? I believe that certain of our traditions are worth keeping. And holding Harvest Festivals at this time of year being one of those. I have conducted those in the past when virtually the whole village attended. They are Services when we can give thanks to God but also those who work in

agriculture and horticulture. And not only those but all who work in the distributive and processing industries; providing our food and drink. Let us remember those who do not have enough to eat or drink. Whether in this country or elsewhere in the world. Praying for food banks and the provision of aid to those in need.



The Revd Devin McLachlan tells us more about his background and journey to his role as a Bishop's Advisor for Inter-faith

I was ordained in the Episcopal Church (in the USA) nineteen years ago (in 2004), having as a young adult returned to the calling I'd first heard as a child. I've served in churches and

chaplaincies in both the US and Cambridge - including at the University of Chicago; St Mark's Cathedral, Seattle; Jesus College, Cambridge; and Great St Mary's, Cambridge. During that time I've been blessed to be involved with local interfaith groups, as well as briefly working the Parliament of the World Religions; along with that interfaith experience, I have bachelor's degree in Folklore & Mythology as well as a Masters of Divinity. It's been a blessing to celebrate and encourage local Christian engagement with other faith communities in our midst. As a Christian, I believe that building relationships with other religious communities can strengthen our own faith - recognising our differences as well as our commonalities, and learning fresh perspectives about the world and about how the Church is perceived outside our own walls. I also believe that working alongside other faiths is an effective strategy for Christian relevance in the face of both secularism and sectarianism. I'm looking forward to encouraging and facilitating interfaith connections between our church communities and local non-Christian faith groups - and to celebrating the interfaith connections that have already been going on for years in the Diocese of Ely. The language that the Church of England uses is Presence & Engagement. In other words, effective multi faith work is about engaging locally with our non-Christian neighbours, on a personal and community level. There is already excellent theological and academic work being done, but it's our local community relationships that are at the heart of Christian interfaith engagement. In an era of rising sectarianism and nationalism - both at home and abroad - multi faith relationships continue to be an important, Gospel-driven antidote to the language of division and isolation.







Last year's Arts and Crafts was a spectacular success and the worry was that we'd peaked and that it may not be quite as successful. We needn't have worried. The preview evening on the Friday was a delight. It was very well attended and there were many complimentary remarks about how well the exhibits were set up, the effect of the lanterns between the church and the Village Hall. There was plenty of wine to go around, thanks to the generosity of Hylton Gott who provided it, and many of our old friends came back to visit us.

On the Saturday things tailed off a bit in the afternoon. Our glorious Indian Summer had continued and many families headed for the beach and a myriad of inevitable traffic jams. People were better off here. There were a number of brilliant demonstrators. Old favourite Bob Lever, the willow weaver, and the 'Spinning Lady' fascinated passers-by. I was astonished by the quality of refreshments, the service to the public and by the small army of people putting in hours to keep things ticking over smoothly. The PCC are the prime movers of course but in the background many people contributed their time and energy to support a supreme village effort. Twenty eight volunteers set out signs, built racking, put up posters, erected and took down tents and baked superb cakes. People always tell me that they can't believe what a small village like Barton Bendish achieves. The answer is, of course, that we are a community led by people of talent and vision. There is a moral in that somewhere.



There will be a Harvest Festival service on Sunday the 15 October at the village hall beginning at 1100am. This will be followed by refreshments in the hall and a soup and a roll shared lunch. All are welcome to help us celebrate this important festival.

The restoration of the church continues with the next event being the delivery of the roof trusses, for which we do not have a date but

we hope that by the time this is published it will either have happened or be about to happen. This is a watershed in the repair of our church and is a once in a lifetime opportunity to see the installation of an entire church roof. It is our, the PCC's, intention to let all affected householders living on The Street know what is happening at the earliest opportunity. This is because access along the road by the church will be limited whilst craning operations are undertaken to fit the trusses, and the street will be restricted by the low loaders carrying the trusses.

All are welcome to watch the operation from the safety of the village green to the east and south of the church. Depending upon the date and village hall availability the PCC hopes to provide refreshments for those spectating. It is also a media event with confirmation of intent to cover the truss installation from Anglia News, Lynn news, EDP and we await BBC Look East too.

Looking to other recent events, St Mary's opened its doors to the Norfolk Churches Trust Annual Church Bike ride on 9 September and were visited by some 18 cyclists on a very hot Saturday. Members of the PCC took turns manning both the church and the village hall where we provided refreshments for those who needed them and water refill facilities. All those who visited, from Methwold, Wereham and a group from the Cotswolds appeared to be impressed by the progress made. We shall await the results from NCT to see how much money was raised by these intrepid bikers.





Mediterranean Spirals From Norfolk Federation of Wis



Ingredients:

- • 50g pitted black olives
- • 50g sun dried tomatoes in oil
- • • 14 large basil leaves
- • 2 tbsp sun dried tomato paste
- • 2 tbsp balsamic vinegar
- • 1 tbsp olive oil
- • 500g pack puff pastry/ready rolled
- • Flour for dusting

50g Grana Padano, grated

Method:

- 1. 1. 1. 1. Preheat Oven 220 C/210 C fan/Gas 7
- 2. 2. 2. 2. In a food processor add all ingredients **except pastry, flour and Grana Padano.**
- 3. 3. 3. 3. Cut pastry in half and roll out to about 32cm x 33cm or use ready rolled.
- 4. 4. 4. Spread half the mixture on the pastry leaving 1cm border on top long edge.
- 5. 5. 5. 5. Scatter with half cheese and brush clean edge with a little water.
- 6. 6. 6. Rollup tightly from bottom to top, rolling onto the damp edge to seal. Repeat with the other half of pastry.
- 7. 7.7.7. Place the two rolls onto a baking paper, chill in freezer for about 40 minutes.
- 8. 8. 8. 8. When firm, slice into rounds of about 1cm thick. Can be frozen to bake later.
- 9. 9. 9. 9. To bake oil a baking tray, place rounds about 5 cm apart.
- 10. 10. 10. 10. Flatten each spiral with thumb or heel of hand.
- 11. 11. 11. 11. Bake for 8-10 minutes.

Cool on wire rack.

Makes 50-60 spirals.






