### **BENEFICE NEWS**

#### **Rural Dean**

My name is William Burke and I have been asked to write a brief article to



introduce myself as I have just been appointed as the new house-for-duty Rural Dean for Fincham and Feltwell. I have come from across the other side (west side of the edge of the fen) where I was the parish priest for twenty years for six rural villages in North Cambridgeshire, south and west of Peterborough. It is a great privilege for me to cross the fen to come to the Eastern edge of the fen at a challenging and exciting time for the rural churches not just here in West Norfolk but across the whole country. In so many villages across England the schools have closed, the post office has closed, the pubs are closing, the rectory/vicarage has been sold and the only community centre left is the village church. It is a real challenge for the church as we attempt to work out how we maintain our presence in every historic parish and work to enhance the life of the communities in which we are set as well as advance God's will and purpose as we seek to build his kingdom here on earth. The issues we face are strategic, how to do more than survive but make the best use of our historic resources to revive the life of the church

in our villages and contribute to enhancing the wider life of our communities. My primary function as Rural Dean is to support the parish priests, churchwardens and the lay ministry in the parishes, to be their spokesperson along with Michael Poole the lay co-chair, when liaising with the diocese and to assist as a priest where ever required. Consequently I shall be doing that by visiting but also taking services across the whole deanery. At present I am living in a bedsit in Denver but in the Autumn I will move(DV) into the Rectory at Fincham. I was a soldier prior to training for the priesthood at Ripon College Cuddesdon Oxford. Since then I have served as a priest in St Albans diocese, Salisbury Diocese and Peterborough Diocese (where I am a Canon Emeritus in the cathedral). I am very much looking forward to meeting people here in Ely Diocese and working with and supporting the parishes in this historic area of West Norfolk *William Burke* 

### FROM THE SMALLHOLDING

Over the years I have tried to keep the topics of the Smallholding piece separate from that of 'From the Rectory' should I have been invited to contribute both. However living where we do in, or just outside, our rural villages, of which we are justly proud, it is frequently difficult to separate Church from seasonal matters. So as I write in mid August 'Lammas' is upon us and on our farms and gardens harvest has begun.

Lammas is the Jewish festival of first fruits of harvest. The priestly instruction to the Israelites, now settled in Canaan, was to place tokens of their early harvest, the first fruits, in a basket and to present it to the priest before the altar. Another translation has it that "you shall present your sheaf to the priest and he shall wave the sheaf before the Lord, to be accepted for you"; all this as if in acknowledgement of the Genesis promises that seed time and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night shall not cease.......".

I write this while watching a combine harvest eating up a twenty acre field of wheat. There is nothing unusual about this these days but is not yet mid August. In spite of the stop - start summer it is an early harvest, so technically Lammas should have been celebrated on 1st August. A local fruit farmer friend tells me his apples are ready for picking about a fortnight earlier than usual. I love the idea of waving a sheaf before the Lord as if to say "We haven't forgotten". A home made loaf and a bottle or two of apple juice would certainly be appropriate at Harvest Thanksgiving!

#### **Pightle Apples**

Those who wish to join us for the annual juicing exercise should be thinking of weekends at the middle of September and early October; dates will be confirmed as soon as possible.


As if to acknowledge the early season the next door Swifts left at the very end of July to embark upon their miraculous migratory journey, having been barely three months with us; we wish the screaming hooligans well!

As an increasingly 'armchair' vegetable gardener I enjoy seeing our Lammas harvest of tomatoes, French beans and cucumbers coming in. The proverbial armchair is a good place for both observation and planning. How much of the paddock do we convert to wildflower meadow and do we sow direct or introduce wild varieties as potted plants?

An autumn/winter job will be to re-organise the boundary hedge between the wheat field and us. The rabbit proof fence seems to be doing its stuff both ways and the task now is to remove some or parts of the trees causing unhelpful shade onto the arable field. This hedge is a fruitful habitat so any disturbance should be well before next breeding season. Wood pigeons nest there as they do in the vine over the terrace which is only a few feet from the bedroom window. One could be seen 'secretly' removing an eggshell of a recently hatched squab.

As physical work becomes less possible there are rewards in observing life going on around; even if it means watching others work.



### **COUNTRYSIDE NOTES**

I have recently self published an historical novel (see page 8) set in Barton Bendish about a woman by the name of Mary Caney who was born in 1790 to an agricultural labourer. I can't help but compare what farming in the area must have been like during her life time to what it is now. When she was born there were no machines working the land. Horses or oxen provided the power and, besides hand tools, the plough, harrow and carts were pretty much the only implements in use. The nineteenth century saw the invention of seed drills, a primitive horse-wheel operated threshing machine and horse drawn reapers. Later in the century steam engines took over some of the work done by horses. There were no tractors, no mowers and no combine harvesters. Not only have huge strides been made in the growing and harvesting of crops since those days but also the quality of them.

In Mary's younger days cereal crops would have grown much taller than those of today which made them particularly susceptible to being flattened by heavy rain. They were sparse, yields were poor and they were cut by men wielding sickles or scythes before being tied into small bundles known as sheaves. These were stood up (stooked) in groups of ten and left to finish drying for a few days before being taken to the farmyard on wagons and built into stacks. When a stack was complete it would be thatched with straw to keep it dry. Later in the year these would be taken apart and the ears of corn beat out from the husks by men using flails. Since the last war cereals have been bred to be higher yielding and with much shorter straw as less is required for bedding or fodder. Today wheat grows little more than knee high with barley and oats being not much taller. Rye is now often used for bio fuel and, as bulk is required, has not been reduced much in size.

It is not only crops that have seen a breeding revolution but livestock also. In Mary's day cattle would have been dual purpose regional breeds, kept for both milk and meat production. Poultry too, of which there are many local breeds, would have been bred to provide both meat and eggs. Many breeds of sheep have evolved over the centuries to suit the conditions of the areas in which they grazed although in Mary's day they would have been kept mostly for their wool. It is really only in the last few decades that plant and livestock breeding has concentrated on developing strains suited to specific purposes and this has been brought about by three different methods. The desired traits have been attained through selective breeding, by cross breeding and in the case of livestock by the importation of breeds, mostly from the Continent, leading to great improvements in every aspect of farming

### Iced Rose-petal Cake

This sumptuous cake, complete with crystallized roses, is a sweet-scented version of a Victoria sandwich.

- I Preheat the oven to 180°C/350°F/Gas 4. Grease and line the bases of two 20cm/8in round sandwich tins (layer cake pans). Sift 225g/8oz/2 cups self-raising (self-rising) flour and 5ml/1 tsp baking powder into a bowl, add 225g/8oz/1 cup batter or margarine, softened, 225g/8oz/generous I cup caster (superfine) sugar and 4 medium (US large) eggs, and beat until light and creamy.
- 2 Divide between the two tins (pans) and level the surfaces. Bake for about 25 minutes until just firm to the touch. Transfer to a wire rack to cool.
- 3 To make the rose-petal borner filling, separate the rose petals from the flower heads. Remove the white heel at the base of the petals and chop finely. Then beat 115g/4oz/½ cup softened huner with a wooden spoon or an electric mixer until it becomes very creamy and even in colour. Add 115g/4oz/1 cup leing (confectioners') sugar, a little at a time, and 60ml/4 tbsp sweetly scented rose petals. Sandwich the filling between the two cakes and place on a serving plate.
- 4 Bear 225g/80z/2 cups icing sugar with 30ml/2 thsp of rose water to a consistency that thickly coars the back of a spoon. Add more rose water, drop by drop, if nocessary.
- 5 Spoon the icing over the cake, allowing it to run down the sides in places. Decorate with a circle of crystallized roses and petals, made by painting them with egg white sprinkling while damp with caster sugar and allowing them to dry completely.

Makes a 20cm/8in cake

#### Free Home Assessments On Offer

Older, disabled or vulnerable residents of West Norfolk are being encouraged to book an appointment for a free home assessment from Careline Community Services.

The assessments, which are carried out by a team of qualified staff, will help residents, who may be living with a disability or dementia, or who are simply older and less mobile, to identify concerns in their property which may be affecting their day-to-day life. The assessor, trained by the Disabled Living Foundation, will inspect the home to see whether measures could be introduced that would reduce the possibility of slips, trips and falls and generally make it easier for people to live safely and independently in their own homes.

Measures that could be considered include installation of a Careline personal alarm, improved lighting arrangements, heating checks, draught proofing, smoke detectors and easy-to-use taps along with recommendations for other adaptations that may reduce any potential risk to the resident. Practical solutions for those living with dementia are also available, this includes signage or colour differentiation for those who suffer with memory loss and are visually impaired.

The assessors will also be able to advise whether any grant funding is available for any works required.

#### SWAFFHAM MUSEUM



Swaffham Museum receives good reviews from our visitors. It is open daily - except Sundays - and has five rooms. Local history is always popular with visitors from around Swaffham as well as with people holidaying in the area. Many visitors comment very favourably on the many activities we have for children - dressing up, museum trails, drawing and colouring amongst them.

This year we have an exhibition 'Philo's diary' which has

extracts from a diary written in 1850 by James Philo (1810-

1877) who worked as a boot and shoemaker from his home in London Street approximately where Blaine's shop is today. He revisited the diary in 1873 and he describes the changes in Swaffham over the 19th Century. Besides his own personal sentiments, there are references to Education. Emigration. Local Government, Unions and Entertainment in Swaffham.

We also have a temporary exhibition of paintings from our store. There are paintings from the Carter family - Samuel John (father to Howard Carter) and Harry Carter who is well respected for his village signs. There are some copies of Harry's original designs. There are also some works from the graphic designer, Max Mueller. Max was a graphic artist and printer in Liepzig before becoming an unwilling conscript in the German army during WW11. surrendered to the American army and eventually came to live as a prisoner of war in the camp at Cockley Cley. After his release he remained within the locality and set up his own printing press. Recently we have acquired a few more paintings by Ben Ripper. These too are on display.

#### Barton Bendish Ordinary Parish Council Meeting held on 12th July 2017

The Chairman, Cllr Will Chapman, presided over the meeting and four members of the public were in attendance.

The Parish Council had explored options for funding to restore the old historical map of Barton Bendish, which is held by The Norfolk Records Office in Norwich, but unfortunately no funding options had been discovered. It was therefore agreed that the Parish Council should pay the cost of £1120 required to cover the restoration project which would enable the map to be preserved for future generations.

Members of the Parish Council had met with the Highways Engineer regarding concerns over safety on Boughton Long Road. It had been agreed that Highways would install "slow" signage and chevrons along with widening some of the grips at the side of the road. It was also agreed that the Parish Council would apply for funding from the Norfolk County Council Parish Partnership Scheme for 2018/19 to help with the cost of installing a trod (informal footpath) on the stretch of the road around the bend. The Parish Council were also contacting Norfolk County Council to formally ask them to make provision in their budget for 2018/19 to extend the 30mph speed limit in the village to include Boughton Long Road.

Cllr Lissa Kinsey had provided a letter to formally give her resignation as a Parish Councillor. Cllr Chapman thanked her for her service to the Parish Council. The casual vacancy created by this resignation has been advertised by the Borough Council and as there was no call for an election the Parish Council is now able to co-opt to fill this vacancy. If you would be interest in becoming a Parish Councillor or would like further information on the role please contact the Clerk on the details below before 20<sup>th</sup> September 2017.

Cllr McAlister is still looking for volunteers to help with repainting of the telephone boxes on Church Road and in Eastmoor which have been adopted by the Parish Council. If you are able to help please contact her on 01366 347682 or speak to the Clerk on the details below.

The next meeting will take place on Wednesday 20<sup>th</sup> September, 2017. This will be an Ordinary Parish Council Meeting starting at 7.30 pm in the Village Hall.
