#### LOST CAUSES?

I felt drawn to write about lost causes for this month's magazine. In particular, about what became known as the Keep Sunday Special campaign against shop opening on Sundays. That became law with the passing of the Sunday Trading Act 1994. So, we've been able to shop on Sundays for the past 30 years. A lost cause? I wonder because the rationale behind the passing of the Act really no longer applies. With so many people now working from home and the reemergence of deliveries from supermarkets, the need for Sunday opening has largely disappeared. Shopping has become the most 'popular' leisure-time activity. However, in my opinion, Spirituality is only one of a number of reasons why allowing shopping (of all things) seven days a week is harmful. The amount of pollution caused by so many vehicles making their way to supermarkets and other large stores can only be imagined. Together with that produced by the lighting and heating of such large buildings. But there are sociological physiological and psychological reasons why this 'pastime' is harmful in itself. There is a lack of interaction between people when shopping at any self-service store. And the effects on people who are carrying out activities that they really find distasteful (a minority of shoppers actually like doing so). It must be admitted that, for most of our fellow citizens, Sunday is not special but is the 'second half of the weekend'. Despite what many calendars and electronic devices display, Sunday is legally the first day of the week. For the Christian it is the Sabbath which originally meant 'to rest'. The prophet Isaiah wrote call the sabbath a delight (Isa. 58: 13). And Jesus said The sabbath was made for humankind, not humankind for the sabbath (Mark 2: 27). As a change from the workaday routine, it should provide opportunities for self-development. To exercise mind and body that is difficult during the working week. That, surely, must never be a lost cause! When looking for suitable quotes for this article I was surprised find one in the 'lost causes' category from Martin Luther King Jnr. Darkness cannot drive out darkness; only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate; only love can do that. Surprised because whoever complied these quotations regarded what Dr. King had said to be a 'lost cause'. The Bible is full of wonderful imagery. Among the most poignant are those that distinguish between light and darkness. And those between love and hate. As I write this, the riots during August resulting from a lack of light and a lack of love were still forefront in the minds of those of us who care for. those around us. They only stopped because the full force of the law, as one senior police officer called it, was brought to bear. However, one of the most heartening consequences of those violent disturbances was the number of people who counter-protested. Those that took part showed solidarity against oppression and extremist attitudes. They were living in light and love. Again, not a lost cause. Tony Mills

#### **COUNTRYSIDE NOTES INSECTS September 2024**

An insect is described as being any small creature with six legs and a body divided into three parts, many have wings. There are over 24,000 species in Britain. On the good side there are those that pollinate crops, provide natural pest control, decompose waste and recycle nutrients. The baddies cause serious damage to agricultural crops and trees and distress to animals. Either way, without insects the planet's ecological systems would collapse. Compared to a century ago insect populations are estimated to have fallen by more than 90%. When I was a kid the pastures were alive with crickets, the floors of harvest wagons heaved with insects and glow worms shone at night. Not that many years ago if you left the light on after dark in a room with the window open and the curtains not pulled you ended up with it full of assorted moths and other flying insects. A car journey through the countryside resulted in a mass of insects becoming squashed on the windscreen, more than the washers and wipers could cope with, making it necessary to remove them by hand. A method now used to estimate the abundance of insects is to count how many get splattered on car number plates. Recently conservation charities Buglife and the Kent Wildlife Trust asked members of the public to do just this. Compared to a similar survey in 2004, analysis of records from 26,500 journeys across the UK revealed the amount had fallen by over 75%. Of course, there will always be natural fluctuations depending on the weather. This summer has seen an abundance of ants and a dearth of butterflies. The latter have declined by 80% in the last 50 years.

Declining numbers of insects mean there is less food available for the dwindling numbers of airborne insect-eating birds such as swallows, swifts and house martins, as well as bats. Many seed eating birds feed their young partly on insects or their larvae which also play a major part in the diet of many other birds. The little green caterpillars blue tits feed to their young are the larval form of the winter moth. Insects also prey on other insects.

Although the widespread use of agricultural pesticides is inevitably blamed for the decline the reason is much more complex than that. It's the accumulation of a number of factors that include the increase of intensive farming, habitat loss and fragmentation and pollution, particularly in our water ways as many insects hatch from larvae developed from eggs laid in freshwater. Climatic changes are also affecting their distribution and survival. In my personal opinion a contributory factor is that there are now very few mixed farms. The greater variety of habitat the more insects they'll be. The major part of a 50 acre cereal field, even with a conservation headland, is a sterile place but 50 acres of pasture grazed by cattle will be buzzing with life. There's nothing like a cow and its cowpats to attract insects and beetles!

# **August 2024 News from the Magpie Centre**

Following the Charity Ride held at the Magpie Centre, home of West Norfolk Riding for the Disabled Association in the grounds of Wallington Hall on June 30th, we are delighted to report that the event attracted 70 riders and raised £1,122 for WNRDA.

Said Ellie Head, Chairwoman of Hoofbeats, who organised the ride: "Two of the riders are registered disabled and we were happy to support the Magpie Centre and all the good work it does. We are already looking forward to another successful ride next year!"

And moving from four feet to two, Stephen Riley-Elliot, whose child rides at the Magpie Centre, put in a huge effort to accomplish a 50km Ultra Marathon (Boudicca Way 50k) on July 20th, boosting the Centre's funds by a further £1,175 in sponsorship.

An aspect of the Centre's work, which is gaining momentum, is for home-schooled children, many of whom are on the autistic spectrum, to take up riding. The benefits are not only physical but include increased confidence and enhanced communication skills.

If you wish to explore this option please call the Magpie Centre office on 01553 810202 to request an application form. Once this has been completed and returned, the participant will have an assessment, which lasts about half an hour and is free of charge. If all goes well, the participant will be slotted into a class (maximum 4 riders) of riders of similar ability for regular lessons.

And lastly, our Chairwoman, Bernadette Ford, will be standing down, for personal reasons, at the end of September and we are seeking to appoint her successor. Knowledge of horses and/or of people living with disability, although desirable is not essential. More important is the ability to lead a team including staff, volunteers and the Board of Trustees. 





#### Wednesday Walkers - August 2024

The Walkers explored footpaths and bridleways towards the east side of the parish.

Cars were taken to the edge of Swaffham Forest to walk the ride that curves and turns to follow the perimeter bank of the mediaeval Cockley Cley Wood. This boundary bank is clearly visible as it rises several feet on the south side of the ride.

The route turned north at Bridleway 18 to cross yet another but not so defined bank before joining the even older Peddesty or Saltesty track (Bridleway 3). This old road winds across the Brecks and up to the coast, but the Walkers turned west at Warren Farm at Bridleway 24 towards Larch Wood and Bridleway 11, before reaching the metalled road at the arboretum.

The final stretch took the Walkers back to an unnumbered forest ride to hunt for flora and lepidoptera. Gatekeepers Meadow Browns, Speckled Wood, Large Skipper butterflies and a Six-spot Burnet Moth were all spied before the Walkers returned to their cars and so back to the village: an expedition of some three miles on a hot and humid morning.

The Wednesday Walkers will explore again on Wednesday, 4<sup>th</sup> September, leaving Beachamwell Village Hall at 10.00 am. Do come and walk with us, perhaps along public rights of way you have not yet

We had an audience of 40. After deduction of costs the talk raised some £393 for St Mary's, so a massive thank you to all those who purchased tickets for the event. The talk itself was not wholly focussed on Nemon, but also the nature of Beachamwell and the Hall in the mid 20th century. It was an informative, amusing and emotional talk that was very well received. The PCC hoped that the audience enjoyed the prosecco and canapes that were served after the event, they certainly all disappeared.

Now back to church repair from fundraising. Our next service is scheduled on Saturday 14 September at 11am and the October service will be followed by a Harvest Festival lunch, to which all are welcome, watch the notice boards for details nearer the time and the St Mary's Facebook Page."

### Update on the Friends of St Mary's



In November 2022 it was decided that the Friends would suspend their fundraising activities for two vears as their involvement was not needed to help the PCC who undertaking the maior refurbishment of the The preliminary Church. stages of the restoration involved replacement of the roofs and work on the tower and

porch. The PCC have done a very good job keeping progress going, working with the insurers and dealing with the necessary paperwork with the Diocese. The new roofs look splendid.

The next stage of the restoration will involve very careful negotiation with the insurers as the interior of the Church is designed. There may be aspects of the original church building which are no longer needed to be kept (for example there was a memorial to a person who is unknown and no one is able to identify) and savings there can be applied towards other enhancements to make the building viable for the long term future. The PCC have identified as a priority the provision of disabled access which is very welcome. There will also be uninsured work which can be done which will ensure the building can be actively used for a variety of purposes, both religious and secular.

The Friends note that the PCC share this vision for the future of the building which is so central to Beachamwell. In the circumstances the Friends are springing back into action to help. We will hold our AGM as usual in November and will keep the village informed of our fundraising activities. Currently we are focussed on providing funds for the provision of a water supply and drainage with a view to the installation of a WC and small servery, as supported by the majority of those who responded to the village survey and who have attended meetings in the past. There are many steps to be taken before this can progress and we hope we will be able to work constructively with the PCC to explore the best way forward. **Peggy Ray**

#### Musings on New Zealand 2 - Seasons and Nature

There was a misprint in part 1 Languages. It is classed as respectful to call teachers Mr or Mrs, rather than the more formal Sir or Miss. Alternatively it would be using a title and surname. See later for the quiz answers.

This week I had to get stronger medication for my hayfever - welcome to summer in Boughton. When I first arrived in New Zealand, my hayfever was decidedly reduced. Summer in NZ is the months of December, January and February. I was allergic during spring to some of the grasses but not as bad as my memories of the English countryside, especially the oil seed rape. I was, however, allergic to the NZ Christmas tree which indoors is a different pine not the same smell as England, so we got an artificial tree - apologies to the traditionalists. The tree most associated with Christmas in NZ is the pōhutukawa (pow-hoo-too-kau-uh), which is an evergreen and has a lovely red flower that blossoms in December and is seen on many Christmas cards.

The majority of trees in NZ are evergreen, with native trees such as Rimu, Kauri, Manuka (ma-nu-ka), Kowhai (ko-fai) and Flax. The 'wh' in NZ is pronounced like a 'f'. The thing that I loved, when travelling around, was all the different greens of the trees and bushes. Include the Cabbage Tree and Ferns and the textures were also very different. Sometimes I missed the reds and oranges of Autumn, but you would come across Oaks, Chestnuts, Silver Birches, Walnut and Magnolia planted by people immigrating from their home country. Many of the grape vines were from Germany, Dalmatian coast and Croatia. The national emblem is a Silver Fern, which is a fern tree only found in NZ, with a silver underside. Māori believe it shows strength, resistance and enduring power,

Our Church in Henderson didn't have a harvest festival, whilst I was there. Harvest in NZ would be March, April, May which gets a bit mixed up with Easter. On one hand there are fluffy new chicks, Easter eggs, new birth and resurrection versus thank you for our crops and all those who work on the land.

Auckland is built on 51 extinct volcanoes so rather 'hilly'. The bigger concern was from earthquakes. Actual tremors tend to be felt further down the North Island around Wellington on the west and Napier/Gisborne on the East. Napier had a very large 7.8 earthquake in 1931. The fire that broke out in the city centre caused damage to many of the shops and buildings. The CBD was

rebuilt in the Art Deco style and is well worth a visit and tour.  $40 \text{km}^2$  of the sea bed became dry land along the coastline. Many have heard of the two Christchurch Earthquakes in  $4^{\text{th}}$  Sept 2010 and then  $22^{\text{nd}}$  Feb 2011, which the city is just fully recovering from. NZ, due to the seismic activity, has geothermal hot springs, Rotorua and Hamner Springs being two of the most well-known.

The north of the North Island is quite tropical and Auckland tends to be 3-5 degrees warmer than Boughton. When we first arrived, we never had frost or ice on the windscreens. Once we had a large ball of ice from a hail storm but that was it. In the last few years, winters have got a bit cooler in Auckland. I had a few iced windscreens in recent years and had to find an old credit card!! I also explained to friends about do's and dont's of cleaning off ice. This would usually be around August. '

The desert road on State Highway 1 in the central north island gets closed with snow. It is about 3500ft above sea level. The 'desert' is that it is a deserted plateau in the mountains. You can go for the day to Mount Ruapehu on the North Island to ski. The better ski areas and more well known are in the central and south of the South Island – Queenstown with Coronet Peak and The Remarkables; Cardona and Treble Cone near Wanaka and Mt Hutt, near Christchurch. The most well-known glaciers are Franz Josef and Fox glaciers on the west of the South Island. NZ is well worth a trip; however, you should allow at least a month. *Moira Saunders*




